

Carroll W. Massengale, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wade Massengale, 118 East Lens, Eastland, has been accepted for the Aviation Cadets.

Massengale will report to Abilene, for enlistment and go to Lackland AFB for training, reporting there May 8.

Cadet training is a 16 month course, consisting of 12 weeks of pre-flight, six months of primary training, five months of basic training, and eight to 10 weeks of advanced training. In pre-flight he will learn the Air Force organization, administration, leadership, military management, military geography, intelligence, air warfare, drills, ceremonies, physical training and several other subjects.

In primary training he gets his first taste of actual flying when his instructor takes him up in the Cub, which is a light civilian type plane. Primary training covers fundamental flight techniques, maneuvers, and procedures.

He will also learn aircraft engineering, weather, navigation, radio and theory of flight.

After about 15 hours in the T-6 he will solo. He will then go to the basic phase and decide whether to fly single or multi-engine planes, a decision which will determine his assignment to fighters, interceptors, bombers or transports.

He will spend five months studying and flying the type aircraft chosen, and at the end of the five months he will be commissioned a flying officer and receive his silver wings.

Then on the advanced course for the finishing touches to his training, and an assignment to the world's most feared Air Force.

## Easter Is God's Gift Of Light, Strength And Peace

(Editor's Note: Bishop William C. Martin is president of the National Council of Churches in America. Monday he will be in Ranger to speak at the meeting of the Cisco District Methodist Youth Fellowship annual banquet.)

The great annual festival of Easter, which this year falls on April 18, is "God's gift that we may have light for our darkness, strength for our battle and peace for our pain—even in a world of tumult . . ."

In an Easter and Holy Week message, Methodist Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas, president of the National Council of Churches, declared that the joy of Easter reaches to the depths of all Christ's actions and that it is "beyond anything this world can give."

The head of the federation of 30 Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches said Easter serves to remind the world that life is not "a blind struggle in the dark. To understand Easter," he said, "is to learn the answer to life's deepest questions."

The complete text of Bishop Martin's message follows:

**"The Joy of Easter"**

"To understand Easter is to learn the answer to life's deepest questions.

"Are we as individuals helpless victims caught in the net of disappointment, suffering, and death? Are our best efforts for peace, freedom, and justice doomed to failure? Is history proof that man's highest impulses are but cruel mockeries in the relentless futility of existence?"

"Such questions are truly confounding and depressing if our life is but a blind struggle in the dark. And it would be such a struggle if it were not that God is, that He rules, and that in Christ He has enabled us to overcome the world."

"How desperately men need this faith! The frenzy with which many seek distraction in novel sensation or tense excitement is a measure of their effort to escape the questions they dare not face without faith in God. This world is too much for a faithless man."

"To understand Easter we must follow Christ through the agonies and death of Holy Week. Without the crucifixion there would be no Easter. For victory was born out of struggle; and life inevitably involves struggle. It is not in the Christian faith to believe that all good things come to him who only hopes. God's intervention in history through Christ for man's salvation was not easy or cheap. It was supremely costly in suffering love."

"Easter is, then, God's gift to use that we may have new light for our darkness, strength for our battle, peace for our pain—even in a world of tumult and a life of pain. The hardest questions are answered in Holy Week and Easter."
