



Explanation of Questionnaires **Given Reserves**

Members of the armed forces' standby reserve in different parts of the state including those in Eastland county recently have expressed themselves as "surprised" Hats off to Cisco Junior Col- and "puzzled" upon receiving questionaires from local draft boards.

Draft boards are beginning administration of a law enacted by Congress in the immediately past session which placed upon the Selective Service System responsibility of screening the nation's entire standby reserve, Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said today.

"Standby reservists, both men and women, are being mailed the questionnaires," Col. Schwartz said. "By law, these reservists are required to fill out these questionaires and return them to the local boards for use in determining the reservists' availability in time of emergency.

Colonel Schwartz pointed out that standby reservists cannot be called to service unless an emergency is declared by the Congress. Based upon information furnshed in his quartionaire, each tandby reservist will be placed in

ne of three categories: I-R - available for service. II-R - deferred because vilian occupation essential to naintenance of national health

safety, or interest. III-R - deferred by reason of extreme hardship and privation to

In time of war or emergency delared by the Congress, the standby reservist in category I-R can recalled to service by his armed force. Those in II-R and III-R vill not be recalled to service unless there is a change in status which places them in category

"The standby reservist has the right of appeal if he is not convinced his category is correct, Colonel Schwartz said. standby reservist has a legal responsibility to keep his local board nformed of any change in his ad-

dress or status. Colonel Schwartz said the program provides two services:




