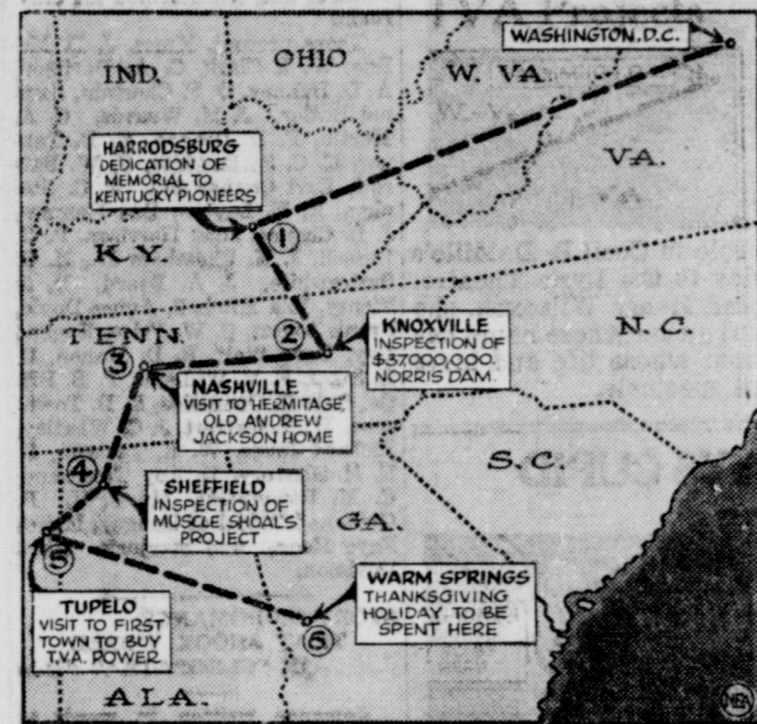

per cent interest apply on delinquent tax payments after next July 1. To the average man who digs deep into his jeans for tax dollars the whole thing appeared simple enough.

House Bill 7 is generally called the "Pope Bill" after its author, Rep. W. E. Pope of Corpus Christi. It does not take effect until Feb. 9. The delinquent tax-owner therefore will have 35 days in which to pay delinquent taxes to his state, county, city, town and school district without penalty or interest.

Remission of penalties and interest on delinquent taxes was made mandatory on cities, towns, and school districts between Feb. 9 and March 15, 1935. After that date, the governing bodies of each must determine whether the act shall apply to their local affairs.

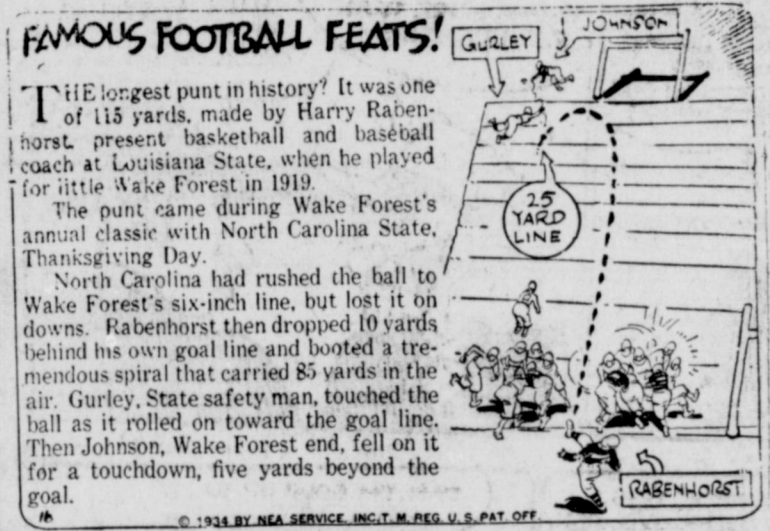

THE longest punt in history? It was one of 115 yards, made by Harry Rabenhorst present basketball and baseball coach at Louisiana State, when he played for little Wake Forest in 1919.

The punt came during Wake Forest's annual classic with North Carolina State, Thanksgiving Day.

North Carolina had rushed the ball to Wake Forest's six-inch line, but lost it on downs. Rabenhorst then dropped 10 yards behind his own goal line and booted a tremendous spiral that carried 85 yards in the air. Gurley, State safety man, touched the ball as it rolled on toward the goal line. Then Johnson, Wake Forest end, fell on it for a touchdown, five yards beyond the goal.
