

He is between 45 and 65 years of age. He makes up about 27 per cent of the "employable" relief population; but there's a catch in the use of that adjective, because his chances of re-entering private industry are almost nil, 45 being accounted a sere and yellow old age in employment offices these days.

The forgotten man, further, has little hope of cashing in under any unemployment insurance scheme, and unless he is getting very close to 65 no old-age pensions will do him much good.

If the administration's \$4,800,000,000 work relief schemes goes through, it may mean a job for him, but the job will be only temporary and it won't pay him any very princely sum.
