Those sleek, streamlined trains that the railway lines have been throwing about the country lately come close to being the most encouraging single thing that has happened since the depression.

Or, to be more exact, the public's response to them does.

Since those trains appeared, the newspapers and magazines have been full of predictions of vast new railroad construction programs. Hand in hand with this has come a great revival of interest in new types of construction in other fields.

Makers of steel houses are stirring from the long sleep. Automobile makers are playing around with new designs. Even the output of such things as refrigerators and household furniture has been affected.

Now all this, to begin with, is simply the process of putting ourselves on tiptoe to peer into an enormous new field that is fairly begging for industrial expansion.

A great opportunity awaits American business, somewhere not far off; it begins to look as if we would be moving into it in the near future.

But there is more to it than that. It also signifies the revival of the old, traditional American spirit. We are discovering that the world is not coming to an end, after all—that there is work to be done, and lots of it, and that we might just as well roll up our sleeves and get busy on it.

We talked so much about over-production, over-expansion, and over-capitalization in the last four years that we fooled ourselves into thinking that we had left our golden age away off behind us somewhere.

Then we saw a couple of brand-new types of railroad train, did a little meditation, and discovered that it just wasn't so.

There is enough work crying to be done in this country to keep us all busy for generations.

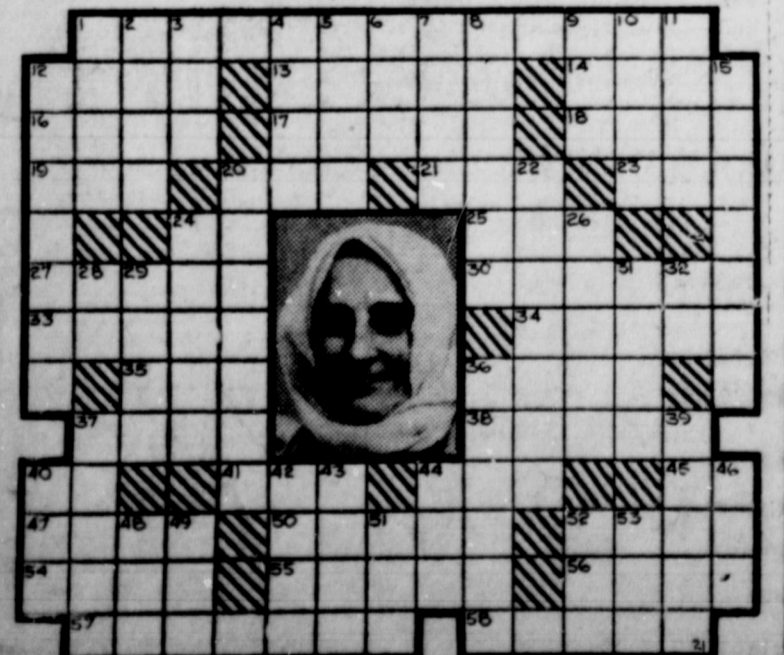

'Dusting the Covers of Texas History' for The Texas Centennial Celebrations of 1936

There was a great deal of thankfulness in the hearts of the inhabitants of San Jose Mission that windy March 16, 1768, when the cornerstone to Mission San Jose de San Miguel de Aguayo de Buena Vista was laid. They had nearly completed their church, they had thrived on their productive fields, and it was evident that many good years were ahead.

The Newfangles (Mom 'n' Pop) By Cowen



built the church in a perfect square, with two tall towers in opposite corners. With a sense of symmetry and beauty, the craftsmen had perfected their place of worship. Stone and lime were combined to give it durability. Against the wall were dwellings of the natives, equipped with a kitchen and chimney, and loop holes which were outside for defensive purposes. An arched granary contained food for the winter. A weaving room, carpenter shop, iron shop, tailor shop, and furnace for burning lime and brick were included in the mission.

Strangers at San Jose often mistook the large irrigation ditch for a river, so wide and clear it was. Fields of brown beans, corn, melons, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, and sugar cane planted as far away as a league were watered by the ditch. In the summer, trees near the church were laden with fruit trees were just beginning to bud, and the onion stalks, cabbage, lettuce, and rows of okra were barely visible above the soil. The mission had a low bulwark over each of the four entrances, and an opening on the inside of each, where the neophytes lived. In the west room, in front of the church, was a fifth entrance, guarded by a gateway which was left open each day. In front of it was a wide cleared space, so that enemies might not come from under cover and attack the mission.

Ten years passed before the vaulted roof of the church was completed. The dome mouldings, termed by some as "useless," and by others as "exquisite," had extraordinarily beautiful workmanship. Ornate religious statues and fine mouldings around the main entrance set San Jose apart from the other missions. In the center of the entrance was a balcony, which was entered only through a window, instead of the usual door. After seeing Mission San Jose in 1936, Centennial visitors will marvel that such beauty, strength and majesty could have been shaped by unskilled hands of Indians and Spaniards. Because it has maintained its first state, even though more than a hundred years have passed, Mission San Jose will ever be the "metropolis" of Texas and Mexico.

Food For Relief Clients Expected In Near Future

H. E. Driskill, county relief administrator, announced today that he was expecting a shipment of 108,000 pounds of Irish potatoes to arrive in Eastland at any time now. The potatoes are to be distributed among the relief clients in Stephens, Palo Pinto and Eastland counties.

A shipment of 4,500 pounds of butter has been received and an additional 4,500 which will complete the allotment for this section, is to be trucked from Abilene today.

An allotment of 5,000 pounds of rice is also expected before long, Mr. Driskill announced and it is hoped that a supply of pinto beans can also be secured.

There will be no more flour for distribution, he said, as the entire quota for Eastland county has been used up.

Wings Indicate Cavern In Panhandle Area

MARILLO.—Mysterious cavern cracks in the earth's surface are worrying farmers and highway officials in this section of the Panhandle. The affected area is near highway No. 5 about midway between Goodnight and the point where the highway drops off the plateau.

Years ago in this same locality a four-foot chasm suddenly opened up across the highway and through farms for about a mile. It was so deep that fence posts were dropped into it and when they struck bottom, they closed gradually following the rains, but traces of it are still visible.

The new crevice is much smaller than the first, but highway officials are worried for fear a chasm may open suddenly across the main highway. The crevice parallels the road for about a mile and is about four feet deep.

Like the old crevice, the new was not caused by a dividing of the earth's surface, but rather a sinking of the earth as high a section of the ceiling of an underground cavern had fallen.

Officials are keeping a close watch of the highway and geologists have been called in to try to determine the cause for the phenomenon.

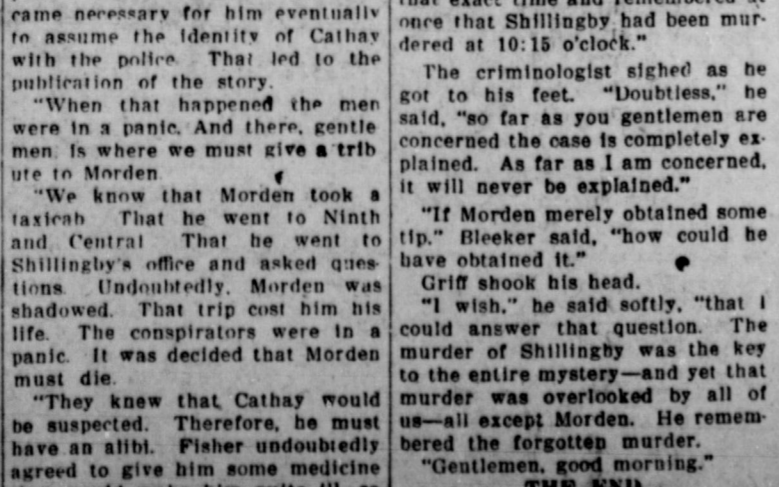
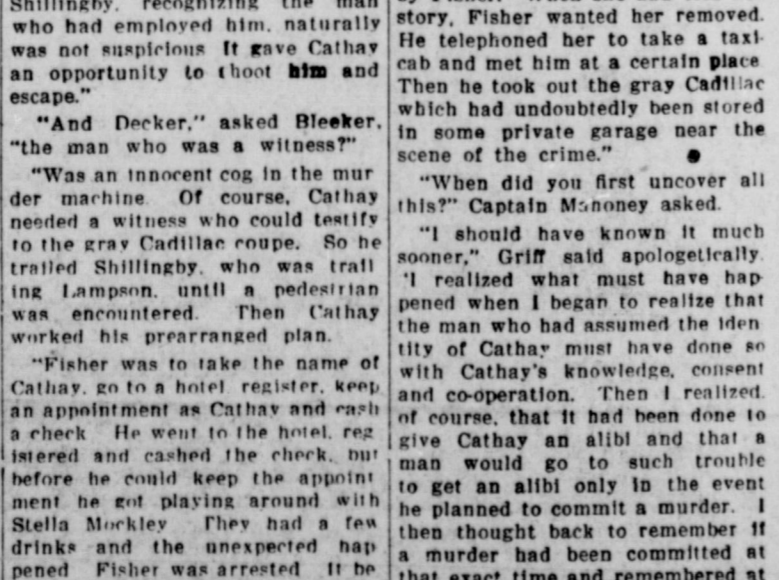
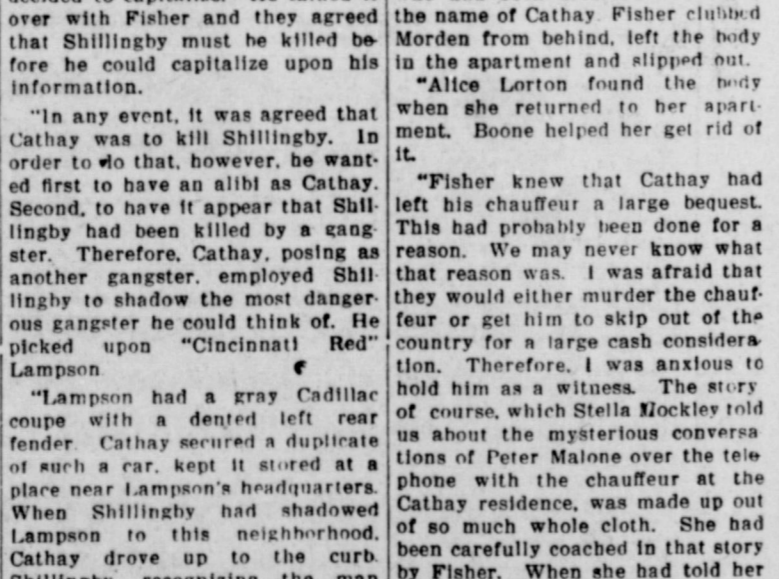
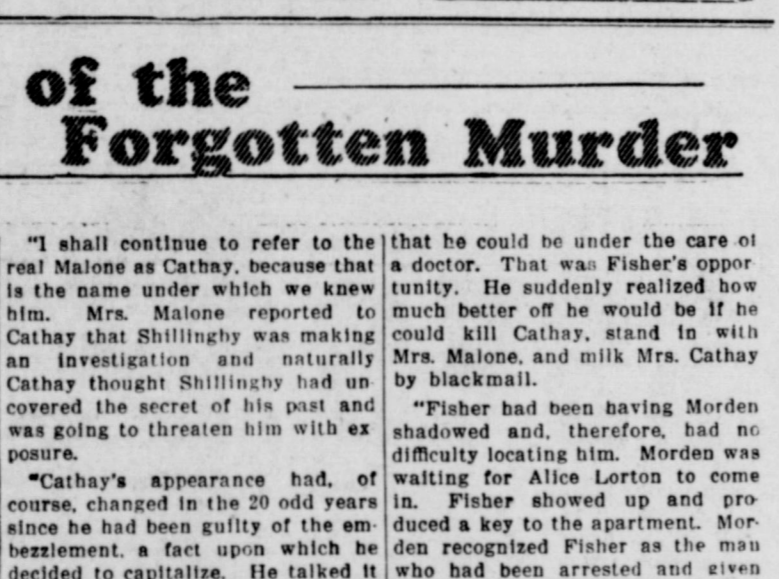
The Clew of the Forgotten Murder

As provided in the Ordinances regulating the time for payment of City Taxes, if the first half of your taxes are not paid before December 1st, 1934, the whole amount will become delinquent and be subject to interest and penalty charges in addition thereto.
