WASHINGTON, Feb. 19. -President Roosevelt today transferred \$45,000,000 in unexpended PWA funds to the federal emergency relief administration, financ ing aid to the nation's 21,000,000 needy persons until March 1.

The action was taken after Relief Administrator Harry Hopkins announced he had spent the \$100,-000,000 already allotted for relief this month.

The \$45,000,000, he said, would last until March 1. By that time, however, the administration officials expect congressional action on the \$4,880,000,000 work relief

The relief administration, PWA receives the \$880,000,000 relief appropriation in the bill.

Ours Is a Government of Five Branches!

The government of the United States, we were taught in schools, consists of three branches, the executive, legislative, and judicial.

Of recent years, a fourth appears to have been added unofficially: The investigative. Few can doubt the valuable services of this branch; to wit, in the matter of Teapot Dome, the banking investigation, and the munitions

Now we seem in a fair way to developing a fifth branch, the telegraphic. This is the long-distance lobby, or technique of delivering a shower of telegrams on the doorsteps of congressmen at the psychological moment.

Rejection by the senate of the World Court appears as the most vivid example of the power of this fifth branch at the moment. On Friday, it appeared likely that the World Court would pass. Over the week-end, several wielders of this fifth arm of government got busy. And in the cloudburst of telegrams that descended on the senate, the World Court was lost.

It is not precisely a new technique, yet there are signs that it is being developed to a new high point. Members of Congress not familiar with its manifestations must now give careful consideration to its meaning.

Naturally, a congressman ought to pay attention to his mail, and especially to telegrams, from his constituents. That is one way for him to know how the folks at home are thinking.

But it is, after all, only one way. It ought to be evaluated, weighed, and not necessarily always accepted at face

For instance, large numbers of identical telegrams might be discounted, say, three for one. For a certain amount of suspicion always attaches to the intrinsic value as well as to the deep conviction behind the message that comes in another's words.

Old, experienced congressmen know this. Messages plainly attributable to impassioned oratorical appeals or intensive editorial campaigns might also be discounted, say two for one. A sliding scale of evaluating the messages might be worked out by astute congressmen.

Income Tax In A Nutshell

Exemption Allowed State Employees

The compensation of officers and employees of a State or any political subdivision thereof, if the services of such officers or employees are rendered in connection with activities which constitute the discharge of an essential governmental functions, as distinguished from a proprietary function, is exempt from federal income tax. The compensation of such officers and employees is subject to federal income tax if their services were rendered in connection with the exercise of a proprietary function. For example, the compensation of the governor of a state, mayor of a city, councilmen, board of aldermen, publicschool teachers, firemen, and policemen is not subject to federal

Half of Acreage **Under Control Is** Planted In Feed

COLLEGE STATION-Of the 6,283,548 acres of Texas land under crop adjustment contracts in 1934, 3,558,564 were planted in feed crops for home use according to the annual reports of county agents assembled here. Only 1,178,854 acres were allowed to remain idle, and the drouth last ear was a factor which H. H. Wiliamson, state agent and vice director of the extension service, estimates had a great deal to do with that, as nearly half a million acres of the total was wheat land lying in the region of least rain-

Food for home use claimed 295,-917 acres; soil improvement crops were planted on 221,358 acres; while with pasture crops for home use, 617,296 acres headed toward the goal of more grassland to replace that so disastrously put to the plow in the past 25 years. The remaining acreage was in temporary pastures and miscellaneous crops for home use.

"Emphasis is often publicly placed on the emergency and temporary nature of some of the work of the county agents during the past 18 months," Williamson pointed out, "but if there can be a greater permanent improvement on Texas farms and ranches than will come from the use of these acres released by the government from corn and cotton and wheat to be used for food and feed crops, I do not know what it is.

"That vast new acreage of pasture and feed crops for home use means more meat of a better quality on the family table and a nearer approach to the amount of milk the children need to make them strong and well than Texas has ever before provided. And moreover they saved the situation, in so far as it was saved, when the drouth cut the normal feed crops.

"Those acres planted to soil improvement crops, taken with the enormously increased interest in terracing, represent a turning of rural public opinion in Texas to soil conservation from which the State will be benefitting more years than I dare to prophesy," Williamson said.
