JURORS OUT TWO HOURS IN ATTACK CASE

Testimony of Mary Kertezs Is One of State's Mainstays In The Trial.

Frank Allen, Cisco negro, was convicted late Tuesday afternoon in 91st district court of attempted attack on Mary Kertesz, transient girl from Hammond, Ind., near Cisco Jan. 25, and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

Jurors were given the case at approximately 2:45 after arguments of District Criminal Attorney Grady Owen and Defense Coursel Milton Lawrence. They reported at about 4:45 p. m.

Testimony presented by the state the two days was highlighted by that of Mary Kertesz, the transient girl. Her brother, Joe, and companion, Dewel Ball, testified of the negro's holding the trio at pistol point for six hours near the railroad yards in Cisco, Friday,

Testimony of Kertesz, Ball and mitted that if he thought anything of that nature happened he would and his sister were behind brush, notwithstanding the negro's possession of a gun.

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Training May Produce Better Civil Service

One of the quaint American beliefs is that it takes specific and supervised training to be a barber or a plumber, but that anyone at all who can get a certain number of votes or wangle an appointment is competent to administer the affairs of a great city or run a federal or state government bureau.

Whilethere have been occasional cries for better-trained public servants, it has been like the weather-nobody really did anything about it.

Now a beginning is being made toward doing something about it.

Harvard for some years has had a valuable school of business administration. Originally it had been intended as a school of political science and administration. Now, under Harvard's new President Conant, this school is being turned into a school of "public and private business."

It is planned to offer in the new school a thorough training not only for young men who enter private business, but also for those who aim to devote their energies to the sort of great public enterprises that are beginning to grow in importance, projects such as the Tennessee Valley Authority, and public bodies such as the Federal Trade Commission, Securities and Exchange Commission, and a dozen others.

Dean Wallace Brett Donham, who has ably presided over the school while it was training promising young men for private business, is thoroughly in sympathy with the idea that important public business requires just as thor-





"Our attention has been called to the fact," Johnson said, "that many counties have not distributed all of the mattresses which were allocated to them for distribution. These mattresses must be distributed immediately, and if they are not, we will arrange to have them transferred to other counties. Cost of storage, fire and other hazards are secondary causes for this order. Our primary purpose is to get the mattresses


