Plan of U.S. Fathers Confronts Us Anew

Whlie the specialists down at Washington grope about among the wreckage of the NRA to see if any of the pieces can be patched up and used again the rest of us might properly take time out to meditate over the underlying issue which the U.S. Supreme Court's decision brings into

That issue is nothing less than the question, How far can the original American attitued toward the functions of the central government be preserved in the face of mod-

The confusion of thought which resulted in erection of an NRA framework so completely unconstitutional that the court was unanimous in knocking it down comes straight from the fact that we tend to look on the federal government in a light entirely different from that in which its founders viewed it.

The men who founded the American government represented many schools of thought, but they were close to agreement one one point: they distrusted a strong central government as an enemy of democracy.

Their first attempt to found a government left the several states almost independent. The articles of confederation were too loose. It took only a few years of experience to prov that a tighter union was necessary; but even when the existing constitution was framed, the framers took pains to limit the powers of the federal government, and to reserve all possible rights to the states.

Since then the whole structure of society has changed. In place of a predominantly agricultural nation, in which each community was largely self-sufficient, we got a tremendously complex industrial nation with commercial and financial ties that made every section dependent on all the

In the face of that change, there arose a feeling that many problems could be handled properly only by the national government. We long ago discovered, for instance that railroad regulation would fail if left to the states. We seem to be moving toward a similar attitude in regard to





Plan of U.S. Fathers Confronts Us Anew

Whlie the specialists down at Washington grope about among the wreckage of the NRA to see if any of the pieces can be patched up and used again the rest of us might properly take time out to meditate over the underlying issue which the U.S. Supreme Court's decision brings into

That issue is nothing less than the question, How far can the original American attitued toward the functions of the central government be preserved in the face of modern conditions?

The confusion of thought which resulted in erection of an NRA framework so completely unconstitutional that the court was unanimous in knocking it down comes straight from the fact that we tend to look on the federal government in a light entirely different from that in which its founders viewed it.

The men who founded the American government represented many schools of thought, but they were close to agreement one one point: they distrusted a strong central government as an enemy of democracy.

Their first attempt to found a government left the several states almost independent. The articles of confederation were too loose. It took only a few years of experience to prov that a tighter union was necessary; but even when the existing constitution was framed, the framers took pains to limit the powers of the federal government, and to reserve all possible rights to the states.


Since then the whole structure of society has changed. In place of a predominantly agricultural nation, in which each community was largely self-sufficient, we got a tremendously complex industrial nation with commercial and financial ties that made every section dependent on all the



We long ago discovered, for instance that railroad regulation would fail if left to the states. We seem to be moving toward a similar attitude in regard to public utilities.
