HUNDREDS DIE AS A FLOOD HITS CHURCH

SAN PEDRO ACTOPAN, Mex., June 4.—A tremendous cloudburst and flood striking this federal district area on the day of the annual religious festival, left a toll of at least 310 known dead. Many of them are children.

The scene of greatest disaster was at the church where the water caused a collapse and mud and sand were borne on rushing waves over the worshippers.

The United Press correspondent, inspecting the ruins, found hundreds of relatives seeking bodies of the dead.

San Pedro, a village of few more than 1,000 inhabitants was crowded yesterday by visitors from nearby towns who came for the festival.

Part of the entrance to the church collapsed the walls cracked, but the main cause of the disaster was the wall of water that flooded the town and poured into the church, trapping almost everyone inside.

Speeding Into War

Announcement in Berlin of new plans for mechanization of the German army is a reminder that the world may never again see immobile warfare of the kind on view in the last war.

The new German army aims at speed. Motor vehicles are being provided in the unheard-of ratio of two cars for every four infantrymen. Artillery is being motorized; the underlying principle is that the next war will be an affair of rapid movement, with the side which is able to strike the quickest winning an overwhelming advantage.

All of this is an indication that military science once more is getting back to its time-honored fundamentals—which General Forest expressed so aptly with his remark about getting there first with the most men.

The conditions under which the last war was fought were abnormal. Never again, let us hope, will young men be killed by the millions simply because armies are too swollen and cumbersome to do anything but engage in a slugging match.

Battler Norris of Nebraska Ever in the Picture

His amendment broadening the power of the Tennessee Valley Authority to find markets for its products and increasing its bonded power from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 ran the gauntlet of the hostiles in the senate of the United States.

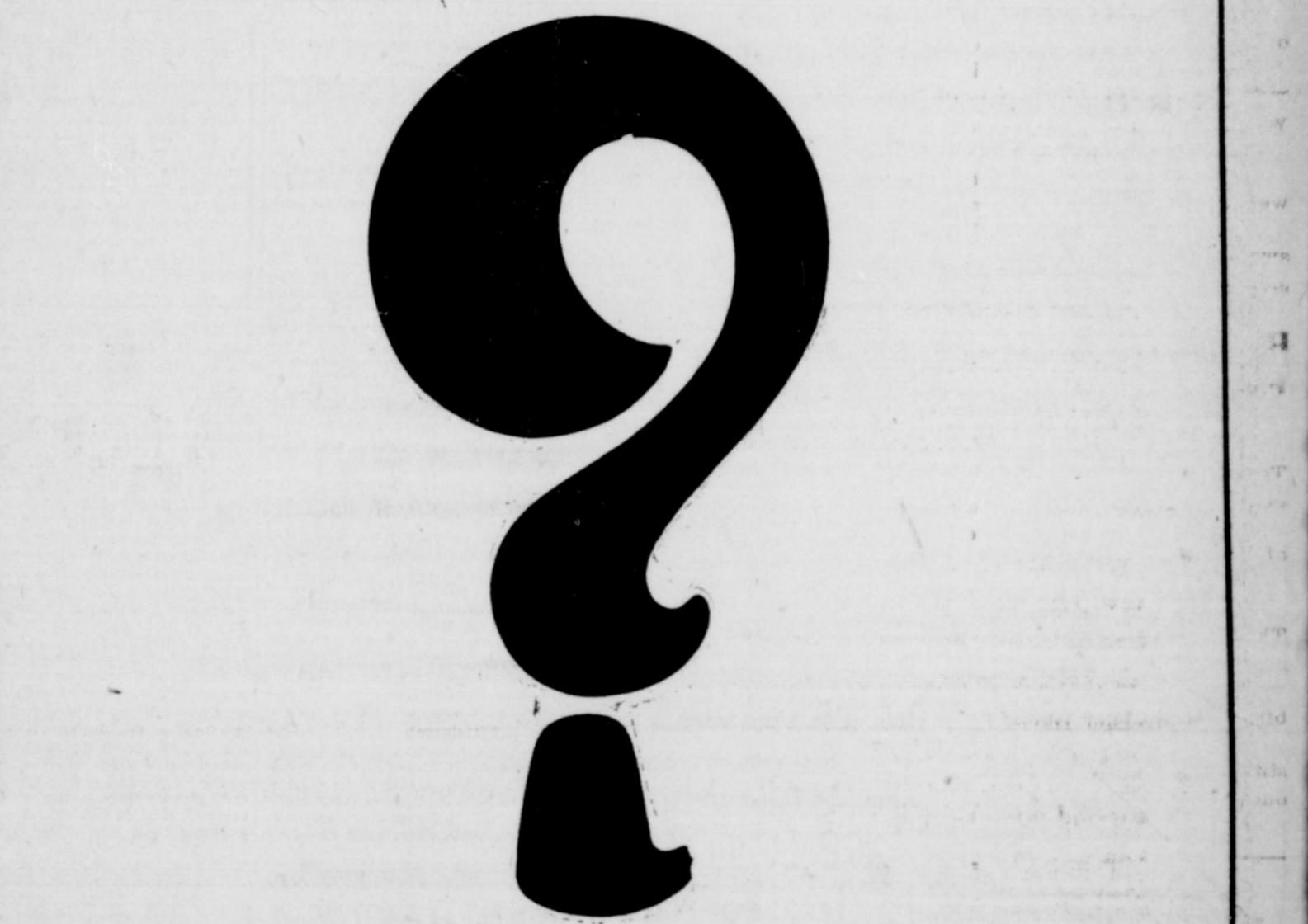
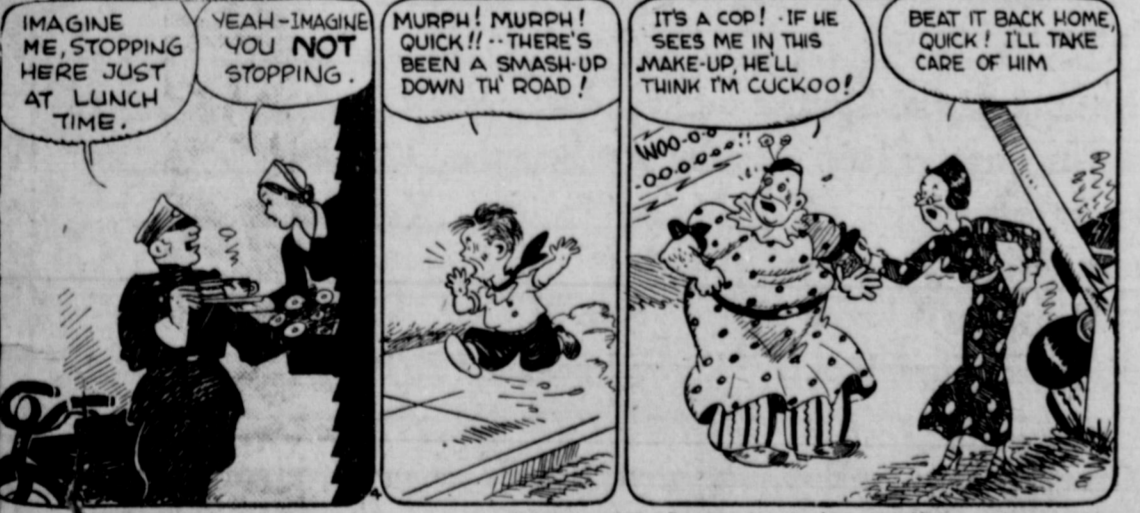

ON TEXAS FARMS

With the help of 20 men, and logs and shingles donated by other citizens, the Arbor community in Pampa has built a relief cannery center at a cash expense of \$16. Six more dollars for materials came from the home demonstration club which initiated the project.

Cash for concrete being scarce and old tin cans plentiful for the picking up, a Williamson county garden demonstrator has put down a hundred feet of tin can subirrigation. It is more work than concrete tile and not permanent, but beats no subirrigation at all, is the report.

Collis Bouldin in Gonzales county has 150 acres of terraces which he allows paid for themselves in one April day when seven inches of rain fell—three and one-half of that within less than one hour. Without the terraces, erosion would have carried off his whole crop as well as the top soil, he says.

Robertson county had terraced 3,805 acres of land in 1935 by the end of April. Relief labor has been used and the commissioners' court furnished machinery at actual cost of operation.

In a county poultry contest in Llano county, first place went to the flock of R. Fishbeck whose flock of 22 hens produced an average of 29 eggs per month per hen. Second place winner was the flock of Robert Boxell, with an average of 28 eggs per month per hen.

ODESSA—More than 5,000 ravens have been captured in an improved type of cage trap during a five weeks' campaign in Ector and Andrews counties, according to H. L. Atkins, county agricultural agent. The cage is made in panels and this panel construction makes the trap easy to take down and move from place to place. Materials for 25 traps built in Andrews county averaged slightly less than \$5 per trap, and it is estimated that they will give at least three years of service.

Dead rabbits or meat scraps are shown for bait. Experience has shown that when a catch is made one or two ravens should be left in the trap to serve as decoys. Feathers of dead ravens should not be left around the trap.
