

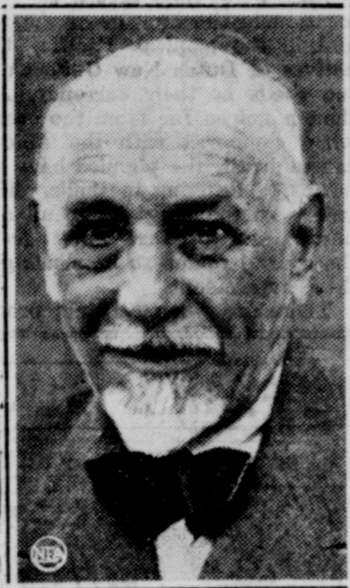

Religious Riots Cloak Grave Deceptions

It is like turning the pages of history back for a quarter of a century to read of the recent anti-Jewish riots in Berlin.

To be sure, outbreaks of anti-Semitism in Germany are no new thing, these days. Perhaps we ought to be case-hardened to them by now. And yet there is something appallingly reminiscent of Czarist Russia at its worst in these accounts of uniformed bands of Nazis roaming the streets, beating men and women, spreading terror and chanting bloodthirsty slogans.

The worst thing about an outbreak of this kind is not its brutality. That is something which this imperfectly civilized human race of ours never entirely succeeds in quelling. We are born to trouble as the sparks fly upward, and getting poked on the nose now and then by our brother man is just one of those things that go with human existence.

What makes a performance of this kind especially dismaying is the fact that it represents a case of self-deception. In order to rouse yourself to the point where you want to go about the streets beating people whose religion or race is not like your own, you have to persuade yourself to believe something which obviously is not so—to wit, that the mere presence of these people in the same community with yourself is somehow a threat to your well-being.

Nor is that all. While you are giving way to this delusion, you may depend on it that off in the background, unseen, someone is getting away with something that he wouldn't get away with it if you were keeping your eyes open.

The programs of the old Czarist government remain the classic example of this sort of thing.

Under the Czars, the people of Russia suffered so many glaring injustices that the danger of revolution was always present. But whenever public sentiment got too dangerous, the government would trot out the old Jewish bogeyman. Riots would be fomented, horrible waves of violence would sweep through ghettos, and in the bood-lust of the pogrom the people would forget how the ruling class was victimizing the entire country.

That is the sort of thing these anti-Semitic riots in Germany call to mind. By giving way to them, the people of Germany are blinding their eyes to more important issues. They are enabling their government to flim-flam them on matters of vital concern.

There is one more point. In the long course of human history one rule seems to hold good; a government which rules by terror perishes, sooner or later, in the same way. A government which foments pogroms and mass brutality is running up a deadful bill which someone, some day, will have to pay.

velopment. "It is a formalized and polio vaccine," Dr. Brodie said, explaining its difference from other attempts to immunize against the dreaded infantile paralysis. The organisms—polio virus—are "killed" and preserved in formalin, making the vaccine. Scientists have tried for 25 years to find some way to fight the disease. They have attempted to use active virus in a serum instead of "killing" them. Several Pioneers in Field Dr. Sam Flexner, director of Rockefeller Institute, was one of the pioneers. Others were the late Dr. H. L. Abramson, Dr. H. Gerber and Dr. Sidney Kramer, all of New York City, and Dr. John Albert Kolmer of Philadelphia. When Dr. Brodie's new method became known he was brought here to develop it. He and Dr. Park have worked day and night to perfect the vaccine. With the call for help from North Carolina production was speeded. The normal demand of 25 or 30 of the Rhesus monkeys a week was advanced to 100 and 150. They are inoculated with the disease germs, and as they go into the last stages they are chloroformed and killed. Their spinal cords are ground up in the formalin for vaccine. Monkeys Become Paralyzed There is no scampering and playful gibbering in the cages of the tiny monkey house. Occasionally there is a whimpering and excited scolding as a monkey discovers his legs have become useless. Keepers know then that the injection has taken effect—generally five to seven days. After that it is any day until the monkey becomes completely paralyzed. The monkey drags around with his arms until they too become afflicted. He writhes and whimpers piteously until he is able only to move his eyelids. Attendants then take the animal, pile it with similarly paralyzed brothers and rush them to the operating room. Chloroform, a merciful knife into the heart and the monkey is dead. Quick hands of surgeons cut through the body and if the monkey had no contributory disease the spinal cord is removed.

Pigmies Put End To Inflation By Destroying Money

WASHINGTON.—It doesn't make much difference what you use for money if there isn't very much of it, Matthew Stirling, Smithsonian Institution anthropologist, found on a trip to Dutch New Guinea. He told of taking a supply of little marine shells into the interior of that isolated island which he invaded to study the primitive pigmies so he could use the shells for money—and then having to take them all out again to prevent inflation. Because of their almost isolated location in the interior of the island and in the tropical Pacific, the natives of Dutch New Guinea use sea shells as their currency. Although not so far from the ocean when compared with the American midwest, the pigmies have no means of bringing in shells. The tribes surrounding them all are hostile and also are away from the coastal region so no shells get there by accident. Therefore when Stirling, previ-

ously informed of the desirability of shells to use in exchanges, arrived from the coast with a supply of shells, he was a capitalist of importance. At first the natives were puzzled. When they learned he was leaving shortly, they solved the problem of potential inflation by asking him to take his shells along when he left. He did and the threat of inflation was dumped in a river bottom some miles away. Stirling said that these primitive peoples were prohibitionists, drinking only water. That is an interesting sidelight to throw into the arguments on how dry (or wet) we should be. Among these Negroid pigmies, who the anthropologist said ranked first among the peoples in the world "uncivilized" by contact with other civilizations and therefore are really in a "sterile culture" stage, Stirling found less individualism than among more civilized folk. For example, he found that a murderer was no more responsible for his crime than the other members of his family. The responsibility rests with the group and they may suffer unless some acceptable compensation is made, the groups engaging in a fight which resembles the old time Kentucky feuds. In an exceptional case, Stirling reported the repeatedly offered native might be killed by his relatives in an attempt to avenge the general peace. This course, was rare and was only as the last resort after repeated crimes. An unusual custom among pigmies was to cut off one of left fingers when a woman marries. If she remarries, off another finger. And so on a five-husband wife didn't anything but a stump on her hand. Naturally remarriages seldom went that far.

Russian Girls Wed Only For Love

TORONTO, Ont.—Russian girls marry only for love, Gregory Elansky, president of Intourist Inc., the Soviet department charge of tourist traffic, said here. "Women do not have to marry simply because they can not get a job at anything else in Russia," Elansky said. "Unemployment does not force a girl into marriage. Russia. Women are free to do as they see fit. They can get a job in the State at self-supporting wages, and on exactly the same economic footing as men."

Vaccine To Conquer Infantile Paralysis Faces Final Proof

NEW YORK.—The scourge of infantile paralysis at last may be under control of science. In the New York City laboratories Rhesus monkeys are being killed at the rate of 500 a month in the manufacture of a vaccine which was tested in the Los Angeles epidemic of last summer and is being used in the current North Carolina epidemic. If the North Carolina tests are extensive enough it may be conclusive proof for the vaccine. None of the 2,000 children vaccinated in California contracted the disease, nor have any of the 500 similarly treated in New York and New Jersey. More than 500 doses were sent to North Carolina within 10 days after the outbreak there. It requires thousands of tests in infected areas to be certain the vaccine immunizes, Dr. Maurice Brodie, discoverer of the new preventive, explained. He has been working with Dr. William H. Park in the laboratories here for two years developing the discovery he made while a professor at McGill University in Montreal, Canada. Warm Springs Fund Aids Funds from the Warm Springs Foundation, in which President Roosevelt is interested, have helped carry on the research and de-

**R.F.C. Approves Irrigation Loans**

MISSION, Tex.—Loans and grants totaling \$1,346,000, were approved recently for Hidalgo County Water Control and Improvement District No. 7, the Alton district north of Mission, by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and the Federal Public Works Administration.

A check for \$790,000 was received by a local bank, district depository, climaxing two years of negotiations with a view to improving the district's financial status. The money will be used to refinance outstanding bonded indebtedness of \$1,350,000.

Thirty percent of the loan is to be a direct grant, 70 per cent with interest to be repaid.

The Mission district is the third in the Lower Rio Grande Valley to receive financial assistance from the two chief governmental financing agencies.

Actual construction of concrete lined canals will start within the next few days for the Donna district, while the Englemann Gardens district has received approval of funds for extension of its canals to serve an additional 1,600 acres.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Farmers' short course at A. and M. College last week is the attraction which will cause about 5,000 bags to be packed this weekend.

"The Changing Country Life" is the theme around which all the short course programs and demonstrations have been built. Ox-cart ideas do not keep up with the procession in an automobile age whether in town or country. So it is well to recognize that country life is changing.

Science has made available a great range of information valuable to rural citizens in making more profitable use of the raw materials grown by them.

Wood or wool, cotton or corn, hides and what not have possibilities for home use to add to the comforts and conveniences of life in these days of small electrically equipped shops and reviving interest in skills.

Also science has revealed the fact that homemakers aren't just "lucky with the canning" so much as they follow sound methods of preservation.

The Farmers' Short Course undertakes by demonstrations to make the riches of science available to all who come.

BALLINGER—One hundred per cent cooperation on any soil conservation program for Rannels county was pledged at a recent meeting of 100 farmers, landowners and business men held in Ballinger, according to Elmo V. Cook, county agricultural agent. Five hundred and fifty acres were signed for terracing immediately and many pledged to cooperate in the program as soon as they have land available for terracing.

PEARSALL—"I planted 39 acres of a good variety of corn this year and 10 acres to a cheap variety, and any two acres of my good corn will make as much as the entire 10 acres of cheaper corn," Julius Mann, Frio county farmer, told N. H. Hunt, county agricultural agent. Mann added that he was sorry he had planted the cheap corn, and that hereafter it will be good seed for him, not only for corn, but also for all other crops.

JOHNSON CITY.—Thirty-one hides have been tanned into leather during the past year by Heinz Ulrich of Blanco county, according to C. E. Tisdale, county agricultural agent. Ulrich has 18 more hides on hand to tan just as soon as he has time. He received his training at a leather tanning course given at the A. and M. Short Course in 1934 and plans to take an advanced course this summer in the manufacture of articles from leather tanned at home.

GOZALES—Two thousand out ant towns in the Nickle community in Gonzales county were

completely exterminated in a community-wide demonstration conducted by J. M. Saunders, county agricultural agent, with the assistance of R. R. Reppert, extension entomologist. The estimated value of this work was between eight and ten thousand dollars, according to community leaders who assisted in working up the drive which covered approximately 5000 acres. This estimate was based on damage done.

EDINBURG—A ventilated pantry in which the cans are never moist but are always cool is a valuable feature of the new kitchen belonging to Mrs. Tommie Hughes, a cooper in the Lone Star Home Demonstration club at Edouch in Hidalgo county, according to Miss Mattie Wilroy, home demonstration agent.

In the ceiling and in the floor of the pantry there are holes 22 by 9 inches over which is tacked a 16 mesh screen to prevent insects from coming in but to allow the air to pass through at all times. Shelves in the pantry are made from 3 1/2 inch planks and there is 3-4 inch of space between them that allows the air to pass between them at all times. The pantry will store approximately 650 containers and at present Mrs. Hughes has 450 in the pantry.

Retail Sales in June Are Better Than Last Year

AUSTIN.—Retail dollar sales during June showed a moderate increase over the like last year and the decline in May to June was somewhat less than the average decline in the last eight years between the months, according to the University of Business Research at the University of Texas.

"Reports from 93 department and specialty stores indicate an average increase in dollar volume during June of 4.4 per cent over June a year ago but a 12.1 per cent from the previous month," the Bureau's statement said. "The average decline in sales during the first six months of the year averaged 1.5 per cent above those of the corresponding period last year."

"The different types of goods varied considerably in response to the two comparable periods. Clothing stores made the most showing followed in order by men's specialty shops, large department stores, small department stores and dry goods stores.
