Ground in Texas Pacific Wheat to be

AUSTIN—Approximately a million bushels of wheat from the Pacific Northwest will be converted into flour by Texas millers according to an agreement between the millers and C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department of the Texas Relief commission, acting as agent for the Federal Surplus Relief corporation.

Some 30 milling houses in Texas will grind the wheat on a toll basis, receiving all the offal, irrespective of present or future prices, as payment for the work. Milled flour will be delivered to the Texas Relief commission in 12-pound paper bags and 24-pound cotton sacks for distribution to relief families in the state.

Central West Texas Oil Field

RISING STAR, July 29.—Activity in the old Morgan pool, town, comes to life with the spud-about eight miles northwest of a new well on the L. J. Griggs farm. The same firm is rigging up for another well on the Bud Gage farm, about one mile east of their Griggs location.

The well on the Griggs place in near the Griggs No. 1, brought in some seven years ago when first pool was started in the Morgan pool. The well is said to be still producing about 15 barrels daily. Depth of the wells is about 3100 feet and the oil is of high gravity.

The operators have quite a bit of land under lease in the vicinity of the new wells and will likely drill a number of holes.

Machine Miner Wades Through Hills of Coal

CADIZ, O.—Employing electricity as its power and using the intelligence of four men for "brains," a 1,600-ton shovel bites through hilly land at Apex, near here, and uncovers coal beds in a few hours that would take days to accomplish by construction of drift mines.

The enormous electric shovel is one of five such monsters in the world. The others are operated in Kansas and Illinois. The shovel is "fed" by a rubber-covered, movable cable that carries 3,450 volts of electricity to its half dozen huge motors. Four men are needed to operate the digger. Each has a different job to perform.

Shovels built to dig the Panama canal were considered giants in their day, but they would be mere pygmies beside this mammoth machine, which towers more than 100 feet skyward. The huge excavator is one of the largest single pieces of mobile machinery ever manufactured in the world.

Under favorable conditions, the shovel will cut into a hillside and remove a swath 40 feet deep, 60 feet long and 80 feet wide every eight hours. The only preparation preceding the digging is the blasting of heavy rock.

The boom on this modern miner is 97.5 feet in length, and the dipper handle is 64 feet long. The dipper, which has a 29 cubic-yard capacity, easily would hold a large automobile.

Far North Kind To Map Maker

WINNIPEG, Man.—T. H. Manning, 23-year-old Fellow of Great Britain's Royal Geographic society, is returning to his home in Northampton, England, after spending two years alone on lonely Southampton Island, on Hudson's bay, without encountering a single adventure.

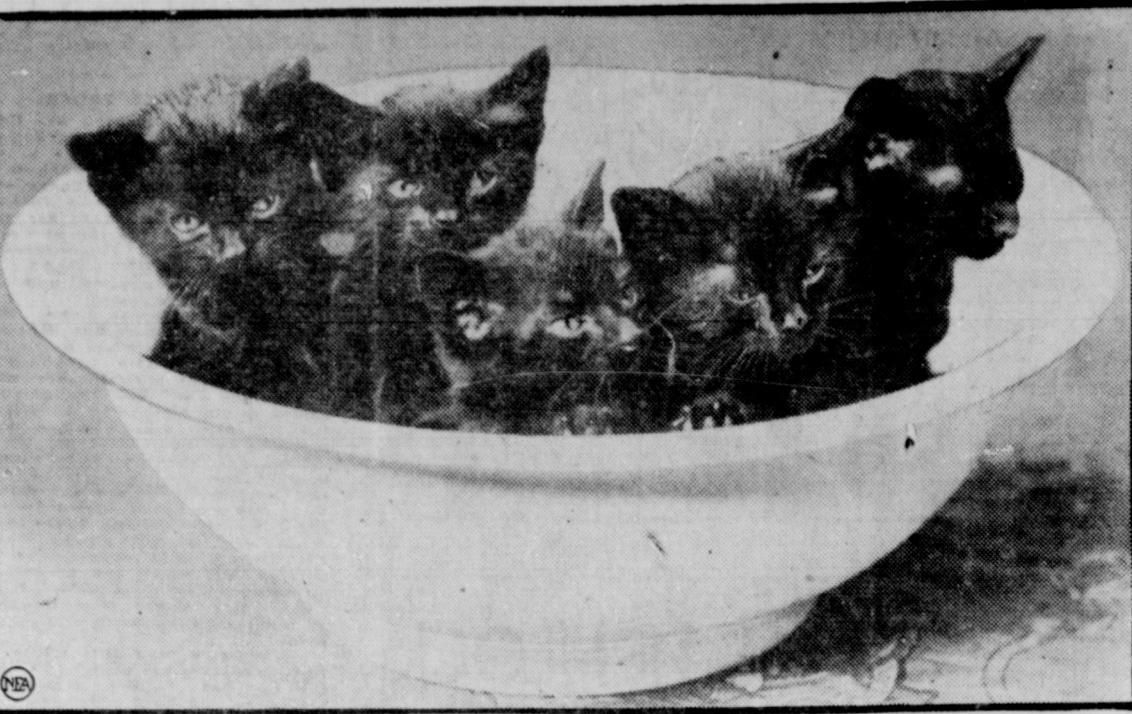
Manning was commissioned by the British Museum in 1933 to study birds, and by the Royal Geographic society to map the island, which lies 500 miles north of Churchill, Man.

most extensive gas system in the United States. The system serves almost 300 towns in Texas and Southern Oklahoma, covering an area several times the size of an average state.

Mr. May succeeds the late James B. McCabe, who was president and general manager of the Municipal Gas company. The Municipal Gas company is a pioneer in the gas distribution business in the Southwest, having been organized about 1909.
