Texas has 1,200,000 qualified voters. Texas has prohibition in its constitution. Texas has the drastic Dean law or enforcement act. Texas voters declared two years ago for the repeal of the 18th amendment. Texans by their ballots legalized the sale of beer. There is an election coming on constitutional amendments Aug. 24. 
