He might have had a longer wait, but Linden's Hiram Strutton was knocked out a few plays earlier and the ambulance was already on the way to the stadium when Dillard was hurt. "Luke Thornton, the Eagles"

coach, said Dillard's leg wasn't set until Monday. The big junior "knocked out" at the hospital for the return trip to a Dallas hospital.

"He was blocking a boy headon when he got hurt," Thornton said, 'I saw him make the block and saw him fall, but I just don't know how he broke that leg-so bad.

"Dillard was injured on the second-period kickoff following Linden's first touchdown. Strutton's injury came just nine plays before that. By the time the ambulance arrived, still another Linden gridder was tagged as a passenger for the trip to the hospital.
