all other enrollment requirements, it was announced this week by Neal Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas, following instructions received from the Department of Labor in Washington.

Heretofore, unattached transients have not been allowed to participate in the Conservation program," said Guy, "but the new work program under the Relief Appropriation Act of 1935 is intended to provide employment for all those on public relief rolls. Therefore, if a young unattached Texas transient is a member of a relief roll family, he may become enrolled in the Conservation Corps. He must be enrolled in his home county, but is not sent home from the transient camp until AFTER all arrangements for his enrollment have been made."

The new ruling on transients coincides with another new provision that all members of the Civilian Conservation Corps must be members of relief roll families. In the past, as many relief boys as possible were enrolled first, after which boys from borderline families were enrolled to fill the quota. This latter group numbered approximately 20 per cent of the total enrollment. Under the new provision, for every boy enrolled, a family will be removed from the relief rolls, as the enrollee's salary is sent to his family.

Texas' quota for the next enrollment, to take place between July 15 and August 31, is 12,780. This will mean the removal of the same number of families from the relief rolls, affecting approximately 50,000 individuals.

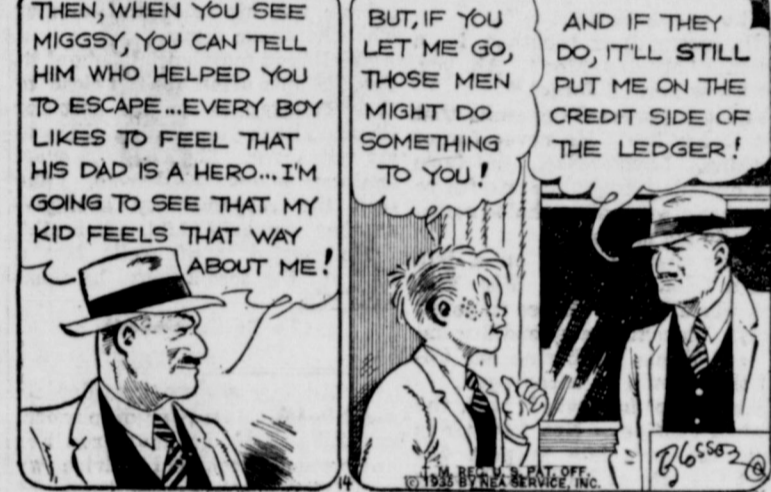

Dusting the Covers of Texas History

For the Texas Centennial Celebrations of 1936. Let us assemble at Houston on Buffalo Bayou! A congressman anxious to begin his official duties voices his opinion about the seat of location of the government. The senate committee has reported favorable for Groce's Retreat (San Jacinto), the chairman said. "Naegedoches has been recommended by the house," the House chairman said in a defiant tone. Requests were read from Washington and Hidalgo that the government be located in their communities. Fort Bend citizens wrote that if there were not sufficient houses for the legislators, land would be donated to the great cause. Earnest debating ensued, and when the vote was finally taken, Houston on Buffalo Bayou had the majority of votes. The President was given authority to erect a building for the temporary accommodation of congress, and other suitable buildings, but the cost was not to exceed \$15,000—a much too inadequate sum, as they found out later. Dr. Anson Jones was disgusted with the selection of Houston. "A sell-out to a few individuals," he said. According to the Telegraph and Texas Register, no better spot could have been selected than Houston. It had a sawmill; there were more than enough rooms! Not one solitary building marked the townsites when the government was moved there. Not a lot had been sold until January, 1917, and when the President and his helpers arrived in April, coldness and wide space greeted them. The \$15,000 set aside for the buildings had not been available because the government did not have that much money available. Hastily shacks were built. The Telegraph revealed one of the first finished shacks. A. C. and J. K. Allen had built a one-story building covering an entire block on Main street, for the official building. At one corner was the Senate chamber and on the other was the Hall of Representatives. Departmental offices were in between the two main rooms. A coast storm blew up the night of May 9, and when congress assembled the next morning for their first session, owing to the "insufficiency of the building, the floor being flooded with water, and the hall unfit for transaction of business, on motion congress was adjourned until 10 o'clock the next day." What a contrast the first regular capitol presents to our granite structure that is second largest in the United States. Texas will proudly invite Centennial visitors in 1936 to examine its present capitol, and patriotic Texans will remember the story of the first capitol.

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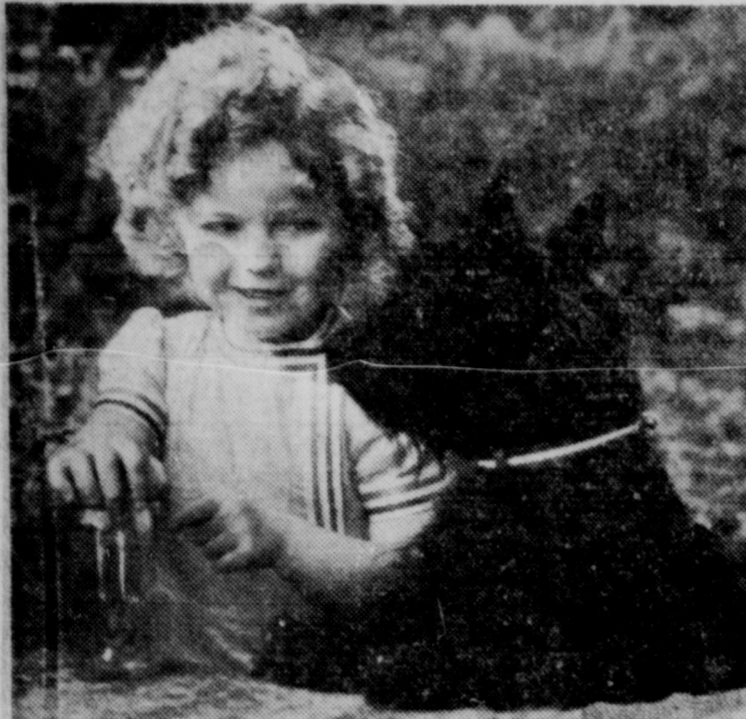
