## All-Time Record Peanut Crop Expected To Gross \$5 Million

Eastland County's 1966 peanut crop is about 80 per cent harvested, and it looks like it's going to be the biggest crop in the history of the county, officials report.

Estimated gross income for the present harvest is expected to top five million dollars, ASCS Manager Gilbert Meredith reports.

Harvest has been good because of exceptionally favorable weather and is believed to be some three weeks ahead of schedule.

"In the peanut patch" has been the location given for most county farmers and the workers for weeks as raisers take advantage of the fine maturing weather.

County peanut production could top 55 million pounds, estimates indicate.

Yield this year is topping even the most conservative estimates: going as high as 48 bushels per acre. The estimated yield for 1966 is 1,740 pounds per acre, with some 32,000 acres planted.

The average yield for the five year period between 1961 and 1965 was 608 pounds per acre, or 20.3 bushels per acre.

Last year's yield was 757 pounds and 25.2 bushels per acre.

And although irrigation is certainly getting its credit in the county, the artificial watering hasn't been a major factor this year because natural watering in good rains has benefited the dry-land farmer just as much.

There's an estimated 135 irrigated farms in the county this year, and this figure is expected to double in 1967, Meredith says.

The present estimates are based on already returned marketing cards, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service reports.

The 1966 peanut acreage allotment data reported recently by the Southwestern Peanut Grocers Association lists Eastland County thusly: 971 farms with 38,295.1 acres allocated.

Neighboring Comanche County is credited with 1,383 farms and 59,354.0 acres allocated.

Production in Eastland County since 1960 has been like this:

1960 — 15,000,000 pounds.  
1961 — 16,000,000 pounds.  
1962 — 16,485,000 pounds.  
1963 — 15,474,000 pounds.  
1964 — 14,080,000 pounds.  
1965 — 23,984,000 pounds.  
1966 — 55,680,000 pounds (estimated).

Obviously, no one complains about a bumper crop, but other data should be considered, least the idea be taken that the farmer, in this county or anywhere, is "rolling in money."

The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently released information which indicates that it costs a lot to produce a lot.

"Out of every dollar of gross farm income in 1965, about 70 cents went for production expenses. Agriculture is a vast employer and purchaser of goods, service and equipment; many jobs in urban areas depend on farming," the USDA statement states.

### LAGGING WORKERS SOUGHT AS UF DRIVE STANDS AT 75%

Eastland United Fund Drive Chairman J. T. Carter has issued a "last round-up" call to workers to report in their cards and envelopes, in order to bring the drive to a conclusion.

"We've still got several workers unreported, and undoubtedly these are oversights, and should be turned in soon, so we can close the campaign," Carter said.

The 1966 drive is three-quarters finished, he said, with \$5,435.27 of the \$7,400 goal in. UF Treasurer James Reid reports that the amount in, equals 75 and one-half per cent of the total.

It had been hoped to conclude the campaign by Nov. 1, but due to the slowness of some drive workers in reporting their envelopes, the campaign has extended.

"Sunday is the 13th," Carter said, "and we must finish this campaign with a 100 per cent victory by no later than the 15th, so we're especially urging that volunteers report in their envelopes to me or to Mr. Reid Monday or Tuesday."

Eastland has a record of always attaining their United Fund goal, and with so many agencies benefiting this year, the UF officials are especially hopeful for a complete victory.

Bulbs should be planted to- gether in large masses. Some of the small bulbs, crocus and hyacinth for instance, need to be planted in groups of 25 to 50 in order to make a good display.

Daffodils should be planted about 6 inches deep and from 6 to 8 inches apart. Set hyacinths about 3 inches deep and 6 to 8 inches apart. The small jonquil types are spaced 3 to 4 inches deep and spaced 4 inches apart. Crocus are planted 4 inches deep and 2 to 4 inches apart. The planting depths just mentioned are to the top of the bulb.

# State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Addition of kindergarten to the public school will be a major school proposal in the 1967 session of the Legislature.

State Board of Education has recommended it. Texas State Teachers Association feels it is vital to public education, and will support the board's position.

Expanding the public school system to 13 grades is advocated by educators on the ground that children learn more quickly at age 5, and simply because more education is needed for this complicated world. It would, of course, increase the cost of public schools by one-twelfth, at both state and local levels.

School teachers will press for a pay raise to lift Texas salary levels to the national average, but will let the Board of Education carry the ball on the kindergarten proposal.

"Imagination: Dare to Use It" will be the theme of the second annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference November 22 in Austin. Gov. Connally will head the participants.

Experts in various fields of tourist development and tourist promotion will meet with delegates to the conference, along with administrators of Six Flags over Texas and San Antonio's HemisFair '68.

State Board of Education will urge the Legislature to take action toward equalizing land values among all 254 Texas counties for property tax purposes.

Values now vary from five to 100 per cent of what the property actually sells for, according to Board member Paul Greenwood of Harlingen. Greenwood had unsuccessfully sought to substitute assessed valuation for the complex "economic index"

used to figure local fund assignments of minimum foundation school program costs.

In separate action with implications for many districts, the board held that the Rio Hondo Schools cannot withhold report card and transcripts from students who do not pay special fees.

Board ordered Texas Education Agency to make a study to find out just what fees districts are charging students for such things as locker services, towel and soap in physical training classes.

Last year's price of \$647,516,534 for the minimum operation of Texas public schools set a record, but State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar says the "minimum foundation fund" will be even greater this year—\$667,857,000.

Fund, which is distributed according to the needs of the school district and its average daily attendance, draws its resources from two state sources: the available school fund, including a fourth of all occupation taxes by the state, and other state revenues.

Of last year's total, \$123,439,886 was furnished by the school districts themselves, and the rest by the state. Figures do not include federal aid.

## County Momentos To Be Distributed At Meeting

Mike Collins, chairman of Eastland County's Historical Society, has announced plans for the Society to distribute county momentos at the Texas State Historical Survey Committee convention in Fort Worth on Dec. 1, 2 and 3.

This souvenir packet will contain Old Rip postcards from the Eastland Chamber of Commerce; small bags of roasted peanuts furnished by Gene Baker of the Gorman Progress; an 18 x 15 glossy-finish map of Lake Leon and surrounding area, furnished by the County Water Board; a brochure from Ranger Chamber of Commerce, Rising Star Chamber of Commerce, Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College.

At a meeting in the Courthouse Thursday afternoon, the committee approved a project of gathering historical momentos. Plans call for six items: the official documents of incorporation for the county, which are dated 1873; patterns of barbed wire used in the early days of the county; relics of the oil boom of 1917-21; early day tools; and pictures and pieces of the original courthouse, which was a stone and log building at Merriman, three miles south of Ranger.

Delegates to the State Convention in December will be Collins; Berry Greenwood of Carbon; Lee White of Rising Star; Mrs. Alex Spears of Cisco; and Mrs. Arthur Murrell of Eastland.

Greenwood, who has started a collection of barbed wire used in the early days of the county, would like to contact persons in this area who have specimens of such wire. He said lengths of wire need not be more than two feet. Greenwood may be reached at Box 662, Carbon, Texas.

He already has varieties of wire from his own ranchland, south of Carbon, which he is mounting in a shadow box frame to be placed in the lobby of the Eastland County Courthouse. Greenwood's ranchland was an original, pre-1867 grant to his great-grandfather, Joseph Rubarth, a German immigrant who is reported to have been a veteran of the Battle of Waterloo in 1815 and the Battle of San Jacinto in 1836.

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# THE GORDON SPOT

Our recent cold weather stopped the growth of most warm season plants. It looks like fall now. If you haven't driven through the county during the last week I would advise you to take a drive and see the beautiful fall colors in the trees and grass.

Excellent cover of grass. Some people have told me they have had better grass going into the winter than they have this year. This grass is dry now and fires could easily destroy the growth in a few minutes. Grass fires could be a big problem this winter. Every precaution should be taken to protect this good grass cover.

Fire guards along public roadways could save some valuable grass from being burned. If you have large power sprayers you could keep them filled with water for emergency grass fire fighting. However precautions would have to be taken to keep these tanks from freezing in cold weather. If you don't have a sprayer you might keep a supply of sacks and water cans handy for fire fighting.

A report from Oklahoma indicates that they have had

good success by using a mixture of liquid fertilizer and water. The fire fighting solution is composed of 1 part of 11-37-10 liquid fertilizer 5 parts water. The cost for 125 gallons of solution is \$11.00. This is enough material to treat a buffer strip 20 feet wide and 1,000 feet long. The fertilizer solution will not lower the freezing point but about eight degrees. If you should try this fire fighting method let me know your results.

Another thing we should watch for after a frost is grass poisoning. When the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson grass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and a hazard to grazing livestock. Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants, and are responsible for the prussic acid development. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Frosted Johnson grass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay or for at least a week after the frost. If it is ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately provided adequate curing time is allowed.
