Actually there aren'tmany Martins in this area-but that's because there aren't enough accomodations. Theory is, according to Johnson Smith and Saul Pullman, that if enough such houses were constructed and erected around town, that the Martin "scouts" would find the houses, report them, and bring their tribes here for the summer. And the avid birdwatchers report that single Martin can devour up to 2,000 mosquitoes a day - and they have no adverse characteristics, the two say. Smith has a house "at work" in his yard, and this one was built by Pullman shortly before reporting for duty with the Army. It's a project that has been carried out successfully in other cities. And if you inquire about plans and /or details, you may be drawn into a dissertation on the "Silent Spring" and the ideal situation in which nature balances itself for control without the use of insecticides


