Plans Complete For Tuesday Scout Banquet In Eastland

Approximately 140 persons are expected to attend the annual Northeast District Scout Recognition Banquet in Eastland Tuesday evening, it is reported.

The event, which recognizes Scout leaders from Comanche, Erath, Eastland and Stephens Counties, will be held at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria, beginning at 7:30 p. m. Tickets are 1.75 each and may be secured from Scout officials, but will not be available at the door, local scout executive Roland McFarland reports.

Tickets may be secured in Eastland from McFarland, A. D. Taylor, in Cisco, from Lloyd McGrew; in Ranger, from Bill Bollings; and in Rising Star, from H. McDonald.

Dr. Nathan Cedars of Stephenville, District Chairman, will be master of ceremonies, and the invocation will be given by the Rev. Huston Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Eastland.

Eastland Scout Troop 6, Winston Boles, Scoutmaster, will be in charge of the opening ceremonies, which will include a flag presentation.

The recognition portion of the program, following the meal, will be in three parts: 1. Round-Up Program reports, for those units which have met their current goals. 2. Unit Tenure in the district: recognition of each unit represented by length of time in existence.

(Oldest units in the district include Troop 6, Eastland, 32 years; Troop 17, Breckenridge, 37 years; Troop 101, Cisco, 38 years; and Troop 103, Eastland, 39 years. Ray Pryor is a Scoutmaster of Troop 103.

Carbon Loses Bi-District Tilt Powerful Sidney, 60-34

The Sidney Eagles put together a 40-point second half in Comanche Friday night to wrest the bi-district Six-Man title from the Carbon Wolverines, 60-34.

After trailing 18-14 at halftime, the Carbon boys came out to make a game of it and scored in the first 50 seconds, taking a 22-18 lead on a 52-yard pass from senior full-back Ronnie Hughes to junior end Herbert Casey.

The lead was short-lived however, as Nicky Pruitt paced the Eagles to the decisive win the next 23 minutes. Sidney will play Novice for regional crown at 7:30 p. m. Friday at Coleman.

Pruitt, a 130-pound junior with nerves of steel, scored three touchdowns and passed for three more, rushing for more yardage than the entire Carbon team.

Leading Carbon's losing cause was senior blocker Hughes who counted 18 of the Wolverines' points on TD runs of 56, one and five yards. He also fired two scoring passes and had touchdown runs of 56 and 35 yards nullified by penalties.

Hughes and senior Alvie Allison, who booted two extra points, were the main reasons Carbon topped the Eagles, 24-26, earlier in the year. Casey got Carbon's other 12 points on beautiful receptions of two tosses — the 52-yarder from Hughes and an 11-yarder from Allison.

Hughes ended the night with 176 yards on 17 carries; Allison was 10 for 61.

LIGHTING CONTEST RULES ANNOUNCED

Outdoor decorating of homes during the Christmas season lends beauty to a community and also gives individuals an opportunity to express themselves in a tangible, artistic manner. For this reason, Civic League and Garden Club is again sponsoring the annual Christmas Lighting Contest in Eastland.

Mrs. Jack Arrington, chairman of the contest committee, has announced the following rules:

Eligible to enter the contest and they may enter one area or all four areas. Texas Electric employees are not eligible to win a prize given by the company, but may compete in any other area.

These areas are: Yard decorations; prize, a yard light by Texas Electric Service Company; Doorway; prize from Poe Floral; Window prize from the Green Street Floral; and over all decorative theme; prize from Civic League.

All judging will be done from outside the home; no inside decorations will be considered except those which may be seen from outside, such as the window contest.

Entry blanks, which may be secured from KFRC radio station, the Eastland Telegram, or Arrington Funeral Home, must be returned to Mrs. Arrington before Wednesday, December 14.

Lights should be left on between 6:30 p. m. and 10 p. m. nightly December 18 through December 24. Judging will be during this period of time.

Mrs. Arrington offers the following points to be considered: "First, remember that it's what you do with what you have that counts. Look at your house or area to be decorated and decide what needs to be emphasized or concealed. The decorations should make a pleasing overall composition.

"Select a theme and place the focal point so that it relates to the everyday activity of the household. It should not interfere with entering and leaving, for example.

"Dramatize your theme with strong illumination, color, contrast, style, and size in relationship to other elements. Try to have the focal point so outstanding that other items do not compete with it.

"The judging will be based upon artistic merit (design, composition and arrangement of elements, and color scheme); lighting techniques (use of regular Christmas lights, spot and flood lights, and other lights such as reflector, etc.)

"Originality (new ideas or effects, new ways of using standard devices such as candles, wreaths and so on.)

"And ingenuity (in using structure of house and surroundings to the best advantage.)

"The Civic League feels that this contest is of great importance to our community and we hope that you will want to be a part of it."

Eastland County Pecan Growers Association met in Cisco Chamber of Commerce building last Tuesday. The meeting was called by the president, A. D. Ellington of Cisco. 1966 pecan show was held in the meeting. All point to a very successful show in Rising Star year. The pecan show in the youth building Rising Star on Dec. 9 and from 130 to 150 pecans are expected for the show.

One of the main purposes of the meeting Tuesday night was to elect officers for 1967. Cooper of Eastland was elected president for the new A. D. Ellington automatically steps down from president to vice-president. C. Smith of Rising Star was elected treasurer and DeGor was elected secretary. New directors were elected to two year terms. New directors are Oscar Miller of Sabanno and W. Center of Rising Star.

As Eastland meeting in Wacripplev. 18 where provisions Regene Cotton Research and is the motion Act were explained.

From meeting was one of sessions being held over the state, the Texas Agriculture Extension Service to present additional information on the referendum.

Box, Extension agent from Texas A&M University, explained to the growers that Congress passed Cotton Research and Promotion Act earlier in the year. It provides for a cotton research and promotion program in which would be financed by a \$1 a bale uniform assessment on cotton growers.

The \$1 a bale check-off will not, of course, go into effect unless it is approved by the growers in the coming referendum. The referendum is simply a vote, where cotton growers can accept or reject the proposal.

The Act makes special provision for any cotton producer who does not want to participate in the research and promotion program. A grower could obtain a refund of the \$1 bale assessment by making application within 90 days from the date of ginning.

Dr. James Kirby, Extension marketing and policy economist at A&M, told the group about 70 million was spent last year for promotion of man-made fibers. That compares to \$4 million spent to promote cotton.

Kirby said research expenditures by the man-made fiber industry last year were \$135 million compared with total cotton research funds of just over 26 million.

Kirby said those who oppose the Research and Promotion Act say legislation which forces cotton handlers to deduct the one dollar per bale is a potential dangerous policy and encroaches on the farmers freedom of choice.

He said those who support the act point out the farmer can get a full refund of the dollar per bale if he does not want to support the program. Supporters say this provides the farmer with a choice.

Kirby said those who oppose the act contend it gives too much authority to the secretary of agriculture. He said those who support it say the Secretary's authority is much less than under some 30 other marketing programs presently involved in research and promotions.

This year's Thanksgiving meal for a family of four based on October prices in Washington, D. C. super markets, cost \$5.43. The Thanksgiving meal last year cost the homemaker \$5.08. Of course, many of you had far bigger and more elaborate Thanksgiving feasts and you no doubt paid extra dollars and

cents for the usual array of food. But the price of the Thanksgiving turkey has declined over the years and this has been the key force holding the price line on your total dinner costs. The turkey price drop has been due to major break throughs in turkey breeding and turkey raising techniques in the United States.

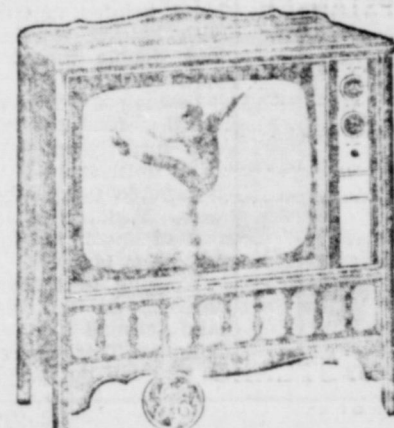

Betty Parks Shares Tips for Tote Bag Gifts

Directions for making Tasseled Tote Bag:

Select a favorite color scheme and design. Simply work out patterns, color and texture combinations, as you go along, if you like. Materials: Upholstery fabric, one piece 18" by 34". Lining fabric, one piece 13" by 23". Two empty spools, with labels removed. Knitting worsted (1 oz.) in two different colors. Rug Yarn, Pearl Cotton. Six strand embroidery loss, in two different colors. Tapestry needle, No. 20 or No. 22.

Cutting: From upholstery fabric cut one piece 13" by 34" for bag and two pieces 5" by 17" for handles. Cut lining fabric to measure.

Bag Stitchery: Yarn Arrangements: Position decoration about 5" down on one 13" end of bag fabric. Lay out yarns in groups of strands as shown, crossing them over and under each other. Keep groupings flat at this point. Use your imagination to obtain an interesting color and yarn arrangement.

Couching: Using strands of yarn, embroidery floss, and pearl cotton, attach yarn to bag in groups with embroidery stitches. Use matching or contrasting colors, depending upon whether or not you wish stitches to show. Don't worry about spacing stitches evenly; the fun is in doing whatever occurs to you!

Bag construction: Fold each handle piece in half lengthwise, wrong side out; stitch and turn.

At 13" ends of bag fabric, position handles, with right sides facing. In one operation, stitch both ends of handle in place. Made inside stitching 2" from raw edge. Repeat on other handle.

Fold bag fabric, in half crosswise, wrong side out, and stitch side seams. Repeat on lining fabric.

Turn bag to right side; at top, turn raw edge to inside on stitching line (2" from edge) and pin. Place lining, still wrong side out, inside bag. Turn under 1/4" at top of lining, pin and slipstitch to bag.

Make two tassels and attach to bag.

Tassel directions: Thread a blunt pointed tapestry needle with knitting worsted; use a long double thread, about 4 yards in all.

Leaving 8" free at top of tassel, thread needle back and forth through hole in spool until spool is completely covered (vertically) with yarn. End thread at opposite end of spool, leaving 8" at bottom of tassel.

Working over foundation threads, do a raised stem stitch around spool at top and bottom. This secures threads so you can put in yarn for

tassel. Thread needle with two threads, each about three yards long. Around bottom outer edge of spool, pick up two threads with your needle; pull yarn through leaving 8" end and cut off long strand 8" from spool. Repeat all around spool.

1" to 1 and 1/4" below spool, wind one thread tightly around tassel threads to form puff. Trim ends of tassel even.

Now you are ready to trim the tassel. You can make several additional rows of raised stem stitch — in different colors, using either embroidery floss or yarn. Wind yarn horizontally around spool and decorate entire tassel with embroidery stitches. Lastly, thread top of tassel with needle and sew in place on bag.
