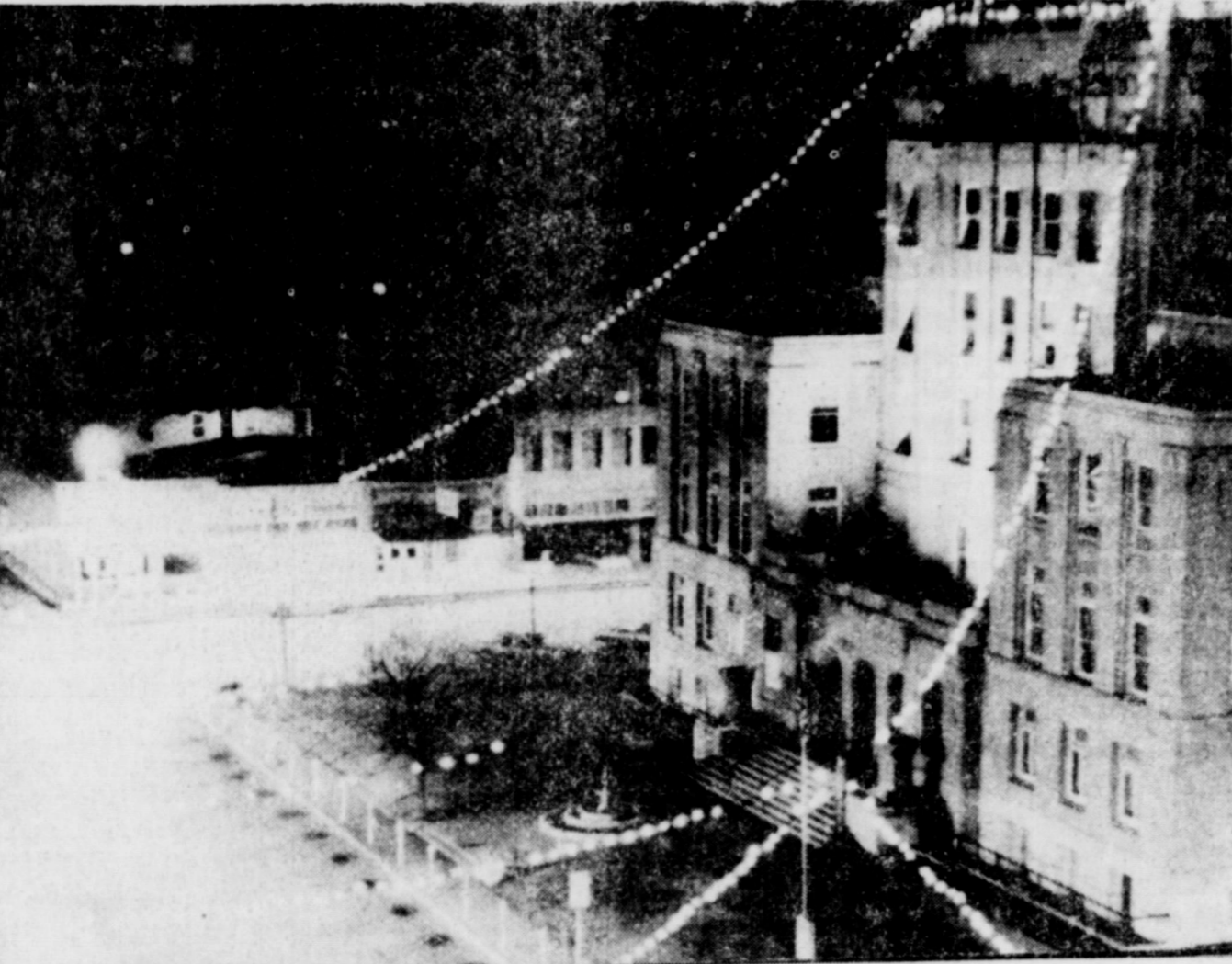

## Area Scout Leaders, Units Honored at Eastland Event

The annual Northeast District Scout Recognition Banquet was held in Eastland's Elementary School Cafeteria Tuesday, Nov. 29. Winston Boles, Scoutmaster of Eastland's Troop 6, was in charge of the opening ceremonies, which included a flag presentation by Scouts of Troop 6.

The invocation was given by the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor of First Baptist Church in Eastland. Dr. Nathan Cedars of Stephenville, Stephens, and Erath Counties, chairman of the district which included Eastland, Comanche, Stephens, and Erath Counties.

Dr. Cedars was given a

Boy Scout Statuette by the council in appreciation of his three years work as chairman of the district. Dr. Bob Alexander of Eastland made the presentation.

Comanche Trail Council Scout Executive John Pounds introduced the guest speaker, H. Kirk Henry, of Fort Worth.

Mr. Henry is Scout Executive for the Longhorn Council and has been active in scouting since 1926. He used Scout Handbooks from past years in his speech, including the book he received when he joined Scouts in 1926. There was also a Breckenridge man present who had used the same book.

Each Scout was asked to

raise his hand as Mr. Henry showed the Handbook used the year the Scout joined the program.

The services the council gives to the Scout program were outlined by Mr. Henry. Some of these are organization, leadership training, camping, budgeting, advancing and guidance by the professional staff.

Dr. Cedars presented an extra appreciation gift to Mr. Henry. This gift was a wooden hand, hand-carved in the form of the scout sign, and is the second one ever given to a member of this council.

## Another Deputy Sheriff Denied by County Court

Monday morning the Eastland County Commissioners denied Sheriff Lefty Sublett's request for authority to hire another deputy on a permanent basis. The Sheriff also requested that authority for a substitute deputy, granted three weeks ago because of Sublett's hospitalization, be renewed. The Commissioners renewed this authority until Monday, Dec. 5.

County Judge Scott Bailey reported that the sheriff is at home now, but still unable to work. Monday has been set as a tentative date for his return to duty.

Other business at the meeting included reports from John Simpson of the Soil Conservation office on the

proposed flood control at Sabanno Watershed. Simpson outlined the county's responsibility and benefits in this matter.

Leo Clinton, USDA food administrator, reviewed a workshop for county food administrators which he recently attended at Sweetwater. Clinton stated that about 1100 county residents receive \$8 in free food monthly. This amounts to more than \$9,000 in food distributed each month in the county.

Tax Collector-Assessor Edgar Alton reported on the tax situation and discussed voter registration in the county. Earl O'Brien, County Auditor, presented bills to the commission for approval.

Other survivors include his father, Jimmie E. Simmons of Fort Worth; one brother, Ammy Spec. 4 Floyd L. Simmons in Viet Nam; and one sister, Mrs. Robert M. Thomas of Fort Worth.

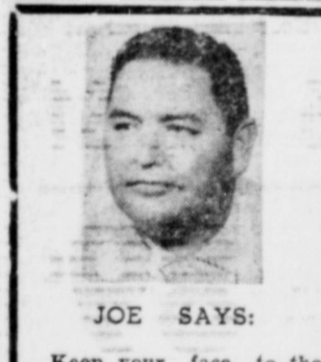

In 1966, the county allotment was 38,240 and 31,251.7 acres were planted. The total county allotment for 1967 will be about 39,000.

The difference in number of acres allotted and number actually planted is caused by the various federal conservation programs, including the soil banks program.

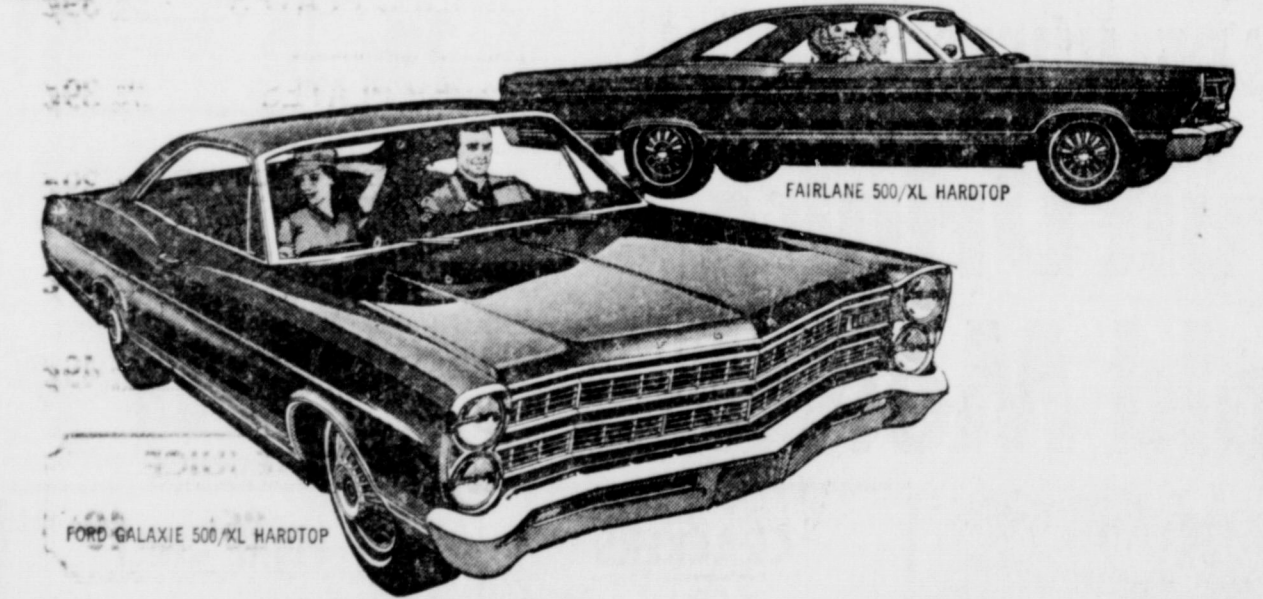
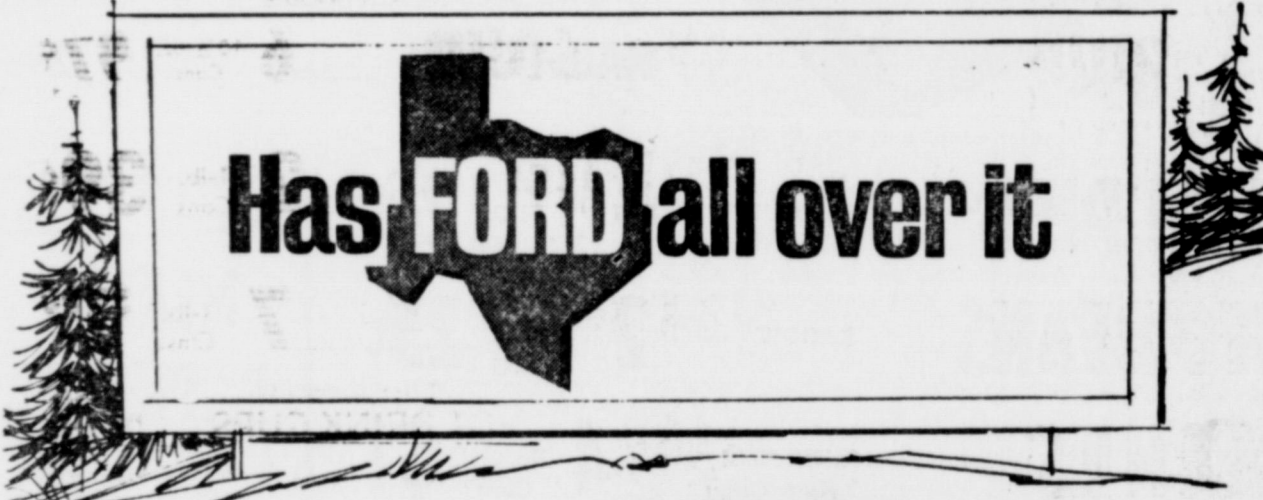

## Reduction For Phone Rates Announced Here

A wide reduction in rates totaling \$6 annually was announced by Charles Wilson, Eastern Bell Telephone Manager. This is the second such reduction in two years.

Largest item in the forthcoming reduction is a further lowering of intrastate (calls within Texas) Long Distance rates, effective January 1, 1967.

With the reduction, most station-to-station calls over 50 miles in distance in Texas will have lower rates, varying from 5 to 15 cents less for three minutes depending on distance. Reductions are even greater for calls over three minutes.

For example, here is how the reductions will lower rates for station-to-station calls made during the "day" period:

Along with these reductions, all intrastate station-to-station calls which are made after 8 p. m. and all-day Sunday will get the low-

est night rate. At present only station-to-station calls which are prepaid (charged to the number placing the call) and credit card calls are charged at this low rate. This is the 10th reduction in Long Distance rates for Texas telephone users since the end of World War II.

Although the technological development continues to play a major role in keeping the cost of telephone service at a reasonable level, this reduction in Long Distance rates is due in no small part to telephone users themselves," the company spokesman said.

"Without the cooperation of our customers in placing their calls by number, using Area Codes, and the overwhelming acceptance of Direct Distance Dialing, it would not have been possible to achieve the operating economics that have made possible the series of reductions in rates," he added.

In addition to the lower Long Distance rates, there will be reductions of some charges, effective December 1 this year. These include:

A reduction in the monthly charge for a color telephone from \$7.50 to \$5.00;

A reduction in the monthly rate for amplifier telephones to \$1. The rates now vary from \$1.25 to \$2.00. (This type telephone is most often used by persons with hearing impairments and at noisy locations.);

Introduction of a flat-rate charge for installing residence service of \$3.50 for Eastland.

This flat-rate, one-time Residence Service Charge will replace the service connection charges now in effect and will enable residence customers to have several telephones installed or changed at one time for the single service charge.

"The total reduction will represent an estimated annual savings of \$4,454.10 for Eastland customers," Wilson said.

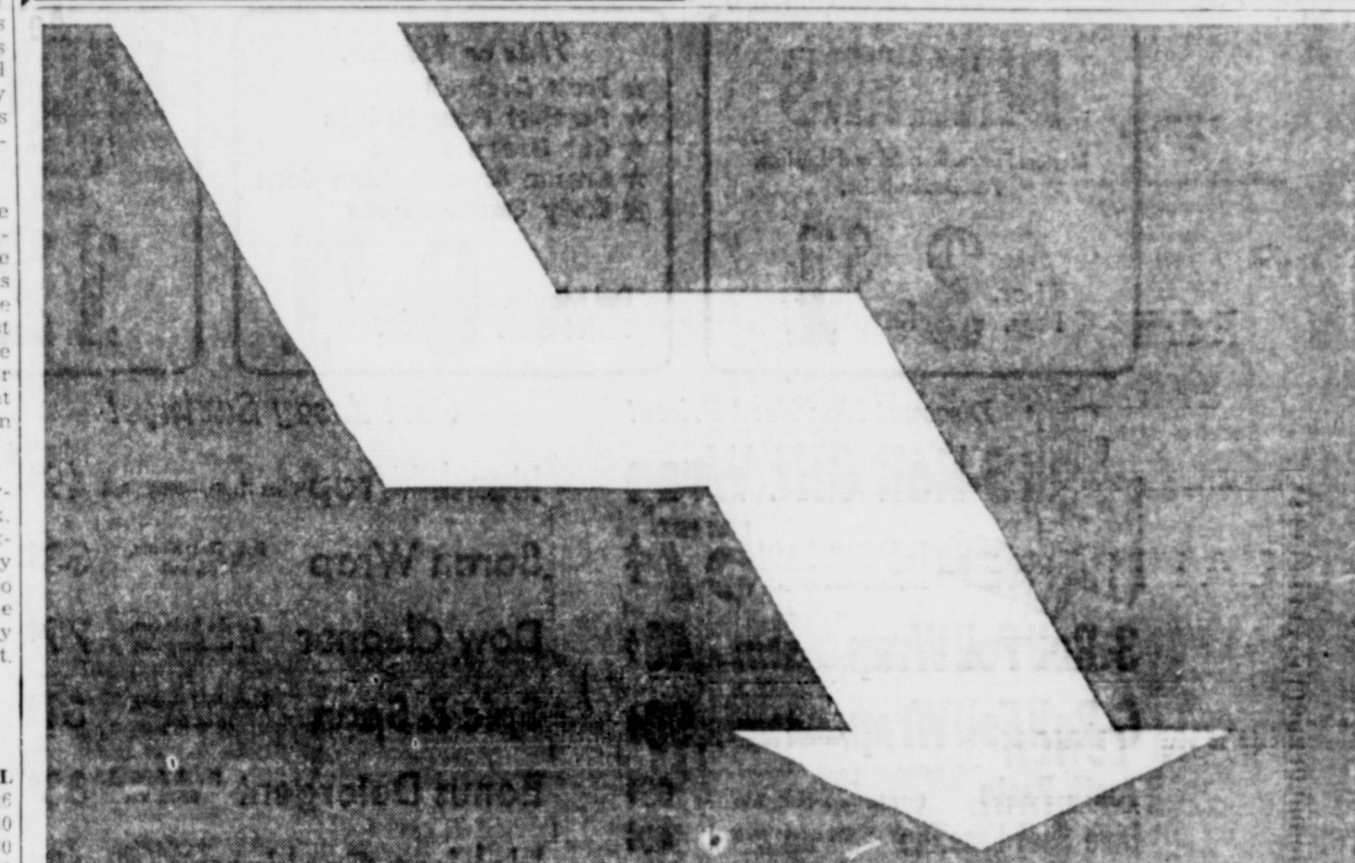
