Chamber Directors Welcome New Members, Discuss Plans

President Jay Staggs presided at the Chamber of Commerce directors meeting at noon Thursday at the White Elephant Restaurant. Minutes of the November meeting were read by Mrs. Maree Johnson and Staggs presented the financial report. Clint Bray, chairman of the Retail Trades Committee, reported that his committee had completed plans for December and the first of the year.

Two new members to the Chamber were announced: County Commissioner Danny Woods and Kincaid - Terrill Real Estate.

Directors discussed the possibility of having all informa-

tional leaflets about Eastland combined into one brochure. Staggs appointed H. V. O'Brien, Jack Germany, and Grover Hallmark as a committee to check into this.

City Takes Another Step Toward Debt-Free Status

The City of Eastland topped another giant hurdle on that glory road of being debt-free with the filing of an official document at the courthouse this week.

A formal resolution passed Monday night in regular session by the City Commission, and filed Tuesday by City Manager Lewis Tiner represents the release of the trusteeship of an Austin Bank, set up a quarter century ago when the city was declared bankrupt, and placed under federal court order.

The City executed a deed of trust and gave certain securities to the American National Bank of Austin on April 15, 1941, securing \$307,775 Water Works System and Sewer System Revenue Refunding Bonds.

The City has been making \$1,500 payments monthly since, and actually made the last one in April this year.

Formal filing of the resolution releasing the Austin Bank supposedly removes Eastland from the old federal court order, but does not entirely clear it of debt.

The City of Eastland has well and truly made all payments and performed all of the covenants and agreements contained in such deed of trust and in the bonds secured thereby and all costs, charges and expenses incurred by The American National Bank of Austin, trustee, in relation to such deed of trust having been paid.

The American National Bank of Austin has released, remised, discharged and acquitted, and by these presents does hereby release, remise, discharge and acquit unto the said City of Eastland the deed of trust lien heretofore existing upon the property described therein and does hereby declared such lien fully released, cancelled and discharged.

The City still owes \$32,000 in tax bonds dating to the same bankrupt era, for which 40 per cent of all collected city tax money has been put on deposit regularly for retirement. City Manager Tiner reports that the bonds are due April 15, 1967, and that there is presently \$21,000 on deposit locally, and about \$10,000 being held in escrow in Austin, to be applied to this the last of city's old debts.

There has been discussion at Commission meets in the past concerning the handing of arrangements for obtaining the escrow money when the time comes for paying off the old debt. Apparently there's no precedent, and it's generally believed that city may have to go to the original federal judge through its attorney's in handling the arrangements.

Mayor Frank Deaton and Commissioners Curtis Koen and James Reid were present for the short meeting Monday.

In other business, the commission:

Agreed to pay about \$500 toward replacing the Police Department's radio with a set which will also receive Highway Patrol signals. The Police Dept. will expend about \$400 on the set.

Voted to install two new street lights — at the corner of Simmons and Smith and at the corner of Slay and Smith, both locations on the city dump ground road.

Granted all city employees a \$10 Christmas bonus.

Agreed to "sack" the parking meters throughout the week before Christmas to give free parking to shoppers.

In requesting the final resolution releasing the Austin bank, its officials were most complimentary of the City's handling of its financial affairs through the years.

"You have received from our Trust Department the most recent bank statements, together with bonds and interest coupons for which you have returned to us two duly executed receipts upon our transmittal letters both dated November 21, 1966.

"Following receipt of your letter dated October 19, 1966, we requested our bank legal counsel to prepare an appropriate with a RELEASE OF PRIVATE RESOLUTION, to LIEN. Today he delivered to us these instruments and we enclose the RELEASE OF LIEN duty executed by The American National Bank of Austin, Texas, of the subject bond issue and request that you execute and return to us the RESOLUTION wherein is recited that we have completed our trusteeship in accordance with the Deed of Trust and that upon passage by your Board of Commissioners of said Resolution The American National Bank of Austin will stand released and acquitted of the said trust and obligation.

"Again I should like to say it has been a genuine pleasure and a real privilege to have worked with you over the years and I should like for this expression of our appreciation to be noted in your records so if there ever comes a time when again we can be of service, we should like for you to call upon us."

County Employment Up 4% In Survey

Employment in Eastland county, Rose 4 percent between March, 1964, and March, 1965, according to one of the nation's economic indicators, "County Business Patterns" 1965-Texas, issued recently by the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis. County Business Patterns, published annually, uses payroll information gathered the first quarter of each year by the Social Security Administration covering employment in most of the state's major industries and government agencies and the self-employed.

Number of employees in the county, in businesses covered by the report, for March, 1965 totaled 3,004 as against 2,894 for the same month year earlier. First quarter payrolls for the two years were 2.4 million and 2.4 million respectively. Retail trade, the largest group of employers in the county, reported a March, 1965 total of 751 employees and 3-month payrolls of 478,000, service firms. The county's second largest group of employers, had a total of 549 employees and 271,000 in quarterly payrolls. The county ranked 78th among the 254 counties in the state in March, 1965 in number of employees in businesses covered in the report. Comparable figures for Texas as a whole show, the State's employment rose some 5 percent from 2,197,331 to 2,313,891 between March, 1964 and March, 1965. Total January-through-March, 1965 payrolls amounted to 2,607.2 million as against 2,461.2 million for the previous year's first quarter. For the state, manufacturing led with 5,654.36 employees and a quarterly payroll of 795.6 million.
