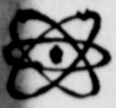

Six County Residents May Share In \$84 Million Shipping Fortune

The fortune — and its accrued interest — of a 19th Century shipping magnet may prove to be an inheritable windfall for at least a half-dozen Eastland County heirs, the fortune is the estate of Nelson Baird Brown, who died at Flatwoods in 1900 and who was buried near Strawn, in a grave that may actually be just over the county line in Eastland County.

Among the some 60 heirs to the estate are Elmer B. Hall, 70, a retired Lone Star Gas Co. employee, who now lives on Eastland Hill in Ranger, his aunt and his daughter, both of Cisco, and some three others in this county. Mr. Hall is a great-grandson of the late Mr. Brown.

"I've worked on this thing for many years," Mr. Hall said Saturday morning, "and was told often that there wasn't anything to my great-grandfather's reported riches. The tail has turned now."

The wealthy Brown was described by Hall as a "freight merchant" who owned sailing vessels, and "sailed the seven seas." His fortune has apparently lay dormant in a New York for these many years, leaving interest, an heir-

Preparations Appear Complete For Area To Enjoy A Merry Christmas

All preparations appeared complete Saturday for the community to enjoy a Merry Christmas.

With Christmas Day falling on Sunday, many residents were having a long weekend for holiday trips or entertaining. Good business during the past week indicated that

stockings would bulge Sunday morning with yuletide gifts.

The weatherman gave a faint hope for a white Christmas with a forecast of possible light rain or snow Sunday. A blustery norther blew in Thursday dropping temperatures to the mid-20s early

Friday and again early Saturday.

City and county police joined the highway patrol in urging extra caution during any holiday travel, noting that the roads would be full and that accidents would be more numerous. Any snow or icy weather would add to

the hazards of highway travel.

Most local churches planned "services as usual" on Sunday — Christmas Day. Many have announced that the regular Sunday evening services will not be held due to the holiday.

Virtually all business activity will pause Monday, Dec. 26, as this is a legal holiday for government activities. The local bank will be open however, in compliance with a state law that prohibits banks from closing three consecutive days. Drug, grocery, dry goods, offices and other places of business have announced plans to be closed Monday.

Police have called attention to city ordinances outlawing fireworks within the city limits, pointing out that "the law will be strictly enforced."

Members of the Eastland Pecan Raisers Association put in many hours of hard work to make this a successful pecan show. Men and women worked all day Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 8, 9 and 10, setting up tables, weighing, processing, and shelling pecans. Seems that everyone wanted to help. No one was asked to work.

W. V. Fenter of Rising Star, Mr. A. D. Ellington of Cisco, Mr. B. B. Freeman of Ranger, Mr. Doss Alexander of Pioneer, Mr. Oscar Schaefer of Sabarzo, Mr. C. T. Barton of Rising Star, Mr. J. M. Cooper of Fritch, Mr. Frank Altom of Abilene, and Mr. Ben McKinnis of Eastland. When the shelling started several people came by and volunteered their services by helping to shell pecans. Among these were Mr. George Page of Gustine, Mrs. Bill Farnsworth of Cisco, Mrs. Jimmy Lee of Cisco and Mr. H. L. Geye of Rising Star.

We enjoyed the pecan queen contest Thursday night in Rising Star. This event was sponsored by the Saturday Club of Rising Star under the leadership of Mrs. George Still. It was evident that this club put in many hours of hard work. The New Eastland County Pecan Queen, Jeannie Wright and runner-up Susie Morgan assisted by greeting the visitors and selling membership to the Pecan Growers Association. They also assisted with parts of the pecan show.

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council conducted a real good Pecan Bake Show. All the delicious looking food showed people the ways pecans could be used in food.

I have never seen so much good food as that prepared by the North Star Home Demonstration Club for the Queen's luncheon on Saturday. This job was supervised by Mrs. Lee Burkhead of Rising Star.

This was my first time to help with a pecan show and I found that it takes the coordinated work of many people. These people gave a great effort and we can be proud of the job that was done.

Seventy-nine pecan entries that won ribbons at the county show were taken to Abilene to the Regional Show which was held this weekend in the Show Case Mall in Abilene.

Gerald DeViney, Biology Professor at Cisco Junior

College, came by the office several days ago. He is doing some research work on nutria, a rodent found in parts of Eastland County. Mr. DeViney would like to know exactly where the nutria are located in the county. A nutria is a large rodent that averages 20 to 25 pounds each. The bodies are similar to beavers with opossum-like tails. The back legs are longer than the front and the back feet are webbed. They are dark brown or black in color. They live near swamps, farm ponds, lakes and rivers and feed mostly on water plants. However if water plants are not available they will feed on near by grass and small grain. Their presence in an area is usually revealed by lengths of cut vegetation that have been left in their trails and burrows in tank dams and river banks. If you know where nutria are located in Eastland County, please contact Mr. DeViney or me.

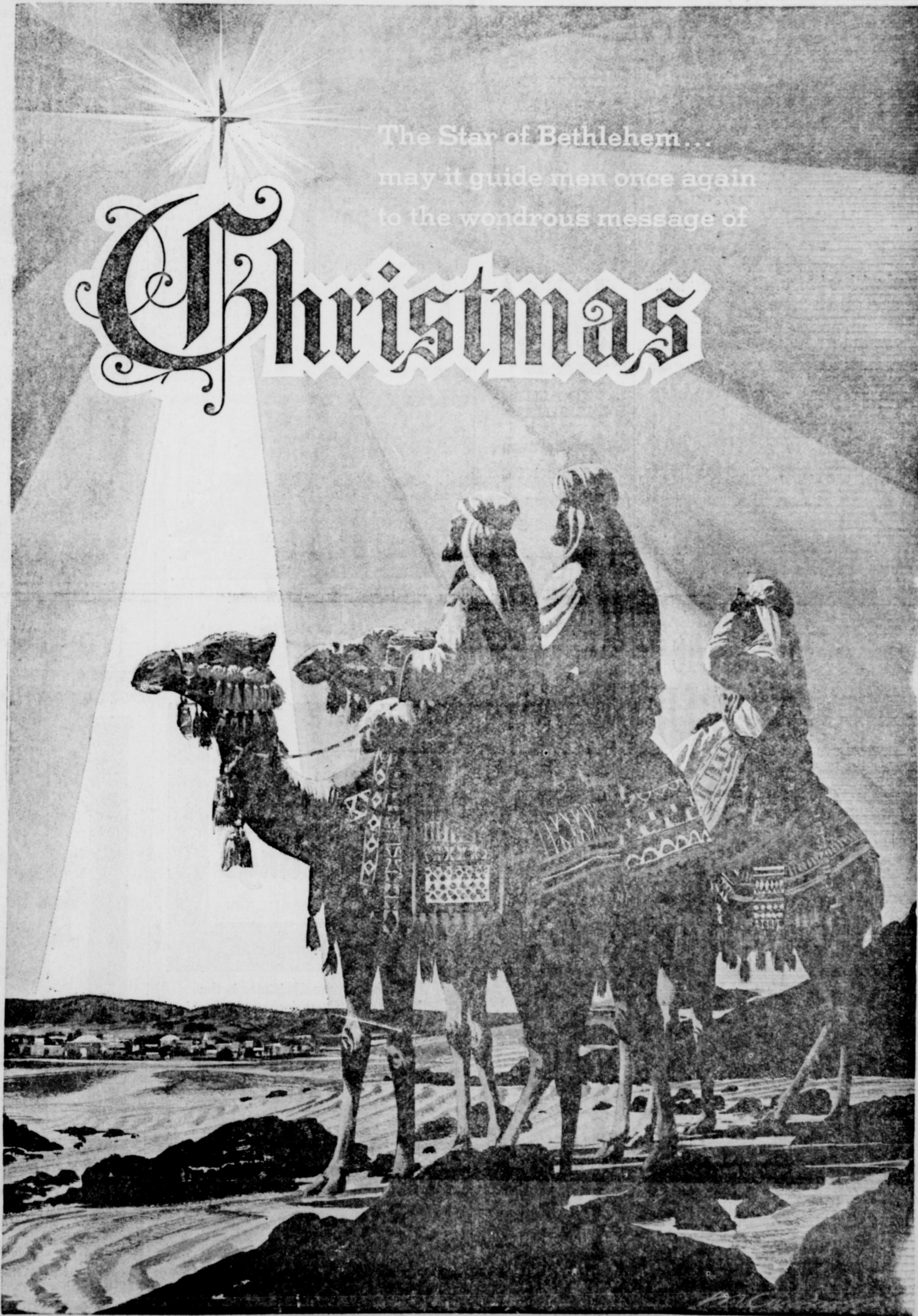

Clyde C. Howard Is On Naval Maneuvers

Electrician's Mate Second Class Clyde C. Howard, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Howard of Rising Star, is on maneuvers aboard this U. S. destroyer in the mid-Atlantic and Caribbean Sea, as part of "LANTFLEX-66", the largest composite training exercise for the U. S. Atlantic fleet this year.

Involving 94 ships, 19 air squadrons and more than 42,000 men, LANTFLEX, which stands for "Atlantic Fleet Exercise," will be in progress from November 28 through December 16. Operating with the American fleet will be three destroyers from Canada.

LANTFLEX is conducted to increase the defense effectiveness and over-all combat readiness of all participating forces under simulated wartime conditions. To this end, play the "aggressor" forces, while others will portray either "defensive" or support and logistics" roles.

As part of the exercise, more than 5,000 U. S. Marines will stage mock "over-the-beach" landings, as defensive land forces utilize conventional and guerrilla tactics to stop the advancing troops.

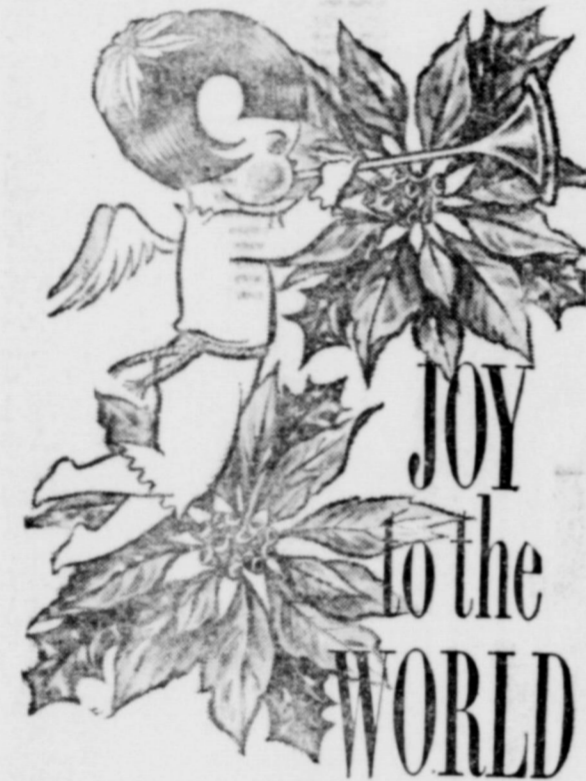

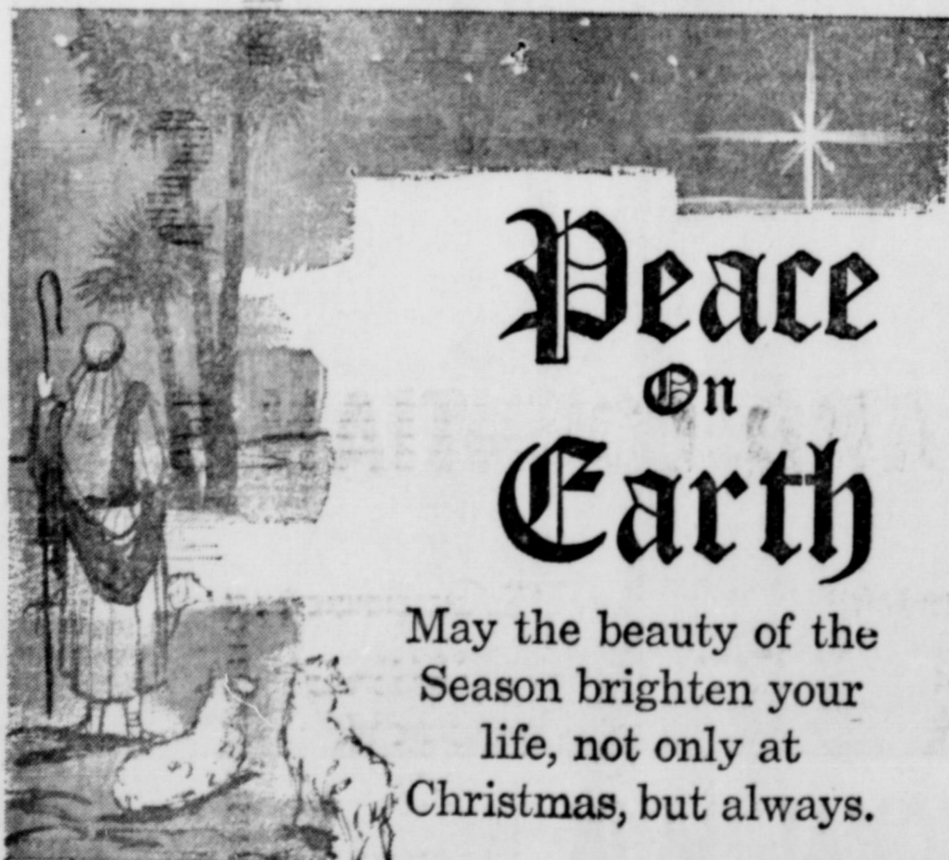

A big part of the preparation for the Christmas holiday is baking the many favorite foods. Gifts of food are always welcomed presents with homemade candies making a big hit. You might like to try our Martha Washington Chocolate Candy. This recipe is taken from the Extension publication of "Christmas Time at Home".

The ingredients and directions are:
1 can flaked coconut
1 cup pecans, chopped
1 can sweetened condensed milk
1/4 pound soft margarine or butter
2 boxes confectioners powdered sugar
Blend all ingredients and roll by hand into small balls about 3/4-inch in diameter. Chill in refrigerator, (about 1 hour or longer). Insert tooth pick into each ball and dip into chocolate-paraffin mixture to coat thoroughly.

Chocolate-Paraffin Mixture: Melt 1/4 pound paraffin and one large (12 ounce) package chocolate bits in a small saucepan over low heat (10 to 15 minutes). Use for dipping as directed above.

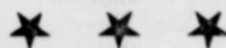

Musgrove Attends Legislative Conference Held In West Texas

Musgrove, state representative-elect, was one of the forty-two West Texas legislators who participated in a special legislative conference last Friday and Saturday in Odessa and Midland. Sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the two-day session allowed legislators the opportunity to discuss West Texas' goals and problems and plan for the state's future growth. Over 200 West Texas business and civic leaders laid their problems—from lack of water to overabundance of brush and the woes of small towns—on the line for this larger-than-expected group of legislators, including Lieut. Governor Preston Smith and House Speaker Ben Barnes.

Legislators were urged to provide more money for the Texas Water Development Board for studies of the West Texas water situation and the feasibility study for transferring water from East Texas to meet the water needs of West Texas. The establishment of an industrial revenue bond system for financing of new industries in Texas was encouraged. The suggestion was also made for development of a new formula for educational appropriations, one that would bring appropriations in line with current enrollment. Musgrove said that the present "per student allotment system based on prior enrollment" in many ways financially paralyzes rapidly growing smaller schools.

such as Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges. The new plan would allow schools to make a projection of enrollment for each coming year and be paid 90 per cent of that figure with a 10 per cent hold out to compensate for errors. West Texas Chamber committee urged increased appropriations for brush control, noting the constant decrease of available rangelands because of encroaching brush. The State Affairs Committee of the chamber recommended \$750,000 be spent for control and eradication of brush. The conference touched on the proposed Guadalupe National Park—which is expected to become a major West Texas tourist attraction—and legislators were asked to consider turning mineral rights over to the federal government to comply with federal demands in financing the park. Following the conference, Musgrove said that the federal government has supported other federal parks

without the mineral rights and this should be realized when the legislators act next spring. The chamber's tourist committee pointed out the need for additional funds to complete the Texas Cultural Center for the 1968 Hemis-Fair at San Antonio. Legislators also heard a report on the recently organized Small Town Task Force, a group designed to explore and solve the problems of West Texas towns of less than 12,000 population. In a question and answer session, the problems of increased traffic, death tolls and lack of city and county revenue were discussed. State Representative Musgrove commented after the conference that according to all reports this upcoming legislative session promises to be one of the most interesting in Texas history. Musgrove has kept a busy pace in recent months informing and preparing himself for the session and has given over 36 speeches to

civic clubs and group in the district since the General Election. As a representative-elect, he has sat in on budget board hearings, water hearings, agency and departmental meetings and has attended legislative conferences in Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio. Over one-third of the members of the House of Representatives will be facing their first session, and there will be nearly 30 per cent new faces in the Texas Senate when the legislature convenes in

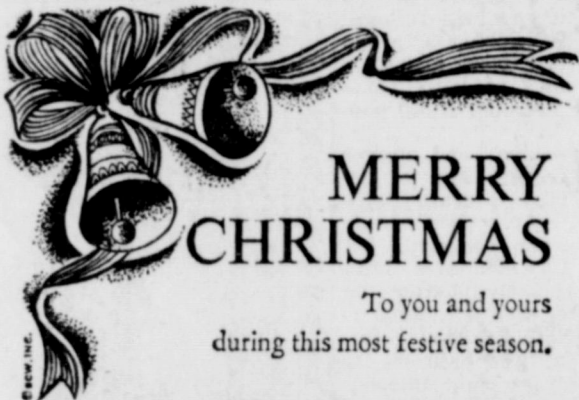

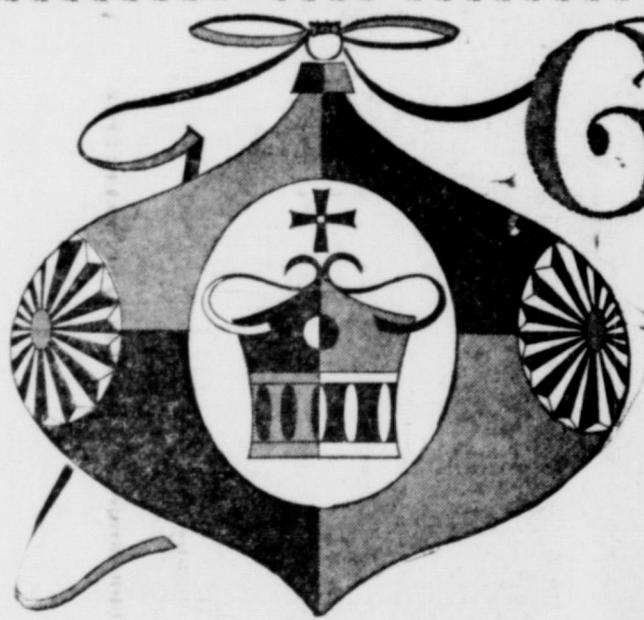

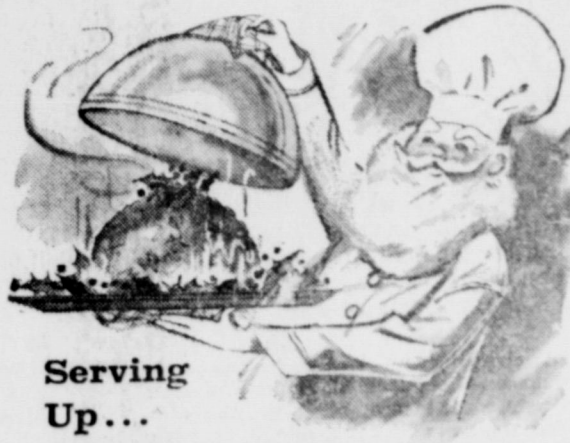

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally has released his budget proposals for public health agencies, for mental health and retardation and for the Youth Council.
Recommendations for public health and tuberculosis control include salary adjustments so that top-flight personnel might be attracted; funds to raise salaries to conform with the general pay raise for state employees; money to assure enforcement of food and drug laws; funds to implement the Air Pollution Control Board program; funds to expand the State Health Department building in Austin; and a fund to train personnel to staff public health facilities and tuberculosis control and treatment centers.

Texas' 55 state-supported colleges and universities enrolled 248,711 regular students this fall, representing an increase of 22,300 students — or about 10 per

cent — over last fall.
Biggest gainers, percentage-wise, were Stephen F. Austin, Nacogdoches (18.7 per cent); Southwest Texas State, San Marcos (17.3 per cent); and West Texas State, Canyon (15.6 per cent).
Big growth in junior colleges was noted at Henderson County, Athens; Texas Southmost, of Brownsville; Panola, Carthage; and South Plains, Levelland.
The 1966 enrollment figure approximately doubles the number of students in the college and university system 10 years ago.

Segregation in Texas schools is on the way out.
All but four of Texas' 1,303 school districts have filed intentions to comply with the 1964 Civil Rights Act with the U. S. Office of Education, says the Texas Education Agency.
Out of 233,425 Negro students enrolled in state schools, a total of 84,575 are in substantially integrated schools.
Of the 1,875,352 white pupils tabulated, 718,537 were on integrated campuses, and an additional 401,497 were on campuses having a small percentage of Negroes. There were 504 on campuses having a predominantly Negro enrollment.

Major sanction against a district failing to comply with the Civil Rights Act is the loss of funds under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which this year totals a little more than \$66,000,000 for Texas schools.
Airplanes dropped 263,425, 250 sterile screw worms files during October to fight Texas' screwworm infestation. So says a joint report by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Animal Health Division and the Texas Animal Health Commission.
