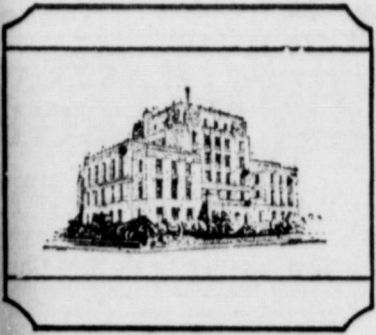

Cornelius Employees Get Yule Bonuses

Victor Cornelius, Inc., just completed another year of progress and growth. The company's 60 employees, Victor made the presentation of bonuses totaling \$14,000.

Founded as a mail order theatrical advertising firm in 1936 it rapidly found favor with theatre exhibitors across the country.

Theatre operators readily accepted the Nap-Ad which used the media of restaurant and drug store napkin holders to display "now showing" theatre attractions. Cornelius invented and patented the Nap-Ad in 1936 and produced them on a platen press installed in his garage. Other services to theatres quickly followed.

The Change-A-Play, advertising a full weeks program, and the 11x14 Display, a "now showing" display, took their place in the services offered to advertisers along with the popular monthly calendar.

The monthly calendar, the most popular of advertising pieces, still occupies its place as the favorite of theatre operators. Shipments of calendars to remote parts of the country are common-place.

The Nap-Ad, Change-A-Play and 11x14 services, all innovations of Victor Cornelius, have since been discontinued and the Theatrical Advertising is currently devoted to printed heralds, calendars and weekly advertising specialties.

In 1959 Mr. Cornelius purchased the Osment Menu Co. of Waco and moved it to Eastland. This purchase launched the company in the menu printing business.

A mailing list containing the names of 15,000 restaurants was compiled and menus bearing the VC imprint were offered to restaurant operators nationwide. In the intervening years menu bearing the trademark, VC Menus — Eastland, Texas, may be seen in better restaurants, literally from Maine to California. The \$150.00 platen press used for printing Nap-Ads has given way to the new \$25,000 Harris offset press used in printing four color menus.

The three top entries announced at noon Saturday are the Apache in the shell variety; the Ranger in the shelling class; and the Leon Valley Pecan Co. entry in the native class.

The grand champion was awarded to the Apache variety shown by Mr. C. E. Smith of Rising Star.

The Reserve Champion was the Ranger, shown by B. B. Freeman of Chaney.

Judging in the 14th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show in Rising Star was expected to be completed Saturday afternoon. The 160 entries represented 34 different pecan varieties and the greater number of entries were native seedlings and Burketts.

Miss Jeannie Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James T. Wright of Eastland, was crowned queen of the 1966 event in the opening queens contest Thursday night.

First runner-up to Queen Jeannie was Susie Morgan, 16 daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Morgan of Cisco.

Judging of the bake show and centerpieces featured the Friday activities of the three-day event. Winners in the pecan centerpiece event are Mrs. Joe Bond, Olden, first; Mrs. C. E. Smith, Rising Star, second; Mrs. Wanda Smith, Rising Star, third; and W. V. Fenter, Rising Star, fourth.

The over-all grand champion in the youth division of the bake show were pecan pralines by Jana Brown of Gorman. Over - all reserve champion was a pecan cake, made by Patsy Mosley of Olden.

Over - all champion in the adult division of the bake show was Mrs. A. H. Brown of Eastland on a pecan pie. Queen Jeannie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James T. Wright of 1009 S. Bassett St., is a senior at Eastland High School.

She chose a yellow and white lace formal for the contest Thursday evening, a day was busy most of Friday and Saturday as special hostess at the Pecan Show, attired in an attractive fur-trimmed suit, and her lovely terra cotta.

The 17-year-old was runner up in the Miss Dr. Pepper event and was the first runner-up in the 1966 Peanut Bowl Queen contest. One New Official Will Begin Duties January 2

Incoming County Commissioner Dick Foster of Gorman will be the only "new" county official participating when swearing-in time comes on Monday, Jan. 2.

The other nine have "been there before." These include District Judge Frank Sparks, County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey, County Judge

Scott Bailey, District Clerk Roy Lane, County Clerk Johnson Smith, Commissioners C. B. Dill and Foster, and three justices of the peace — Wells Dalton of Eastland, M. L. Underwood of Ranger and W. L. Lewis of Cisco. (None were elected at Rising Star and Gorman, so the commissioners court apparently will

make JP selections for those towns.)

Foster, 45, defeated incumbent Glenn Justice in the May Primary to become commissioner of Precinct Two, which includes the Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona area.

Other members of the court are Judge Bailey, who was re-elected; C. B. Dill, who defeated an opponent to return as commissioner for the Cisco area, Precinct Four; Danny Wood of the Eastland - Ranger, Precinct One; and Buck Collins, Rising Star commissioner, Precinct Three.

Interviewed recently, Foster said that he will not accept the \$75 per month expense allowance the court has been paying its members. He also indicated that he will be in favor of adding additional help in the sheriff's department.

The balding Foster, father of two, indicated that he is a little apprehensive over the financial condition of Precinct Two. A check of the court-house records shows that the precinct was \$6,772.03 overdrawn in its road and bridge fund at the end of November. (There is only one Road and Bridge fund for the county, but it is divided up among the precincts for accounting purposes.)

The 11-mile Kokomo Road was built this past year in the precinct and a great deal of money was spent for fencing and right of way, it was reported.

(Funds in the other precincts' road and bridge accounts on Nov. 30 were: No. One, \$7,932.40; No. Three, \$9,541.27; and No. Four, \$4,641.63.) The precincts receive proportioned shares of the "lateral road fund" — a state "refund" which amounts to some \$40,000 a year.

New equipment has recently been added to Precinct Two, and the current debt total is \$10,874.40. (The other debts include: county, \$42,659.00 for work on the Appeals Court; Precinct One, \$9,000; Three, \$1,350.00; and Four, \$12,500.00 for a grand total of \$77,283.40.)

The deficit at the end of the year in Precinct Two is expected to be about \$9,000. November labor expense was \$1,843, and the account has been in deficit for about two years, it was said.

Foster concluded, "When I go in, I'll have to cut all the corners I can and maybe have to do all the road work myself."

Man Arrested At Gorman On Abilene Assault Charge

In Eastland County jail on Saturday morning and expected to make \$7,500 bond was Floyd S. Isbell, former Abilene Police Department captain, who was charged with attacking a 20-year old Abilene woman.

Isbell was taken into custody by Eastland County Deputy Sheriff Loy Williams at 5 p. m. Friday in Gorman. He was placed in the county jail and his attorney was expected Saturday morning with bail.

Progress in the investigation of the series of burglaries and thefts at Gorman has been reported by the sheriff's department.

One of four suspects questioned with the theft of \$60 from an apartment in Gorman has refused to take a lie detector test, Deputy Roy Edwards reported.

The Higginbotham Bros. Lumber and Hardware Co. was burglarized some time Thursday night with \$50 reported stolen from the lumber company manager's cash box, \$14 taken from the hardware company's cash box and approximately \$100 to \$175 worth of knives and one Savage shotgun valued at \$37.50 also was missing.

Burglars had entered the back door of the company, prying open a lock. Entrance to the hardware store was

made through a small window in the alley. Bars covering the window had been pryed loose.

A 1964 Chevrolet pickup was stolen from the alley of Ray Rankin's Army and Navy Surplus Store Thursday at 2 p. m. Two men were picked up at 4 p. m. in Comanche while trying to trade three cases of anti-freeze from the pickup for gasoline.

A 91st District Court Grand Jury is being called for Wednesday, Dec. 14, to consider some 22 cases.

THE GORDON SPOT

Freeze branding is still an experimental procedure, but one livestock producer in Eastland County believes it is better than the hot iron method of branding cattle.

On December 2 Bob Cohen, Assistant County Agent, and I went to watch Ike Hickman do some freeze branding. Ike's place is be- tween Rising Star and Pio- neer.

Instead of putting the branding iron in a fire it is placed in a container of alcohol - dry ice mixture. The solution is approximat- ily 150 degrees F. The animal was clipped over the brand sight so that the hair would not act as insulation. The brand area was then dampened with alcohol to prevent the iron from freez- ing to the animal. Next, the cold branding iron was placed on the animal and left in place for 65 seconds. Apparently there was little pain experienced by the animal.

The freezing destroys the hair pigment - producing cells, follicle, there by leaving the hair over the branded area white.

Ike did his first freeze branding in April of this year. The brand on those calves are very legible even from a distance. This works well on colored animals, but would not be legible on white animals as there is no scar- ring.

Ike freeze branded some heifers Friday that had been previously branded with a hot iron. Those hot iron brands could not be distin- guished until they were clip- ped.

The freeze branding was developed at Washington State University. They have cattle that were branded two years ago and so far the white hair is permanent.

Ike is very pleased with the new technique of brand- ing since it is less painful, less injurious and more leg- ible than the old technique.

December is a good month for collecting and submitting soil samples for testing.

At the present time, sam- ples are processed as soon as they arrive at the labora- tory and test reports are mailed within ten days. This schedule should benefit you since prompt service is an important requirement for an effective soil testing ser- vice.

Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advan- tage of allowing time to ob- tain the fertilizers needed. In many instances, wet soil may be encountered during the winter and cause a de- lay in sampling, therefore, sampling now is advisable.

Shipping weights can be re- duced by allowing the sam- ple to dry a day or two at air temperature. Samples should not be heated since high temperatures cause po- tassium to be fixed in some soils in such a way that it cannot be removed by chem- ical procedures.

Pint boxes, mailing car- tons, history sheets and in- structions are available from my office. Instructions for sampling should be studied and followed as closely as possible. I will be happy to go over the instructions with you.

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
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HOMEMAKERS' HINTS

By JANET MEYERS
Home Demonstration Agent

The annual Home Demonstration Club Christmas dinner and party was held on Wednesday of this week at Fellowship Hall here in Eastland. Some forty women were present for the day's activities.

The Home Demonstration Council met that morning with Mrs. L. B. Mayhew, chairman, presiding. Highlight of Council was Mrs. Lon Horn modeling her garment that won first place in the "Make It With Wool" contest. Mrs. W. V. Fenter, THDA chairman, reported to the group that the annual training and planning meeting for council and THDA Chairmen in District 8 would be held in Gatesville on January 16.

You maybe interested to know that many flowering bulbs can be forced to produce flowers ahead of schedule. To do this use only the best bulbs available for indoor forcing. Avoid the temptation to purchase bulbs at the bargain table for this purpose. Bulbs that are good for indoor forcing include crocus, grape hyacin-

ths, daffodils, tulips, and hyacinths. Make your purchases of those bulbs as early as possible so that you can be sure of obtaining good strong bulbs.

Pot the bulbs as soon as they are available. Any good putting soil mixture will do providing it contains sufficient peat moss for good drainage. Place a one inch layer of gravel in the bottom of the pot, firm the soil around the bulbs leaving the tips of the larger bulbs showing just above the soil surface.

Move the potted bulbs to a cold storage temperature of 40 to 50 degrees. An old refrigerator works fine for this purpose. Success with forcing bulbs depends upon good root development during the cold storage period. Keep the soil moist, but not wet. Leave the bulbs in cold storage for a period of six to ten weeks or until they have made good root growth.

After the cold storage period, bring the bulbs into the light and heat gradually. Place them in a cool semi-lighted location until the shoots show a green color, then move to a sunny location. Do not place them in a hot room or near a heater.

For complete details on forcing bulbs and other hardy plants for indoor bloom call the Home Demonstration Office for a copy of "Bulbous and Hardy Plants for Indoor Bloom".

A recipe that you might like to try for the holidays is Apricot Balls. This is taken from the Extension publication "Christmas Time at Home".

APRICOT BALLS

1 pound dried apricots
1 medium orange
2 cups sugar
1 8-ounce package coconut
1 box confectioners powdered sugar
Grind apricots and orange together in food chopper using fine grind blade. Cook apricot-orange mixture with sugar in top of double boiler until all sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat and add finely chopped coconut. Cool on tray. Shape into balls the size of walnuts and roll in powdered sugar. Store several days and roll again in powdered sugar. Serve as a Confection or with boiled custard for dessert. Yield: 40 to 50 balls.

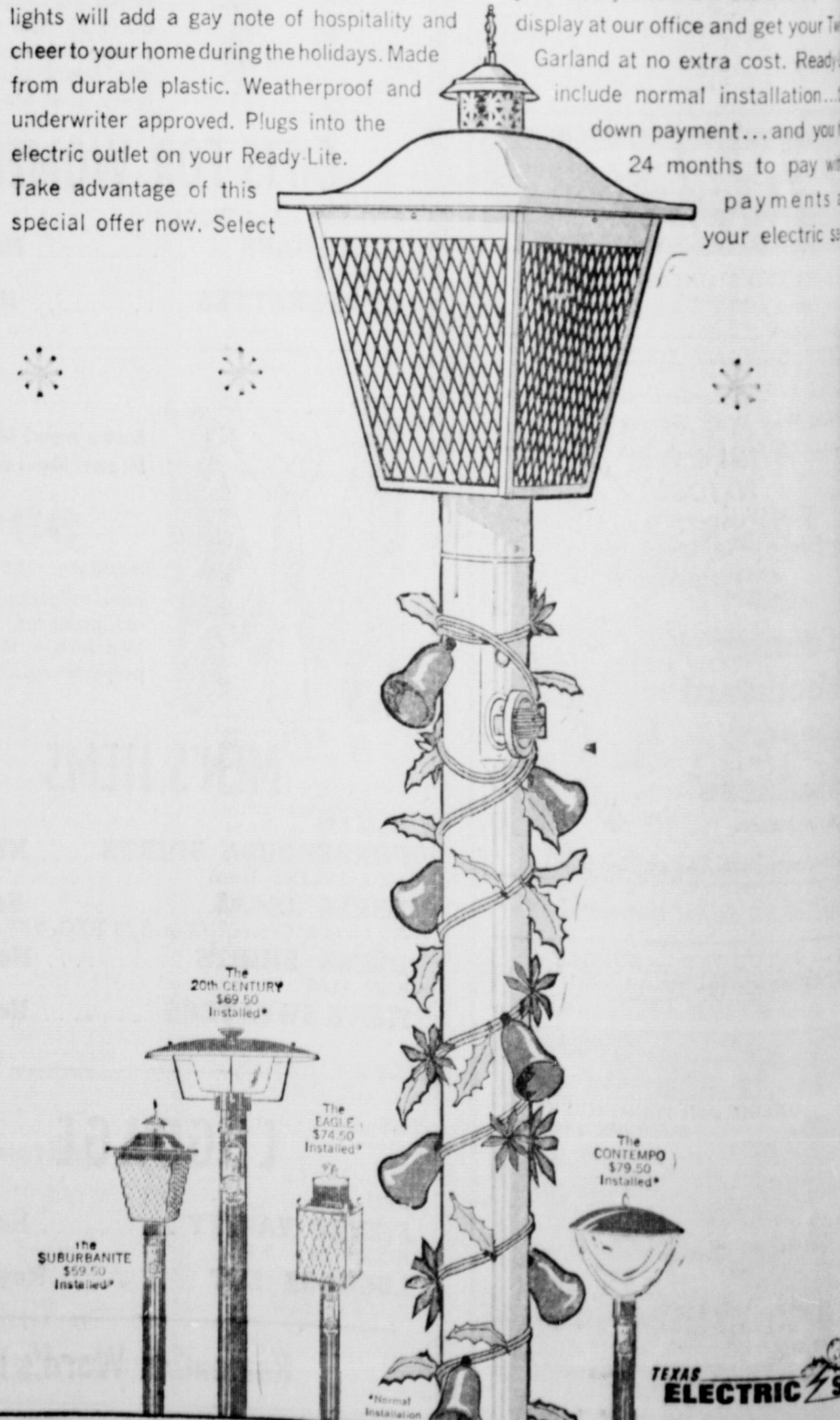
Dick Dixon, president of Eastland Jaycees, said the project was made possible by cooperation of many people. The group expressed

(Continued from Page 1.) Beautiful ala carte menu covers featuring all the colors of the spectrum are produced by use of this press. From artwork originating in the art room of the company to art furnished by the customer, the menu is produced in its entirety by company personnel utilizing modern lithographic equipment.

Colorful pictures of succulent steaks, chicken and seafoods are offered the restaurant operator on the inside artwork of the Menu. He can choose from several designs, each offering full color presentations of the chef in advantageous positions on the Menu.

Should he not approve of any of the standard designs offered, a special machine is used to give color artwork on the Menu in exactly the position desired. This ingenious machine, designed and built by Mr. Cornelius, uses air pressure, vacuum and heating units to position pre-cut color pictures of food items at any desired place on a Menu.

For those restaurants desiring a more exclusive Menu, the firm manufactures a leatherette cover with name and motif of the restaurant imprinted in gold leaf. The Menu listings are printed on simulated parchment and attached to the cover by means of a tasseled cord.

Restaurant operators have always used their menus or portions of it to carry an additional listing of their daily specials. These cards or papers were usually attached to the Menu by means of paper clips, staples or other methods which mutilated the Menu.

Recognizing a need for a better method of attaching a chef's specialties to the Menu the firm began the manufacture of a clip-on device which is an item made of circular or flat clips attached to an acetate backing. The clip is then attached to a Menu by means of a double-coated tape. Searching for a better method of manufacture for the clips, Mr. Cornelius conceived the idea of a strip of vinyl plastic extruded in such a manner as to give stress at certain points. After trial and error, the ideal size and material was decided. Manufactured in Houston, the vinyl ribbon is shipped to Eastland on specially designed drums built and supplied the manufacturer by the company. Each drum contains 15,000 feet of the snow white vinyl and after the vinyl has been processed, the empty drum is shipped to Houston to be respun with the vinyl.

This was received by the Christian Women's Fellowship of First Christian Church for the money and clothing they have sent to the Korean who has been their adopted son for six years. Lee Duk Kun was eight years old when the CWF decided to undertake with the help of other groups in their church, to pay for his food, clothing, and gifts.

The boy's father, who was a teacher, died of "a heavy sickness" during the war years and his mother died shortly after. Lee Duk, whose full name means "root of virtue", was cared for by relatives and then taken to the Merciful Orphanage in Pusan, Korea.

Letters from the boy are highlights of many CWF meetings. His progress is evident and he understands that his group of women provides for him.

Except from his letters are: In June: "In our school we had examination but I didn't get good mark this time. I will study fine and to get good mark next time. Hot summer is coming here now. In the morning I cut some grasses for our goat in the field these days and I go to field with our goats after school. In our Sunday school we will have a Bible tales contest and also I am very busy now practicing it."

In August: "I am also fine and happy. We got out of school for vacation on July 24 and will go again September 1. We have had much rain here for a long time and some place were hurt and many lost homes. Our dog got seven new puppies in our home and they are cute. I like to hear from you soon. All the time I picture you in my mind."

"And in November: "I am going well in school. My little puppy that I love is getting bigger. We lost two puppies and also four among them went another house. We have a puppy with mommy dog in our home now. This summer we didn't went on a camping for we had much rain here. Dear Sponsors, thank you for your warm money. In our home now we wear newly warm clothes. Praying you have been in good health with all the members in his grace."

The CWF has four main that this group of women service projects: the Korean boy, Church World Service, which distributed clothing; United Christian Missionary Society, which collects funds from various churches; and an annual spring Western supper for Eastland Circle Chairmen are Mrs. Ben Bassett, morning group; Mrs. A. D. Webb, afternoon group; and Mrs. Bernice Tankersley, Ruth group.

CWF officers are Mrs. Neil Day, president; Mrs. Joe Tow secretary; Mrs. Curtis Young treasurer; and the group captains. Worship director is
