controversial sub- health would certainly fall under the jurisdiction of the department within the city that maintains the sanitary garbage, spraying of mosquitoes, etc.

So, it boils down to the fact that a city that is as "broke" as Eastland is reported to be, must spend first money on first things first.

And, first things in my opinion, include the protection of life and property.

The city's police department is above average for a town of this size, in both personnel and equipment.

However, the city's Fire Department is, in my opinion, in a deplorable state. And, I would invite readers of this to check into this for themselves.

One of the City's pumper trucks was purchased in 1919, making it 48 years old. Another one, a combination ladder and pumper truck, (which is practically void of hose) was purchased in 1928, and is never used, as is not the 1919 truck.

In the past year, or so, the fire department's immediate fire fighting efficiency has been reduced to one-half of its former potential. This was done when instructions were issued to leave the 1919 pumper at the station and substitute in its place a rural

truck, which has no pumping facilities, as far as tying onto a city main is concerned.

So, now, if your home, or business catches on fire, arriving at the scene will be a 1951 Ford pumper, and a rural truck. While two other pumpers remain at the station, reportedly unfit to be used for a myriad of reasons, i.e., dead battery, no hose, low pumping capability, etc.

In the past 8 or 10 years hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent on new homes and other construction in Eastland. And, the people who invested this money are entitled to proper fire protection.

A street sweeping machine is a luxury item, and should be purchased when the city has the spare money with which to purchase it. Unless, of course, some would like to donate toward its purchase.

The present sweeper has a similar story, dating back to the late '50's when it was purchased, under similar circumstances and suggestions by proponents for its use. At that time, the city purchased it from Dallas, I am told, and it was a derelect at that time, would not run, and much money had to be expended in order to put it in running shape. However, it has gone the way of the mosquito spraying machine... seldom used.

Don't misunderstand me. I'm all for street sweeping machines, and paved airport strips. Only though, if the City can afford it. And, Eastland can't, when much more important items should be purchased first.

If some of these fine homes and businesses should catch on fire, I am sure the owners would rather see a shiny, new fire truck on the scene putting the fire out, than a street sweeper holed up in a garage somewhere.

A street littered with a few paper cups, straws, etc. is truly unsightly, but certainly would not pose a health problem. Pathogenic bacteria capable of causing diseases are not known to live in airy, sunny and dry places, such as the streets of Eastland. So, certainly this would not be one cause for buying a sweeper.

So, Mr. Commissioner, and Mr. City Manager, let's spend first money on first things first.

The 1966 peanut crop was the best in the history of the crop in this area, Mr. Gordon said. The yield in the 1961-65 period averaged 608 pounds per acre as compared with 1,256 (42.2 bushels) in 1966. The county planted 31,379 acres last year.

State-wide, agriculture economists have predicted that 1967 will be a good year. Mr. Gordon noted that "dry weather has hurt the wheat outlook in our area" and that other small grains were needing moisture.

"The national agricultural emphasis is on more production rather than holding down the yield," Mr. Gordon said. "The surplus situation is not nearly what it was a few years ago due to increasing demand for grains from foreign countries."

Mr. Cohen reported that his job was concerned primarily in working with young people through 4-H clubs. He said that Cisco has 30 youngsters with a variety of club projects underway.

The showing of livestock began last weekend when a group went from Eastland County to the Odessa show. The young people will enter livestock in Abilene and Fort Worth this month, San Antonio and Houston in February and in the Cisco Livestock Show March 9-10-11 and the Eastland County Livestock Show on March 16-17-18, Mr. Cohen said.
