now and I'll cry when I see him again.

Suddenly I know yet another word: "hope." The hope of reunion. I smile. Let those around me think whatever they will. For I see not the coffin, not the grave, not even those around. I see a wife, crying as she runs to catch her husbands out-stretched hands.—By Marie Boney






