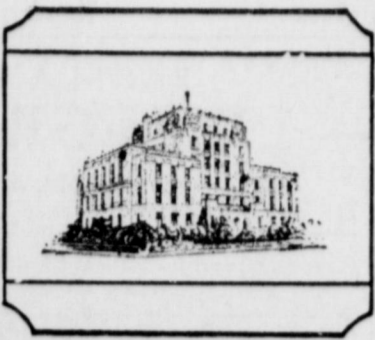

Cisco-Eastland Highway Cost \$4.9 Million

A revised cost estimate for construction on a section of Interstate Highway 20 in Eastland County has been approved by the Texas Highway Commission.

The 4-mile project will cover construction of grading and structures for a four-lane expressway facility with surfacing on frontage roads.

It will extend from 1 mile west of Cisco east to a mile east of Eastland and cost an estimated \$4.9 million.
