Army Gen. Howze To Be Main Speaker

A number of officials from the U. S. Army Primary Helicopter Center will be in Eastland on June 14 to assist in city's Flag Day celebration. The main speaker for the occasion will be General Hamilton H. Howze (USA Ret.), an official with Bell Helicopter Company, Fort Worth. General Howze graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in 1939 and was commissioned second lieutenant of Cavalry. During World War II he saw action with the 1st Armored Division, participating in the Tunisia, Naples - Foggia, Rome-Arno, North Apennines, and Po Valley campaigns. He is qualified in both fixed and rotary wing aircraft. In October, 1961, General Howze was selected to serve as president of the Army's Tactical Mobility Requirements Board, which established a wholly new doctrine of ground combat by integrating large quantities of light aircraft into the Army structure for the movement of firepower, troops and supplies on the battlefield. General Howze wears the Distinguished Service Medal, the Silver Star, two awards of the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star for Valor, the Italian Military Valor Cross, and the Korean Order of Merit (First Class).

Four of the highest decorated soldiers at the U. S. Army Primary Helicopter Center, Fort Worthers, will attend Flag Day ceremonies June 14 in Eastland.

They are Lt. Col. Daniel C. Prescott, deputy assistant commandant of the Army Primary Helicopter School; Major Sam A. Banks, chief of the Standardization Evaluation Division; Capt. Thomas G. Piel, an instructor pilot at USAPH's Flight Division; and Sgt. Dixon G. Arment, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, the Troop Command, U. S. Army Primary Helicopter Center.

Army Exhibit To Be Moved TO P. O. Lobby

A special Army exhibit — U. S. ARMY, A HERITAGE OF FREEDOM — which opened at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Thursday, will be moved to the lobby of the Post Office for Flag Day, it has been announced. Re-location of the excellent exhibit will afford more people the opportunity of seeing the extensive display, and will blend in excellently with the patriotic celebration.

In charge of the exhibit are Sgt. Pete Sears of Pompano Beach, Fla., and PFC Harry Thompson of Crookston, Minn. Both are assigned U. S. Army Exhibit Unit, Cameron Station, Alexandria, Va.

Now the Army has fulfilled its mission throughout the years is depicted in the colorful exhibit which is scheduled for Eastland through June 16. The exhibit features color photographic reproductions of paintings, each showing a battle in which the Army played a decisive role in preserving the nation's liberties against aggression.

The Citizens March for Patriotism will begin the annual Flag Day Celebration in Eastland Wednesday, June 14 — with the march to form at the Post Office promptly at 9 a. m. and to be led by a 36-piece military band.

The 329th Army Band from Fort Worthers will lead the patriotic marchers uptown and around the square. Everyone in this area is cordially invited to participate in this vivid demonstration of personal patriotism, as a part of the Flag Day Ceremonies. The line of march will return to the Post Office where a brief and impressive ceremony will be held on the lawn east of the building.

Vigil T. Seaberry Jr. will be master of ceremonies and Chaplain Eugene Williams, Lt. Col., USAF Retired, and presently pastor of the First Christian Church, will be in charge of a dedication ceremony to men in uniform, in which all servicemen now in uniform, and prior servicemen, their families and friends, will be honored.

Wendell Siebert will lead audience in the singing of "America" in unison. Mayor Pro-Tem James Reid, will extend the official welcome of the city. Seaberry will introduce distinguished visitors, including postal, military and others. A postal official will give the response to the welcome.

Among the military visitors will be Maj. W. D. Phillips, Fort Worthers public information officer; Maj. W. Roche, Capt. Jackson, Lt. DeJulio and others. Capt. Richard Timmermeyer will introduce the some 15 foreign students who will be in attendance from Fort Worthers.

Military recruiters will be present including those from the Navy, (who will bring a special submarine exhibit to be displayed on the parking lot of Eddy Pevehouse's Texaco Service Station west of the Post Office), Army, Marine Corps, Air Force, and WACs. Maj. Phillips will introduce Col. E. P. Flemming Jr., Commandant of Fort Worthers, who will direct the official color guard for the flag raising. The national anthem will follow.

Commandant Flemming will introduce Gen. Howze. Scout Master Ray Pryor and members of Troop 103 will lead in the pledge to the flag following the address.

A band concert will follow the pledge and Chamber President Jay Stagg and Jaycee President Dale Bakker will extend public thanks for participation, and the Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor First Baptist Church, will express appreciation and give the benediction.

Cool refreshments will be available for all at the rear of the garden, Mrs. Johnson reports.

A barbecue luncheon will be held at noon at Lone Cedar Country Club and the public is invited with tickets at \$2 required.

Gen. Howze will arrive in Eastland by helicopter at 8:30 a. m. and will be escorted from the Airport by Police Chief Ray Laney.

All Eastland's fine cooks are asked to provide choice cookies, boxed as mementoes of their visit here for the visiting servicemen, according to Mrs. Johnson.

Petty Officer Richard Fowler will be in charge of the Navy's special submarine exhibit.

Retail Clerks Negotiate With Eastland Safeway

Retail Clerks International Association Local Union No. 68 is now in negotiation with Safeway Stores Incorporated for a new agreement for four retail clerk employees in Eastland. The Retail Clerks Union has received an offer from Safeway Stores for new and improved benefits and increased wages.

Retail Clerks have been offered a substantial wage increase. A heavy duty clerk has been offered an increase of 12 cents per hour retroactive to the expiration date of the current contract. Top rate of \$2.44 to a light duty clerk has been offered an increase of 13 cents per hour at a top rate of \$2.12 per hour retroactive to the expiration date of the current contract. Produce department managers have been offered an increase of 10 cents per hour retroactive to the expiration date of the current contract. These rates will increase again in April 1968, October, 1968, April, 1969 and October, 1969. During the term of the three year agreement, this will bring the top heavy duty clerk up to \$2.52 per hour and the top light duty clerk to \$2.30 per hour and the produce managers in range from \$2.70 to \$2.88 per hour.

Birthday has been added as an additional holiday for full time employees.

Additional contributions have been offered to be paid into the Health and Welfare plan increasing the premium from \$21 to \$25 per month per eligible employee during the life of this agreement.

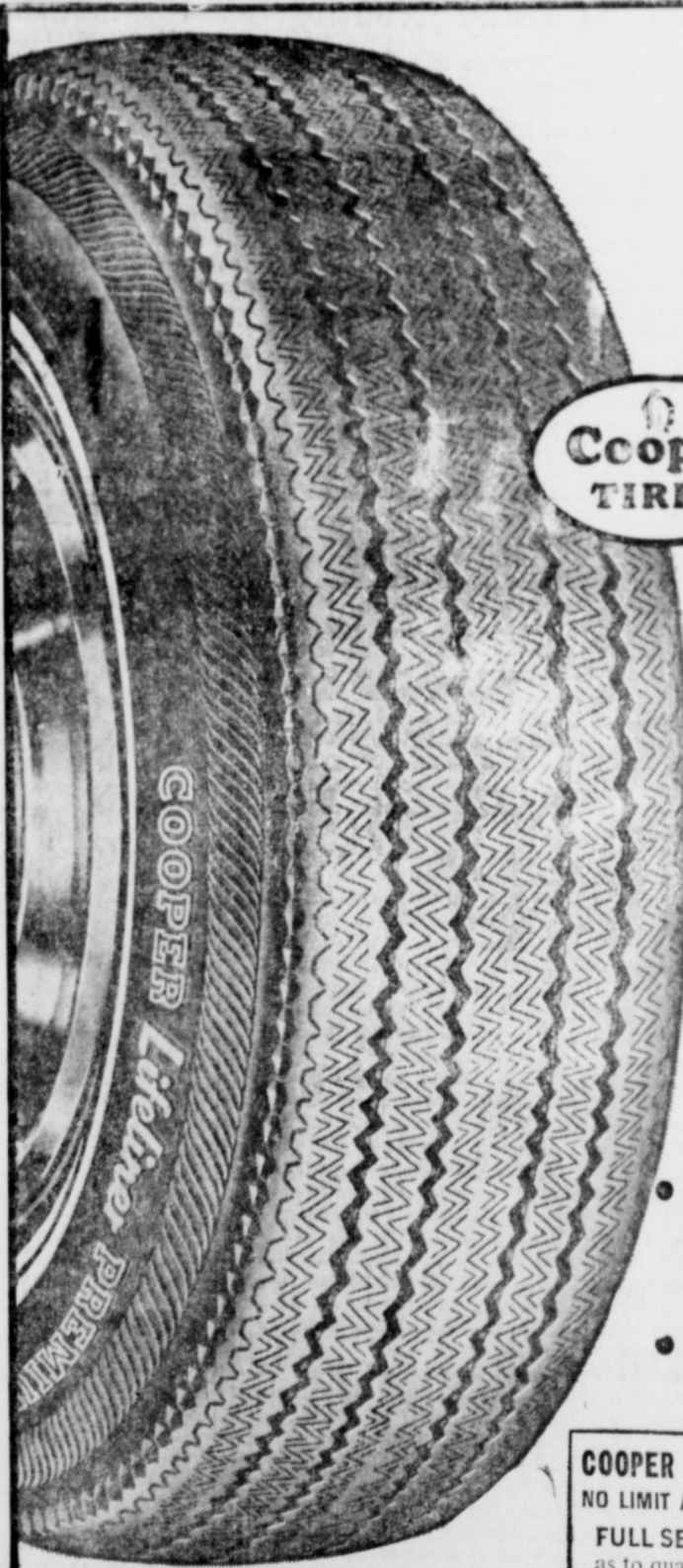

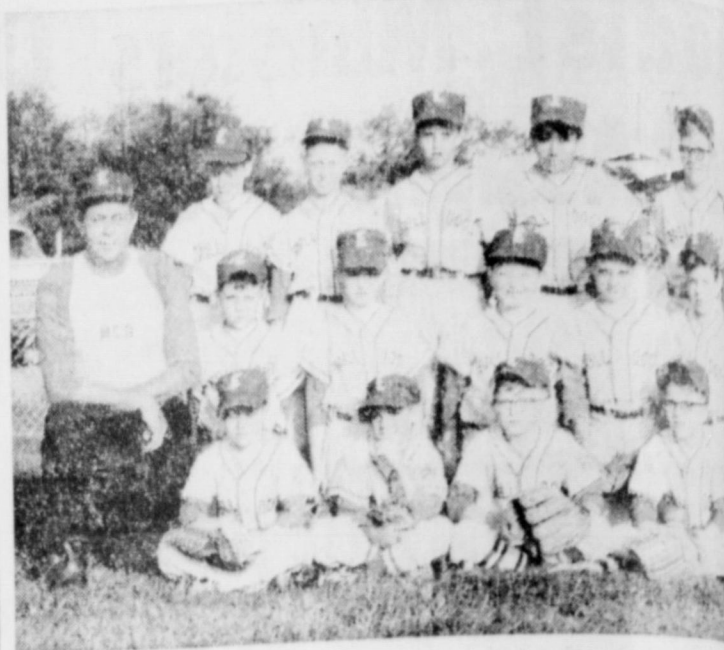
Romney Reunion Will Be Held Sunday, June 11

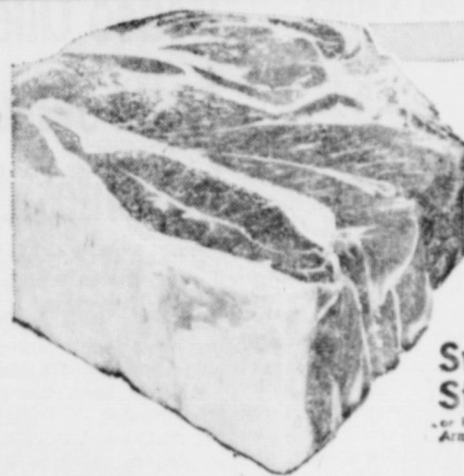

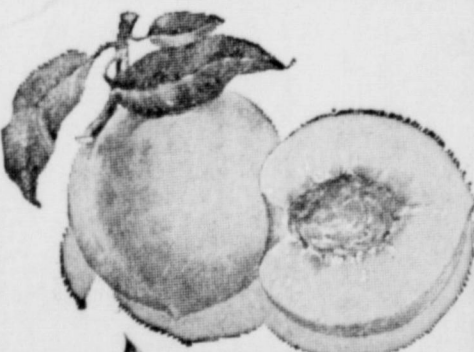
