An estimate of the value of toys we received is \$155, so this makes a grand total to the needy families in this area \$1,532.35.

## MULTITUDE OF AUTO CRASHES MAR HOLIDAYS FOR MANY HERE

### YOUNG MINGUS GIRL KILLED

The New Year's weekend in Eastland County saw a rash of accidents — some minor & several serious.  
Virginia Sue Gay, 15, of Mingus was killed instantly when the car in which she was riding plunged over an embankment one-half mile west of Mingus at 9:30 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 23.

Other occupants of the car were Johnny Wayne Calloway, 19, Linda Waits, 16, Jerry Elkins, 20 and Robert Rogers, 20, all of Mingus. Calloway, Elkins and Rogers were carried to Ranger General Hospital. Calloway was transferred to Hendrick's Hospital, Abilene where his condition is reported to be

critical. Rogers is in satisfactory condition in Ranger Hospital. Elkins was released from the hospital the day following the accident and Miss Waits is a patient in Nazareth Hospital, Mineral Wells.

Funeral service for Virginia Sue was held at 2 p.m. Monday in the Methodist Church of Gordon with Rev. Elmer Glazner of Fort Worth officiating. Burial was in New Gordon Cemetery.

Born May 17, 1951, in Ranger, she was a life-long resident of Mingus and freshman student at Gordon High School.

Five persons escaped serious injury in tow separate accidents about noon Friday, Dec. 30.

In a one-car mishap at Tiffin Road and Highway 80 two soldiers stationed at Fort Bliss, El Paso lost control of their car and were taken to Ranger General Hospital and then were taken to Dyess Hospital in Abilene. Neither man was considered seriously injured.

A two-car collision on Highway 80 East left Mrs. Jimmy Lee of South Carolina in Ranger General Hospital with a broken leg and multiple cuts and bruises, while Lee escaped with a cut lip.

The Lees collided with a car driven by Melton Lowry of Fort Worth. Lowry was not seriously injured.

Highway Patrolman Jack Therwanger has reported that Jerry Wayne Cole, 22, of Rt. 2, Ranger was in the Ranger General Hospital following serious injuries received Dec. 28 when his car struck the Colony Creek Bridge on FM 101, 2 and 1/2 miles west of Ranger.

12:35 a.m. Saturday — Car turned over on Highway 6 between Carbon and Eastland.

1:38 a.m. Saturday — Another car turned over on Highway 6.

1 p.m. Friday — Car hit a trailer being pulled by a pickup on U.S. 80 between Cisco and Eastland, near the Kendrick Poultry Farm. Driver of the auto injured.

10:15 a.m. Friday — car turned over near Carbon.

11:15 a.m. Friday — Two-car accident on U.S. 80 west of Eastland near Acme Welding Shop.

Other car accidents during the Christmas holidays were: a three-car accident on Highway 80 west on Dec. 26. Involved were a 1966 Pontiac driven by Jerry Cowder of Crane; a 1966 Pontiac driven by Clarence Mode of Albuquerque, N. M.; and a 1964 Rambler driven by Gilbert Napier of Abilene. No one was injured.

At 2:10 a.m. Tuesday, a Mack Truck tractor and semi-trailer apparently went out of control just west of Eastland. Driver Eugene J. Stanton of Red Barn, N. J. was uninjured.

Later Tuesday morning, a 1964 Volkswagen driven by Richard M. Rivers of Albuquerque, N. M., turned over west of Eastland. No one was injured.

## 1966 Rainfall Above Average? The Official Records Say 'Yes'

Chances are, the year 1966 was wetter than you guessed, and a great deal colder than you might suspect.

That's the word from Official County Weather Observer and Recorder W. J. Greiger of Eastland.

Total rainfall for the year, through noon Friday, was 27.23 inches. That includes Friday morning showers, and is just slightly above the average for the year of 26.35 inches, but below last year's total of 27.83.

However, as most of the rain falls well known, the rains came early, and the last three months of the year have been parched dry. Six inches of rain in June and four in August, spelled money in the bank for the county's peanut raisers though, as they brought in the best crop on record, with ideal harvest-time dryness.

And temperature? Well, lows to date have generally been assumed to be in the 14 degree area, but that's not quite the case, as Weatherman Greiger checks his official instruments to find that "9" degree reading on Christmas Eve was in fact, the lowest of the month. Quite a few "13s" were marked, as well as a "12," and "10s" on Christmas Day and Friday morning.

Mr. Greiger's instruments are located in the southeast part of Eastland.

The moisture Thursday night and Friday represented the only measurable (.04) rain during December, and November had only .24 of an inch. October rain amounted to 1.03 inches.

February with its .11 of an inch and December were the driest months.

## MODERNIZED CHURCH READY FOR NEW YEAR

Today the building meets a phase of an extensive remodeling program on their existing building. Earlier in the year, they planned to tear down the building and move to another site.

This plan has changed, however, and members have completed the following work:

Large double windows were replaced with long, narrow ones.

A white asphalt shingle roof replaced an old tin roof.

The exterior was painted white.

New iron corner posts, hand rails and bannisters were installed at the front of the building.

The inside was paneled with pre-finished wood paneling.

The bell tower was made smaller and a 14-foot-tall fiberglass spire was installed on top of the belfrey. Inside the

tower is the cast iron bell brought to Eastland County by covered wagon in 1869. The bell, which has a bottom diameter of 30 inches, is made of three inch cast iron. It was brought here from Bowling Green Kentucky.

Future plans call for four additional classrooms, a new baptistry, new pews and floor covering.

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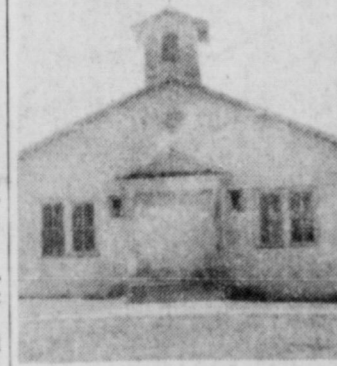

During the month of November, United States savings bond sales in Eastland County amounted to \$19,959, according to a report received from Guy Peyton Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County savings bonds committee. To date this county has purchased \$233,591 in savings bonds and this is 78 per cent of the 1966 goal of \$300,000.

"Nationally, the sale of series E and H saving bonds during November amounted to \$368 million. These sales were the highest for any November in 11 years; 9 per cent higher than a year ago. The January-November sales were \$4,488 million, 7 per cent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sales since 1956," Chairman Parker stated.

## If You Earned \$600, Report It

DALLAS—Everyone under 65 years old, whether single or married, who is a citizen or resident of the United States and had gross income of \$600 or more during the year must file a return. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for Northern Texas advised taxpayers today.


If you are 65 or older on the last day of your tax year no return is required unless gross income was \$1,200 or more. If your income is under the above figures, you should file a return to obtain any refund due you of income tax withheld from salaries or wages.

Businessmen, farmers, and other self-employed persons must file a return if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

Document No. 5107, which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by dropping a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

## Money Is Expected To Be Big State Problem

Money to finance the growing costs of state government will be the biggest problem that the Texas Legislature will face when the biennial session opens Tuesday, Jan. 10, at Austin.

That was the opinion expressed by Senator Tom Creighton of the 22nd District, which includes Eastland County, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly meeting of the Cisco Lions Club. He was introduced by Jack Anderson, the program chairman.

The Legislature will first have to determine what the cost of the state government will be for the next two years before passing a tax bill, Mr. Creighton said. Under the constitution, the Legislature cannot appropriate money without providing a tax that will yield it.

A raise of up to 20 percent in state employee salaries might be passed, Mr. Creighton said. This would cost taxpayers \$72,000,000. On top of this will come increased budgets for education, teachers salaries and other government activities.

An increase in the general sales tax probably will be used to provide the money needed to balance the state budget, the senator believed.

The Legislature will continue studying the important water conservation program, Mr. Creighton predicted. The constitution, which was amended 26 times last session, probably will come in for more change proposals at the new session.

Traffic safety measures are expected to be presented and possibly passed to help stop the trend of more highway deaths and accidents each year. This could be in the form of stricter regulations on driver licensing, he believed.

Eastland County could be affected by changes in the judicial setup to equalize the work load of the district courts, Mr. Creighton noted. He said there has been prepared for release soon some recommendations for the state's court reorganization. This could move the 91st Court from Eastland County or add one or more counties to it.

Annual sessions for the legislature, four year terms for top state officials, and the casualty insurance laws are other topics that will get attention and possible law changes, Mr. Creighton said.

Two controversial matters due to come up are changing the laws to permit sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas and enacting laws to permit betting on horse races, the senator said. There is more steam behind the liquor matter this year than usual, he noted, and the horse racing proposal will be given more backing than ever before.

The shortage of nurses, branch banking and a state utilities commission are three other subjects due for consideration, he predicted.

Sen. Creighton said the legislature will have to pass a resolution to keep Texas clocks on Central Standard Time or the state will come under a federal law placing the entire country on daylight saving time. He has found sentiment mostly in favor of "keeping things like they are."

The voter registration system will get attention, Mr. Creighton believes. He has been a member of a legislature committee that has been studying the matter. He said they hope to upgrade the voter registration certificate to the status of a driver's license whereby the citizen will be mailed his renewal application each year or each two years.

The need of cities for additional income will be another matter that the Legislature will study, he said.

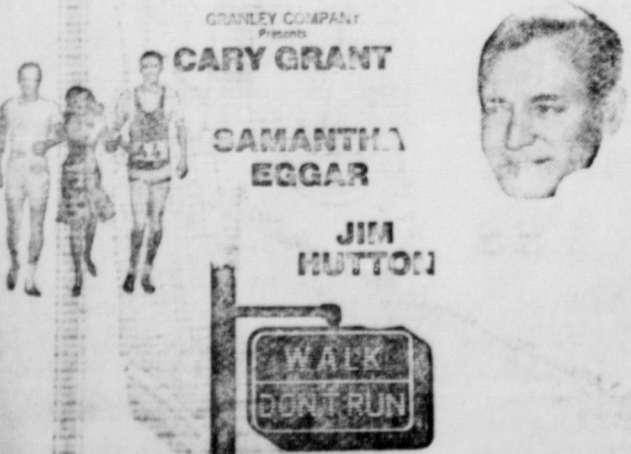

Bills was 17th District Commander of the American Legion from 1959 to 1961.

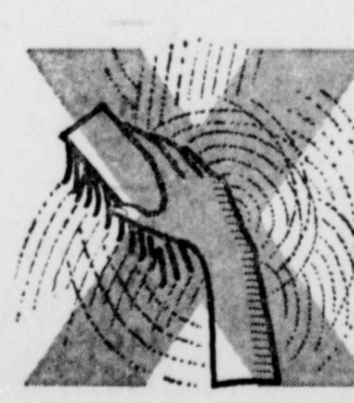

## Is Nelson Brown, In Fact, Buried In Eastland Plot?

An Eastland woman has entered the Nelson Brown estate case with claims that "Uncle Nelson" is buried in her family plot in Eastland Cemetery. She has reportedly shown interested persons the unmarked grave which she claims is Brown's.

Cemetery records do not date back to 1900, the year Brown died in Flatwood Community. City manager Lewis Tiner stated that "sketchy" records were compiled in the 1940's, using existing tombstones as a basis. Unmarked graves are not listed in this report.

A grave located near Brown's, was considered the final key in unraveling the estate.

What effects the latest claims will have on settlement of the estate are not known at this time.

### Now's Time To File Medicare, Benefits Forms

With the advent of medicare, it is now more important than ever that a person approaching retirement age know the proper time to sign up for his health insurance protection and for any monthly benefits he may have coming.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, explained that even if a person plans to work beyond age 65, he should make application to establish his eligibility under medicare sometime in the three months before the month he is 65. A delay means a loss of protection under medicare. Also, by not filing at the right time, the worker may also lose some monthly benefits.

Tuley pointed out that there is an initial seven-month enrollment period in which to elect medical insurance under medicare. This is the part of medicare which pays for doctor bills and involves a monthly premium of \$3 a month from the beneficiary, matched by \$3 from general Federal revenues.

The initial enrollment period begins with the third month before the month the person turns 65 and extends through the third month after that month.

When a person applies will determine the date his medical insurance protection goes into effect. If he applies in one of the three months before the month of his 65th birthday, his protection begins as soon as he reaches 65. If he waits until the month of his birthday or the 3 remaining months in his enrollment period, his coverage will be delayed from one to three months.

If the person misses his initial enrollment period altogether, he won't have another opportunity until the last three months of the next odd-numbered year. Then, he will have to pay a higher premium for the same protection. Also, his coverage will not begin until six to nine months after he enrolls.

Hospital insurance, which is the other part of the medicare program, is effective as soon as a person reaches 65.

There is no specific enrollment period for this part. For anyone receiving social security benefits prior to age 65, hospital insurance protection will be automatic the month age 65 is reached. These people will be notified automatically about signing up for the medical insurance if they want that protection to supplement their hospital insurance.

Tuley suggested that people now within 3 months of their 65th birthday plan to pay a visit to the social security office soon, bringing with them some proof of age, preferably a birth certificate or an early baptismal record. Other documents are usually acceptable. Generally speaking, the older the document, the better. For those who are at work, or for some other reason cannot come into their district offices, it is possible to start the application just by getting in touch with the district office by telephone or letter.
