Moisture Lack Is Hampering County Farmers

Lack of moisture continues to hamper Eastland County agriculture. Small grain conditions remain poor. The recent rains have caused some of the rye to begin growth, but the rain did not add much hope for even fair yields of oats and wheat in 1967. Most of these crops were already dead because of the lack of moisture.

Considerable damage has been done to peanut land in Eastland County by wind erosion this winter. No cover crops were established because of the dry condition. We do not know what effect this will have on next year's peanut crop. There is still time left to get adequate moisture before peanut planting unless the drought continues through the spring. Earlier planted crop will be delayed or lost altogether if we do not get rain in the near future.

The greatest danger caused by the drought has been the burning of grass land. Farmers and ranchers who properly managed their ranges and pastures had an excellent cover of grass going into the winter. This is necessary for livestock feed during the winter and to maintain good ranges and pastures. Many farmers and ranchers have lost their grass in a matter of hours to destructive fires. This is always a danger in the winter, but the grass has been especially vulnerable to fires because of the dry weather this year. Most stock tanks have some water left, but a shortage of stock water may be a real problem in Eastland County if we do not get rain within the next month or two.

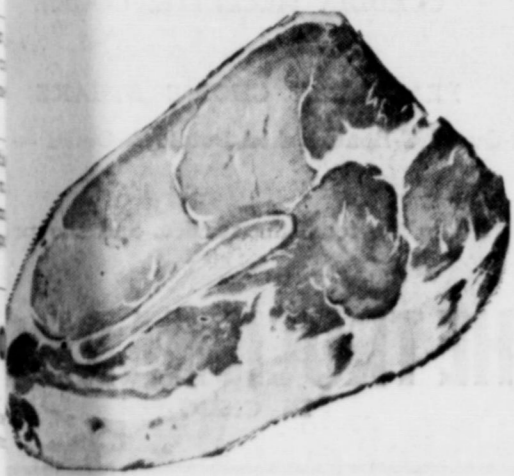
to the possibility of moving the beautiful fountain to the northeast lawn, from its present sidewalk position, it was reported.

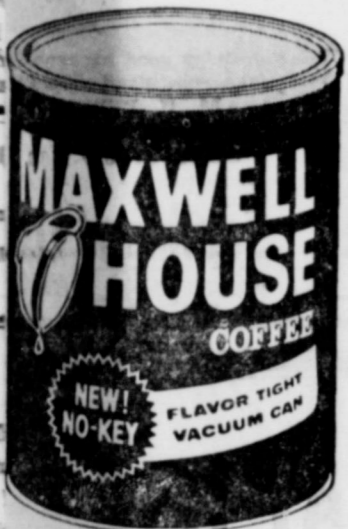

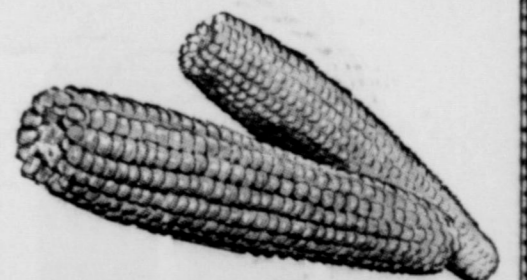

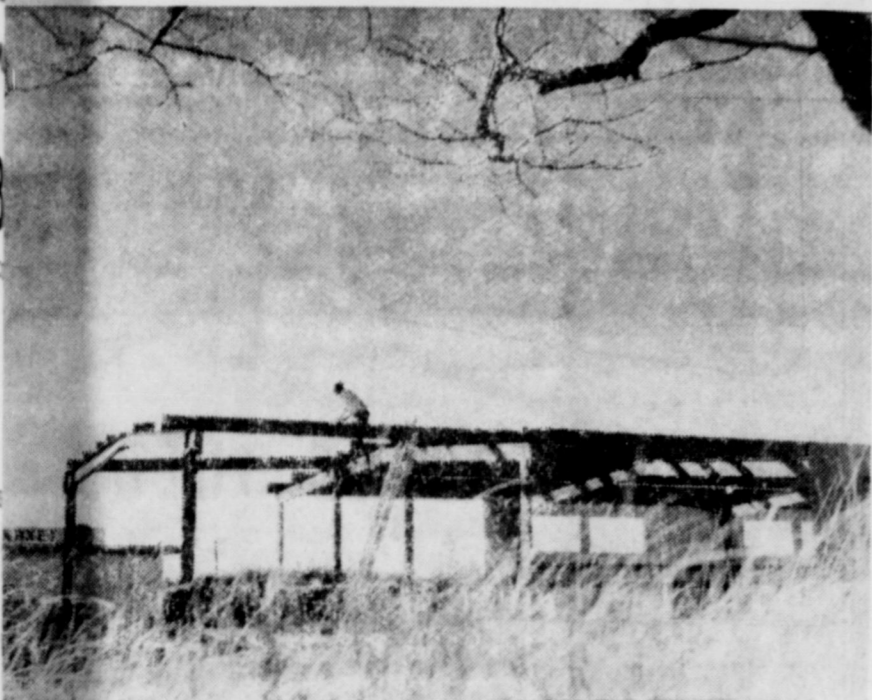

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HOMEMAKERS HINTS

Eastland County Home Demonstration Council met recently during the business session, plans for a spring trip to the Chandler Gardens in Weatherford were discussed. All the county home demonstration club women are looking forward to visiting the gardens which were created by Douglas Chandler in 1938. Many who have seen the Chandler Gardens say it is one of the beauty spots of the United States.

Making final arrangements for the trip includes a committee composed of Mrs. Joe Bond, Oiden; Mrs. D. F. Eaves, Gorman; Mrs. Jack Lusk, Eastland; Miss Willie Ward, Cisco; Mrs. Scott Bailey, Cisco; and Mrs. C. H. Stevens, Cisco.

Many of the new homes being built today are of the split-level type. Although the popular split-level house has many advantages, there are some disadvantages that should be studied.

Since the distance between the levels is only six to eight steps, the space is more easily accessible than in a two-story house with the same total space, but more steps. Even the few steps between the levels in a split-level house can be considered a disadvantage, especially for elderly or handicapped people.

The various areas for sleeping, living, and working are clearly defined and separated in the split-level house which allows for more privacy and quiet for family members.

One big advantage is that the split-level house requires less space on the lot than a one-story house of the same total space, leaving more area of the lot for outdoor living.

Since the split-level house was originally designed for a sloping lot, the exterior appearance is not always pleasing when the house is on flat land. The split-level plan can not always be used for a small house because many of the lines will be short and choppy, creating an unsatisfying design.

The split-level plan possesses some of the economical construction features of a two-story plan, such as less roof and foundation construction, but it may also present problems in connecting the staggered levels. Because there are many variables involved in a valid comparison, it is difficult to say whether the split-level is more economical than other types of houses.

Potatoes may be an overlooked choice for the reducing diet. A medium-sized potato, boiled or baked, contains about 100 calories. This is about the same number of calories as in a large apple, orange, or half a grapefruit.

The above constituted a quorum, at which time the following proceeding was held:

Director M. H. Perry introduced a resolution and moved its adoption; the motion was seconded by Director James A. Smith. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution prevailed by the following vote:

Ayes: M. H. Perry, James A. Smith, Charles Freyschlag, Lloyd L. Bruce, H. T. Wilson, T. M. Fullen, Dewey C. Cox, Jr., and Glyn Gilliam.

Nays: None.

The resolution adopted is as follows:

RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District that an election be called for the purpose of electing four directors of said district: Be it resolved by the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District:

1. That an election be held on April 4, 1967, in Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 888, passed by the Fifty-First Legislature and as amended by House Bill No. 845 by the Fifty-Third Legislature, for the purpose of electing four directors of said district.

2. For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is designated as two election precincts. All of that territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct" and all of that territory contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct."

3. (A) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held in the Recreation Hall and Mrs. J. A. Bates is hereby appointed as Election Judge for said election and she shall appoint such assistants as she deems necessary to assist her in holding said election.

(B) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the Eastland County Court House. E. E. Layton is hereby appointed Election Judge for said election and he shall appoint such assistants as he deems necessary to assist him in holding said election.

4. Only qualified voters residing in the "Ranger Precinct" and the "Eastland Precinct" as defined hereinabove who own taxable property therein and who have rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. Mr. H. T. Wilson and Mr. M. H. Perry and Mr. James A. Smith have made application to this Board to have their names printed on the ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballot, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing in of other names.

Each voter in the respective precincts shall leave on the ballot the names of the two candidates for whom he desires to vote. The two candidates in each precinct having the highest number of votes shall be elected.

7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property within one of the precincts comprising the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Eastland or the City of Ranger shall be elected as Director.

8. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Times and the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within said District, one time. Such publication to be at least ten days before April 4, 1967, the date set herein for said election.
