NYC, Title One Programs Contribute \$ 1/4 Million

Education in Eastland County is being "enriched" to the tune of about a quarter million dollars with the two federal programs now in progress here. Approximately 60 per cent of the Title One program, which is currently budgeted at \$106,239, has been collected by the county, County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey reports. The Neighborhood Youth Corps program is bringing \$157,980 in federal money into the county, Coordinator Tip Arther reports. The NYC program includes five other adjoining counties and is presently budgeted for helping 156 youngsters, he said. The Title One program has as its goal, the enrichment of teaching, for the purchase of teaching aids and supplies. Appropriation of the Title One money is based on the 1960 census of families under certain financial guidelines. The school district breakdown for the county is like this: Carbon, \$2,779; Cisco, \$17,071; Eastland, \$15,558; Gorman, \$9,613; Olden, \$6,133; Ranger, \$6,463; Rising Star, \$14,365; and Desdemona, \$2,983.

Graveside rites were to be held at 4 p. m. today at the Garden of Memories in Sweetwater with the Rev. William F. Hennig officiating. Mrs. Warwick, a Cisco resident since 1925, died at 8 a. m. Monday in Simmons Memorial Hospital, Sweetwater, following a long illness. She underwent surgery there a few months ago. She was born Jan. 20, 1896, in Wheaton, Ill. She married P. R. Warwick in 1920 in Pittsburgh, Pa. Mr. Warwick, who survives, is a retired accountant. Walker, second assistant chief; Ben Drake, secretary - treasurer; and Johnny Grimes, chaplain and drill captain. Guy Robertson is City Fire Marshal. Volunteer Chief Jackson has urged local citizens to be especially careful of grass fires because of the extreme dry weather, and asked that no one attempt to burn their own trash or burn off lots. Grass fire calls have been numerous, the chief said.

Railroads Seeking to Close Union Station, Freight Depot in Cisco

A hearing has been scheduled for 9 a. m. Tuesday, Jan. 24, in Austin on application of the Texas and Pacific Railway and the M-K-T Railway to discontinue their joint depot in Cisco, according to announcement by the Texas Railroad Commission. The railroads propose to discontinue use of the Union Station in Cisco as a freight terminal and "to retire and dismantle the depot building." The railroads also are asking the railroad commission for permission to "establish Cisco as a pre-paid station in the freight tariffs." The new plan of operation would be for freight handled through the railroads to Cisco to be unloaded at Eastland and distributed by truck. It was understood that shipments to Cisco have become economically unprofitable, causing the railroad to request the operating change. It was also understood that the Cisco work force would be eliminated under the new plan. Passenger service stops in Cisco were eliminated several months ago. The Eastland and Ranger freight offices would continue to operate. The business to Company and to Featherlite Corporation. Eastland also has considerable freight activity through its haydite manufacturing plant. A spokesman for the railroad said in Cisco recently "you won't notice the difference in service." He added that "we're just trying to cut expenses to a point where operation will be profitable."

The oath will be administered at 10 a. m. Tuesday in the district courtroom of the Palo Pinto County courthouse in Palo Pinto. Rep. Musgrove of Breckenridge stated that he felt that ceremonies at "home" would be more personal and meaningful than the mass ceremonies in Austin. He expressed the desire to be sworn in among those he will represent, namely the residents of Callahan, Shackelford, Eastland, Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties. Invited to simultaneously administer the oath to Mr. Musgrove are the five county judges—Scott Bailey, Eastland County; I. M. Chism, Shackelford; Roy Gilbreath, Callahan; Cecil Mayes, Stephens; and John H. Smith, Palo Pinto. The public has been invited to the short ceremony and following reception. Immediately after the morning's activities, Musgrove will travel to Austin, where he will participate in opening day functions of the 60th Texas Legislature.

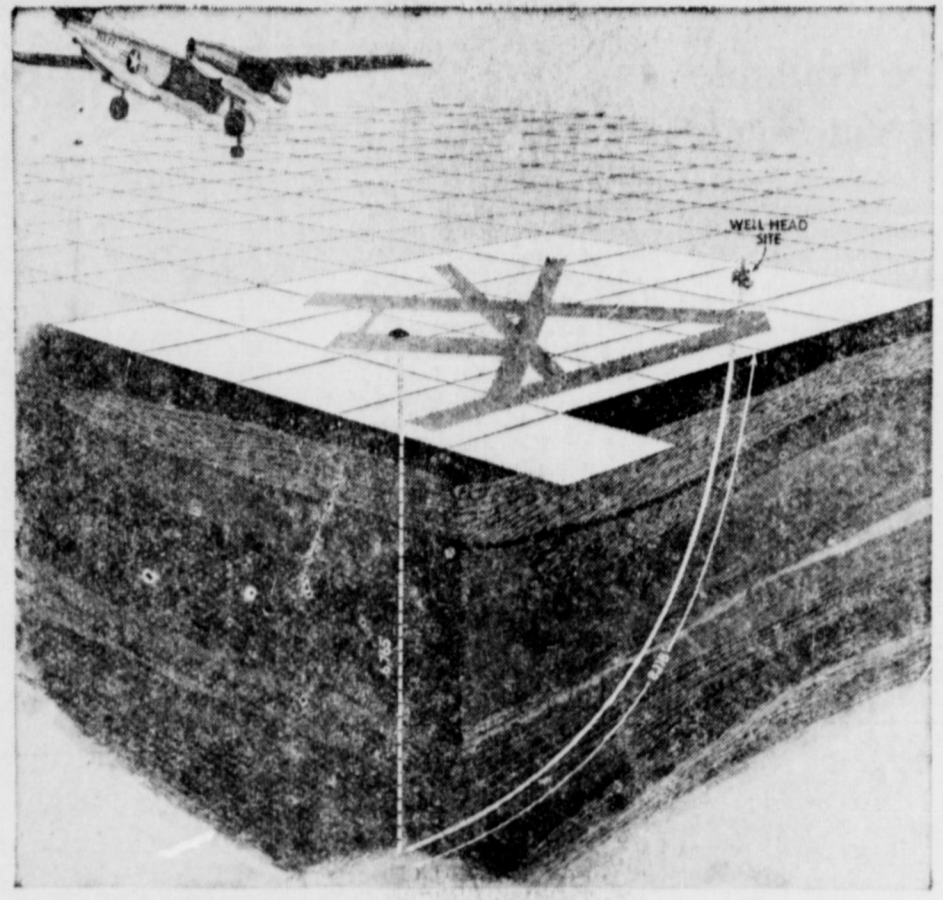

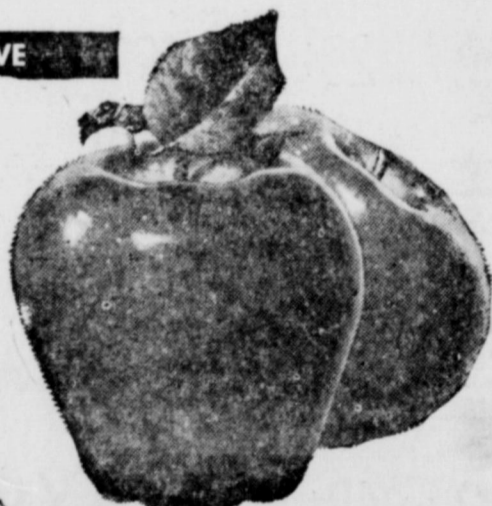
