Many Pretty Girls Due Thursday For Weekend Peanut Pageant

A triumphant year for one young lady will begin in Eastland this weekend as 11 beautiful entries compete for the title of Texas State Peanut Queen, 1970.

It will be a much-sought title. Competition within the individual peanut-raising counties has been hard, and when the finalists gather on the Majestic Theater stage Friday and Saturday evening, the judges will have their work cut out for them.

One Miss will become the State's Second Queen—but all the spectators will be winners. It'll be a show to please young and old.

The Lass who's chosen will become the second state queen, and the 10th to be picked in connection with the annual Jaycee Peanut Bowl festivities.

The 1969 and First State Queen, Miss Marsha White of Mason County, will be on hand to crown the new reigning queen. The 1970 queen will join a list of queens of impressive beauty. That list includes:

Sponsored by the Texas Peanut Producers Board and the Eastland Jaycees, the Second Annual Texas State Peanut Queen Pageant, will open with a musical concert Friday and Saturday at 7 p.m. at the Majestic Theater. The Pageant will begin at 3 p.m. each evening with Master of Ceremonies and featured

vocalist to the Clo Lewis of Dyess AFB. Music will be performed by the Dora Nell Finch at the organ. Admission is \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for children, each performance, with tickets on sale now from Jaycees.

Extra added attraction will be the appearance here of Miss Diane Swendeman, Miss Texas Universe, 1970, who will be on stage each evening, and who will assist with the presentation of awards Saturday evening.

The Peanut Queen is chosen each year from peanut princesses who represent counties with peanut allotments. Girls between the ages of 17 and 21, are judged on poise, personality, beauty and talent. Judges for the pageant are chosen from a variety of professions from over the state.

Regional television coverage is anticipated with a Fort-Worth Dallas station planning to do an extensive coverage of the county's peanut industry and the pageant in particular.

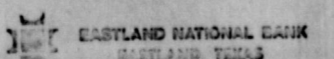

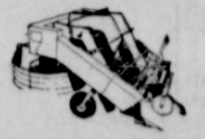

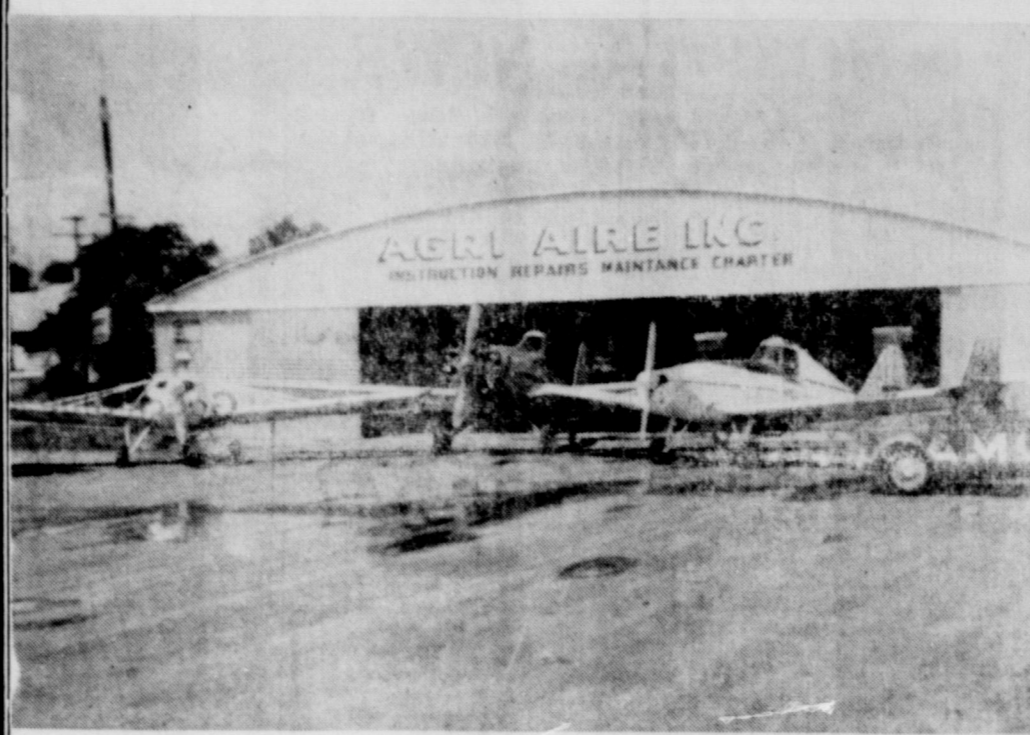

Three Way Race Looms In TJCF 1970 Season

KILGORE, Texas (Spl.—) With fall football practice less than two weeks away, the Texas Junior College Football Federation Clubs are in the midst of a season ticket drive and this is the first of a series on the prospects for this fall.

From early indications, the loop chase looks like a three team race between defending champ Tyler, always potent Henderson County and surprising Blinn.

Over at Tyler, Billy Wayne Andrews will have to do some job to top his initial years results.

Andrews guided the tribe to their first TJCF crown in the seven years of the loop and then included a post season 39 to 0 victor over Centerville, Iowa in the El Toro Bowl at Yuma, Ariz. to close out with a 10 and 1 mark.

The Apaches will return five starters each from the offense and defense and two others who lettered.

For the offensive team, heading up the line will be all-TJCF guard Bobby Barnett 5-9 195 pound soph. from Austin Reagan, Craig Loy, 5-11, 210 pound guard from Hn. Bellaire is also a returning starter and Raymond Kelsey, 6-2, 226 pound tackle from Anton, and Center Darrell Higdon, 6-1, 210 of East Peoria High of Grove Cover, Ill, have letters.

Andrews returns his backfield intact except for the signal caller. Topping the list will be halfbacks Godfrey White, 6-0, 195, from Corpus Christi Miller, and John Harvey, 6-2, 185 speedster from Austin Anderson and fullback Donald Ealey, 5-11, 210 from Austin Reagan.

White was the fifth leading scorer in the conference last season with 48 points on 8 TD's, John Harvey was 42 good for 7th place while Ealey tied for 8th with 33 points.

That Quarterback spot may prove troublesome for the tribe as the best early season bet is soph David Berman, 6-0, 190 of Hn. Marion. Brennan was used almost exclusively as a kicker last year, a job he did well enough to rank him in a second place tie on the scoring charts with 54 points.

Although all JUCO squads are subject to considerable flux due to the nature of the two year status of the schools, Andrews expects to fill in vacancies on the offensive team with wide receiver John Reese, Jr., 5-11, 180 of Vernon Lockett, tackle Millard Neely, 6-2, 250 of S. A. Brackenridge and tight end Charlie Johnson, 6-2, 230 of Brazoria West Columbia.

The defensive eleven will be built around rugged South Oak OHL sensation Tommie Powell, 6-2, 255 pound end, and Randy Perdue, 6-2 215 pound tackle from Chapel Hill, both returning starters James Garrett, 230 pound end from Charlton-Pollard of Beaumont is also a returnee in the line.

Howard Shaw, 5-11, 235 line backer from Austin Reagan, manned his spot last year and Larry Bowling, 6-0, 180 Safety of Dallas Woodrow Wilson is back again.

Looking to get into the act will be first year recruits Lewis Williams, 6-2, 250 pound tackle of San Angelo, linebacker Mike Harper, 6-1, 220, Arlington, and Dexter Bussy, 6-1, 190, J. F. Kennedy of Dallas and Halfbacks Tim Cook, 5-11, 180 of Austin McCollum, James Hendricks, 6-0, 185, Austin Reagan, and Bruce Neely, 6-0, 180, S. A. Brackenridge.

Tyler lost a couple of lettermen in guard Doyle Bridgeman, who had family problems, and Warren Lester, and end who broke his neck in a touch football game this spring.

Andrews has also signed some more stellar athletes including Wayne Simmons, 6-0, 185 pound quarterback from Silsbee, Rene Amaya 6-0, 220 pound linebacker from San Angelo, and Ray Harper, a speedster from Lufkin to spell the running backs. Simmons will also help with the punting.

In Junior College, you always lose some kids you were depending on and pick up some you didn't have a notion you were going to get but if Andrews can keep this group together, he has an excellent chance of repeating both as conference winners and on an individual basis a chance to be named as "Junior College Coach of the Year", by the Texas Sportswriters Association once more.

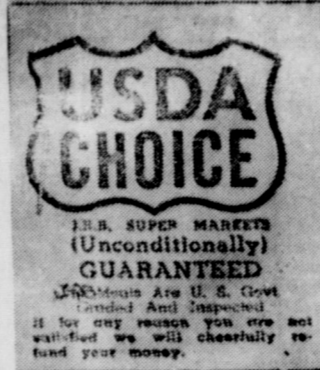

Meet Victor Cornelius, small town, big business. Inventions, innovations and modern communication send VC trademarks around the world—from the little West Texas town of Eastland.

Victor Cornelius: Master of Menus

If you order VC menus from the little West Texas Town of Eastland, you probably don't realize that you're ordering from the largest custom menu printing business in the United States with customers in all 50 states and many countries of the world.

From the creative mind of Victor Cornelius have come the ideas and innovations that have led his plant to this unique distinction. When equipment was not available to make his new ideas practical, he invented his own.

At an age when many are considering retirement, Cornelius invented his "Rediclip," a plastic clip-on holder for attaching restaurant "specials" to the menu. The white plastic of the clip provides excellent advertising space for point-of-purchase sales.

The success of the item, now sold internationally, can be seen in the fact that last year the company sold millions of these clips. The most recent foreign order for them came from Hong Kong, China.

The extruded plastic of these clips, which function on the principle of the bobby pin, arrives in 15 to 20 mile reels. How to cut it, print it, package it, and sell the finished product were problems that Cornelius worked out, inventing much of the necessary production equipment.

Though the firm does four-color printing, because of its expenses to the customer, Cornelius devised a less-expensive yet equally as effective version.

Color-printed decals of food items are heat-sealed into specific positions on each menu. The pages are then laminated to produce a slick, custom-printed, slightly-embossed effect.

To accomplish this Cornelius invented a complicated contraction capable of sealing six different decals into place at once. Fascinating to watch, the machine "breathes" on the decals to separate them, then quickly places them and seals them into place at 270 degree temperature.

The company, which has gross sales of well over a million dollars annually, offers a large variety of menus to suit the budgets of the smaller cafes as well as of the more expensive restaurants. The economic monthly menu provides the restaurant with fresh, attractive menus each month. This has the advantage of giving the restaurant owner a chance for price changes at frequent intervals.

Covers, always in full color vary each month and have a seasonal theme. Approximately 500 restaurants order these menus regularly.

Artists employed by the firm work out designs for those who prefer their own distinctive cover. Among the more elegant menus available are those of gold-stamped leatherette. With inside pages of parchment, tied with silk cord, these are a favorite of exclusive establishments.

In all, the firm uses three major techniques—offset, silk screen and gold stamp.

The largest order the firm has received to date came recently from Ramada Inns.

The use of the menus by Air Force and Army base clubs is responsible for their wide distribution throughout the world. Sales are particularly good in Australia and Canada.

Last summer on a trip to Hawaii, Cornelius visited with customers there.

In addition to a number of sales people who work directly for the company, the John Sexton Company handles sales of the menus on a nationwide basis. A great deal of business is done by mail.

Cornelius started in the printing business in 1936 when he had an idea for "motion picture" advertisements attached in metal framework to restaurant napkin holders.

Obtaining a patent on this invention, Cornelius began the printing of theatrical advertisements with a \$150 platen press in a small building off his garage.

Other forms of theatrical advertising developed and eventually their printing by the company surpassed that of the original item.

In 1958, Cornelius got his start in the menu business with the purchase of Osment Menus of Waco.

After outgrowing two different locations, Cornelius' plant found its current home in a 2-story building which, with its parking facilities, occupies an entire city block on Highway 80.

There, in its 27,000 square feet of space, is a complete self-contained plant with equipment for every aspect of menu production under one roof. Color-separation cameras, film processing equipment, and a photo-engraving plant are all included.

In a business that often uses the messiness of printer's ink as an excuse for disorder, Cornelius runs a plant that is modern, clean and attractive. His 75 employees include two who have been with the firm since its beginning. As he says, "They were here when I came."

With an annual payroll of more than \$500,000, Cornelius has created a warm relationship with his employees through surprise pay raises and bonuses throughout the year.

He enjoys giving these in unexpected ways as when he called employees together and had them draw envelopes to see who would get the one containing a prize \$100 bill. At the count of three the envelopes were to be torn open and the winner was to hold up his prize. A photographer was on hand to capture the wide-eyes expression of all, as each found himself "winner."

Cornelius was born in Lime-
