#### 1st Federal S&L **Achieves Record**

Assets of the First Federa Savings and Loan Association of Ranger as of Dec. 31, 1967, totalled \$4,314,196.74, up 12.12 per cent from \$3,848,774.97 reported at the close of 1966, according to Mr. F. P. Brashier, Sr., president of the assocfation, and to the statement of condition published else where in this edition.

Mr. Brashier stated that the savings capital held by the essociation now amount to \$4,-048,598.87 as compared to the \$3,601,093.99 total at the end of 1966, a gain for the year of \$456,504.88, and that dividends paid to savers in the associa tion during 1967 totalled \$176.

He further stated that regulations governing savings and loan associations require that each association keep in cash an amount equal to 7 per cent of the total savings capi tal in that association and that in the case of the First Federal of Ranger the cash on hand and in banks at the end 1967 amounted to \$585, which was 14.47 per cent of total savings, over double the amount required This puts the association in very fine position to meet withdrawals requests as well as ample funds from which to make new mortgage loans.

After the close of the books Dec. 31, 1967, the association had \$204,199.25 in the reserve for losses. However Mr. Brasilier stated that losses to the association in its entire 33 history had been less than \$500.

He stated that prospects for continued growth of the association are very bright. The association will move early in this year to its new home in the building purchased from the Commercial State Bank where with expanded facilities and space the association will be better able to care for the needs and wishes of its customers.

Mr. Brashier stated that he wished to thank on behalf of the officers, directors and employees of the association, its many friends and custom ers, both savers and borrowers, for the splendid support given the association.
