

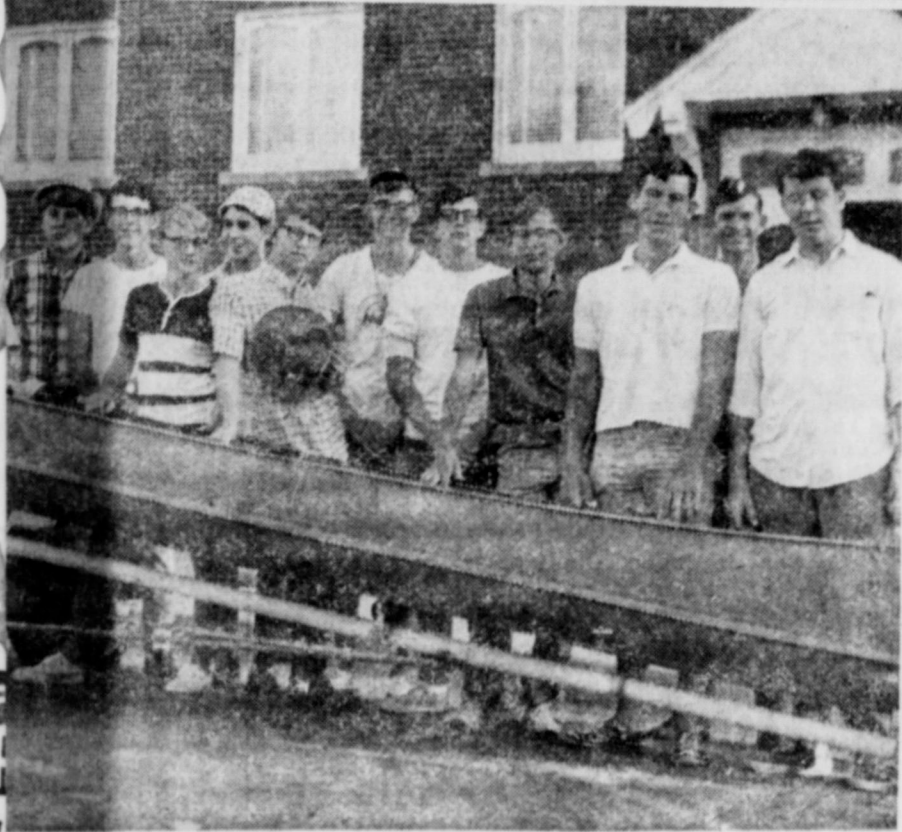

Could Hurt County? . . .

House Bill Would Permit Sale Of Peanut Alloted Acres For Moving

The future of the peanut industry in Eastland County may have had a dark cloud passed over it this week as final action on a U. S. House of Representatives bill drew nearer.

House Bill 6383, if passed, would approve the transfer of peanut allotments, and this will spell the doom for the peanut growing industry in this county, well-informed sources believe.

If such a transfer procedure were approved, it would permit landowners in the more-productive areas to buy and or lease land in Eastland County, offering the local owners exceptional prices, then have the allotments transferred from this county to their acreages elsewhere where their yields per acre would be higher. But the allotments would then be gone, possibly forever.

Both organized farm groups and individuals in this county have issued statements opposing the passage of the bill, and the time apparently is imminent. The bill was to have come up for vote this week.

Regulations now permit the sale, the transfer or leasing of cotton allotments out of this county, and the peanut measure presumably would allow the same thing. The original cotton bill provided that allotments could be sold, transferred or leased "within" the county, and a referendum election of raisers in this county passed last year, permits the further sale, transfer or lease "outside" the county. Of course, this county doesn't have much cotton allotment, but with peanuts, it would be a different story.

Both the Farmers Union and the Farm Bureau have issued statements opposing the transfer bill.

FB President Jack Cozart quoted from the FB National Policy Book and said: "Our policy is more specific and leaves no doubt about our position. It states that 'We oppose the lease or exchange of allotments and the sale of allotments except when made to the federal government for permanent retirement.'"

FB Legislative Director Ed McKay has advised the local office: "Our Washington staff has advised each member of the House of Representatives Committee on Agriculture of our policy in regard to the sale, lease or transfer of allotments, and of our opposition to HB 6383. We understand that some Farm Bureau (Continued on Page 4)

James N. Jordan, 88, died at 5 p. m. Thursday in Eastland Memorial Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Funeral was held 5 p. m. Saturday in the Hamner Funeral Chapel, with Gary Adams, minister of Cisco Church of Christ officiating.

Burial was in Murray Cemetery at Carbon.

Mr. Jordan was born Dec. 23, 1878, in Alabama and came to Eastland County with his family when he was one year old. He was a retired farmer and a pioneer school teacher. He lived at 702 West Commerce in Eastland.

He married Tennie L. Weaver in Carbon. He was a member of the First Christian Church in Olney.

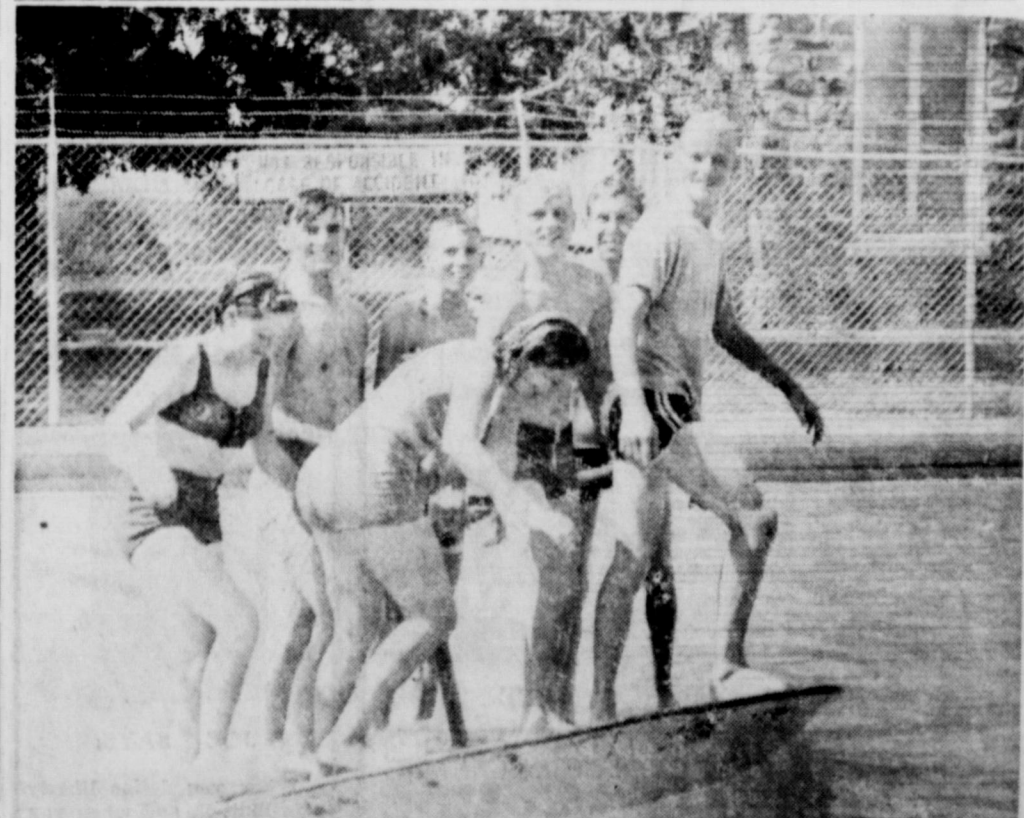
First Federal Resources Exceed \$4 Million Mark

Mr. F. P. Brashier, Sr., president of the First Federal, today announced that as of the semi-annual closing June 30, the institution has assets in excess of four million dollars. This new plateau represents a continued remarkable growth of the institution, Mr. Brashier stated.

According to the institution financial statement printed elsewhere in this issue they have 53,293,438.06 in first mortgage loans on homes in their lending area. The statement shows the institution to have \$509,814.66 cash, slightly over one-half million dollars, in cash on hand and in banks. This represents a splendid liquidity position Mr. Brashier said. In addition the institution has \$224,312.52 in specific reserves, general reserves, surplus and undivided

profits. Mr. Brashier predicted a continued growth for the Association, particularly after it is moved into its new home, the present Commercial State Bank Building, which is expected to be around the first of 1968 after the bank's new building is completed and their present building vacated.

ORDER FOR CITY OFFICERS ELECTION

I, W. F. Deaton, in my capacity as Mayor of the City of Eastland, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held in said City on the 29th day of August, 1967, for the purpose of electing the following officials for said City:
One Commissioner
That in accordance with an order adopted by the City Commission of said City, said election shall be held at the following place in said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:
In Election Precinct No. 1, at CITY HALL, Building, in said City, with E. E. Layton as Presiding Judge, and Hoover Pittman as Alternate Presiding Judge and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed 6 clerks.

That said election should be held in accordance with the Election Code of this State and only resident qualified voters of said city shall be eligible to vote at said election.
That the City Secretary shall give notice of said election by posting a copy of this order in each of the election precincts of said city, which posting shall be done not less than 30 days prior to date fixed for said election.

That immediately after said election is held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Mayor of this city as required by the Election Code of this State.
A copy of this order shall also serve as a writ of election which shall be delivered to the above appointed Presiding Judges, for said election.

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Mrs. Y. A. Wright Is Hostess For Art Club Meet

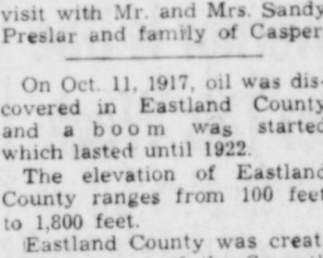

Farm Safety Week Begins In County Sunday in Observances

County Judge Scott Bailey has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967, as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, according to Jack Cozart, President of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort, Mr. Cozart continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm

accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, and SMV emblems.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Bailey said: "All the citizens of Eastland County are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we received our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, cause profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are involved."

"During this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs, the Texas Safety Association,

Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Eastland County Farm Bureau, with the theme "Think and Act Safety".

County Farm Bureau President Jack Cozart said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday - reverence for life; Monday - safety begins at home; Tuesday - agricultural chemicals; Wednesday - prevent falls; Thursday - rural highway safety; Friday - farm machinery; Saturday - recreation safety.

members in Georgia are in favor of this bill and have indicated their support to the subcommittee which conducted hearings on the bill. Peanut producers seem to be very divided on the bill, even in Texas, and some Farm Bureau members are supporting the bill in opposition to our policies.

Henry Fry of Cisco, Eastland County Farm Bureau policy execution chairman, and Cowan Hutton of Rising Star, policy development chairman, have both been working on this matter and reported to the Farm Bureau membership recently.

Lyndell Coan and Joe Morgan, who were among seven Texans testifying against the bill at a recent hearing, reported to the Comanche County Farmers Union recently in D. Leon. The bill would apply to the 1968 and 1969 peanut crops. A Louisiana congressman was quoted as saying, "If this bill is passed, the only thing left in my state will be welfare, relief and social security."

If passed in its present form, a farmer could sell his peanut allotment to someone in any area of the state. The buyer could then in turn transfer the allotment but could only transfer in accordance of the productivity of the land in his area. That is, if the land here produced 25 bushels per acre and 100 bushels where he transferred to, he could only use one fourth of the allotment from this county and the remainder would be turned back to the department of agriculture. The maximum total acres for peanuts in the U. S. today is 1,610,000, so the possibility of losing peanut allotment acres is great, it is reported.

The reported "catch" to the bill is the last paragraph which gives the Secretary of Agriculture the power, as his discretion, to do what he wishes on peanut allotment.

Another problem this would create would be the inability of a tenant farmer to obtain a loan with which to produce a crop.

Congressman W. R. "Bob" Poage of Waco, chairman of the Agriculture Committee, has stated that he felt the bill will not pass at the present time and in its present wording, but the bill could be amended at any time, in any way. He said that perhaps a regional bill could be passed to alleviate the small operator problem in Georgia, Alabama and parts of South Carolina. He suggested a limitation on transfers with a referendum vote of two-thirds (as with cotton presently) plus a restriction of not over 20 acres to be transferred, added to the bill.

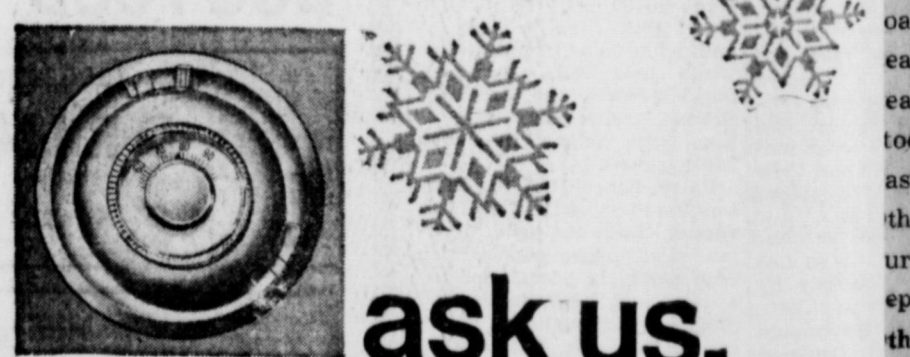

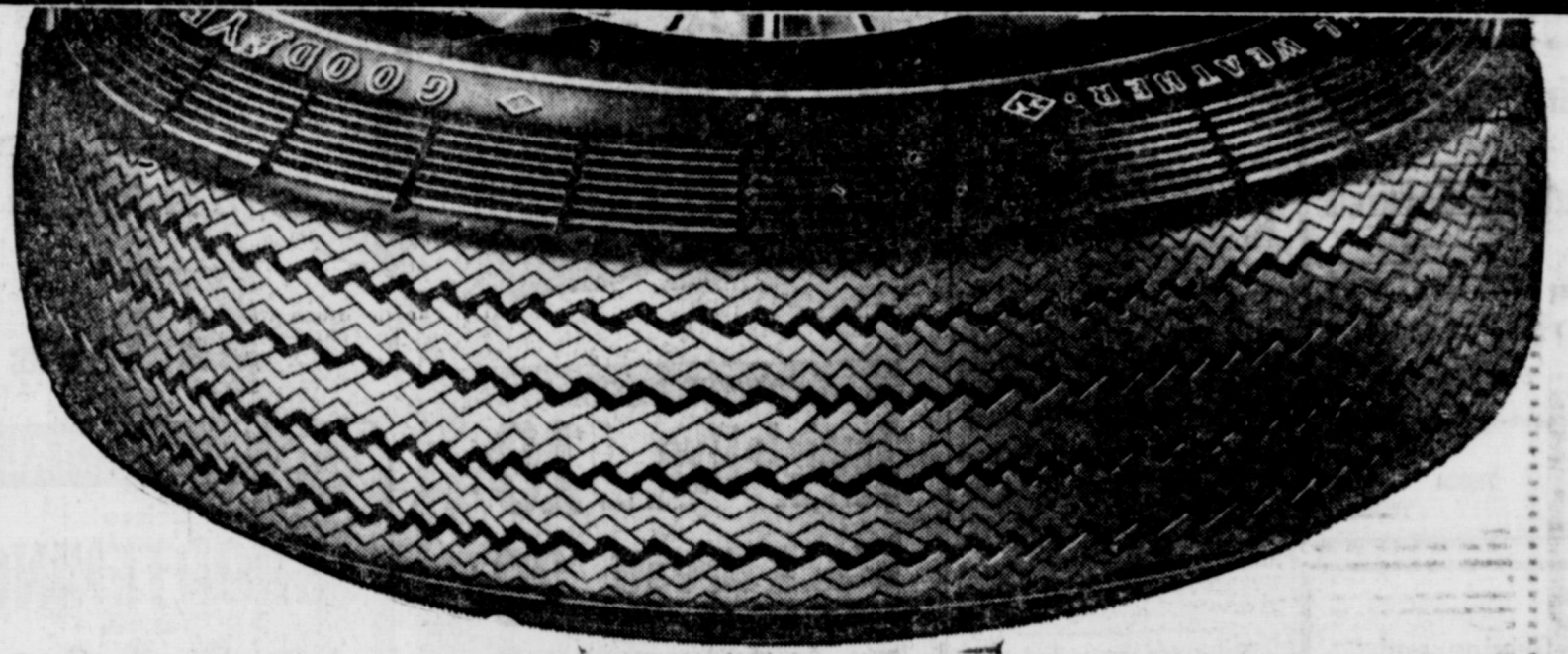

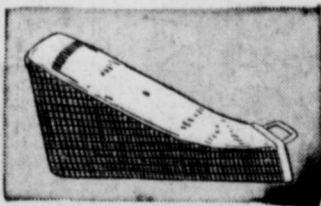
