THERE COMES a time when the old desk top has to be cleaned off, and from that, these gleanings:

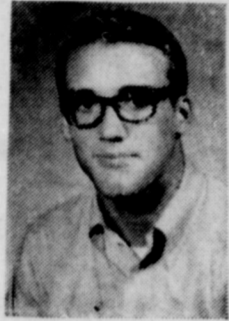

## Randall Treadwell Loses in Tennis Finals

Eastland High School's Randall Treadwell took runner-up honors in the State Tennis Tournament in Austin Saturday, losing a heart-breaker in the finals 6-3, 6-1



to a preannual foe. The 6'4" Eastland Junior, triumphed in the first round, 6-2, 6-1, Friday, easily downing John Johnson of Crane.

Advancing smoothly through the District and Regional Competition, Randall came out with a 6-2, 4-6, 6-2 for the Regional Title. It started back in District play when he defeated Craig Pruitt of Clyde, 6-2, 6-0.

A top scholar as well as outstanding athlete, Randall is the son of Dr. and Mrs. M. A. Treadwell Jr.

Other honors include a place on the All-Area Basketball Team, as well as District honors.

Randall is an outstanding record in tennis. He won first place in District 8AA and first place in Region IIA in his freshman and sophomore years. At the State Tennis meet in 1968, he lost in the semi-finals and in 1969 he won second place in AA boys singles.

Randall plays 1st chair trombone in the Eastland High School band and made All-District and All Region bar this freshman, sophomore, and junior years.

In addition Treadwell is a straight "A" student. He has led his class scholastically each year through junior high and so far through his school. He has received the Outstanding Student Award for the last three years.

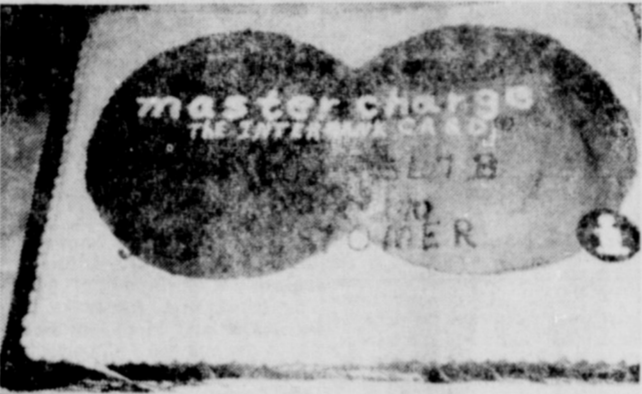
## FULLEN MOTOR Co. LAUGH-A-DAY

## Mrs. Inez Bourdeau Heads Up New Department at Bank Here

Following the regular monthly meeting of the Directors of the Eastland National Bank held on Thursday, May 7, 1970, H. T. Wilson, President of the Bank, revealed the addition of a new Special Services and Women's Department. Mr. Wilson also announced at this time that Mrs. Inez Harrell Bourdeau, who will head the new department, has been elevated to the position of Assistant Vice-President.

Mrs. Bourdeau joined the Staff of the Eastland National Bank as a Teller on February 1, 1962 advanced to Assistant Cashier in April of the same year, and assumed the duties

of Assistant Cashier and Executive Secretary in December, 1965.

She was previously associated with the Ranger Times, Eastland Telegram, Mineral Wells Index, and the Breckenridge American Newspapers. She had held various positions in the business offices and editorial departments and for a time served as auditor for this newspaper chain. She was the Advertising Manager of the Breckenridge American for six years just prior Bank.

The former Inez Harrell, daughter of Mrs. R. E. Harrell and the late Robert Emil Harrell, Mrs. Bourdeau was

born in Ranger, is a graduate of Ranger High School and attended Ranger Junior College. Since early childhood she has been a member of the First Christian Church there and served for many years as a Sunday School Teacher in the Kindergarten and Primary Departments. She has also served for four years as Church Clerk and Secretary to the Board. She is a member of Ranger Chapter 275, Order of Eastern Star, and has served two years as Worthy Matron of this Chapter. She has also served as a Deputy Grand Matron of District 3, Section 4, Grand Chapter of Texas, Order of Eastern Star.

She assisted in the organization and holds charter memberships in four Beta Sigma Phi Chapters, and is a past president of three of these chapters. In March of 1966, she received the Order of the Rose Degree from Xi Zeta Nu Chapter in Ranger. She served as Chairman of the Eastland County Heart Association for three years and as Memorial Chairman for the past six years. She also served as a Director and as Treasurer of the Eastland County Red Cross for two years.

Mrs. Bourdeau has been a member of the Southwestern Division of the National Association of Bank Women since 1956, and is a member of the Abilene Chapter of the American Institute of Banking, where she has completed a number of bank study courses.

She is married to William L. Bourdeau, a building contractor, and the couple has two children, William Harrell, a seven year old first grader, and Suzette Aliceanne, three years old. They make their home at Route Two, Ranger.

## Dr. Norman Durham Is 'Distinguished Alumni'

Dr. Norman N. Durham, microbiologist and dean of the Graduate College at Oklahoma State University, is one of three honored as "Distinguished Alumni" Friday at North Texas State University, Denton.

Dr. Durham, dean of OSU since 1967, is a native of Eastland and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Durham of 999 S. Seaman. He is a graduate of Eastland High and NTSU with the bachelor of science degree in 1949 and the master of science in 1951.

He was awarded a doctor of philosophy degree in bacteriology and biochemistry from the University of Texas at Austin in 1954 and that same year joined the microbiology at Oklahoma State.

In 1953, he received training in radioisotope techniques at the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission's Oakridge, Tenn., laboratories.

Dr. Durham served as a visiting lecturer in 1963 at the OSU School of Medicine and in 1966-67 was program director for molecular biology and cellular genetics for the Atomic Energy Commission in Washington D. C.

Since 1963 Dr. Durham has served as a consultant in biological sciences to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and since 1968 has been an evaluator for both the National Science Founda-

tion and the National Council for Accreditation of Teachers Education.

He is the author of over 65 scientific articles and is currently researching protein and enzyme synthesis; mechanism of antibiotic action; metabolic regulation; cell growth and reproduction; and genetic transformations.

Receiving Distinguished Alumni's citations at the annual University Day celebration along with Dr. Durham will be Dr. Julia Smith, New York, who in 1963 was named one of the top women composers in the United States and Dr. Don W. Micks, chairman of the department of preventive medicine and community health at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

Following the presentation, Dr. John G. Stoessinger, acting director of the Political Affairs Division of the United Nations, presented the University Day address, "What a University Is."

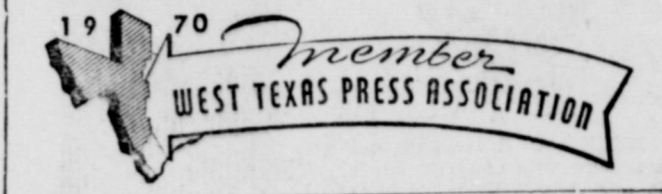

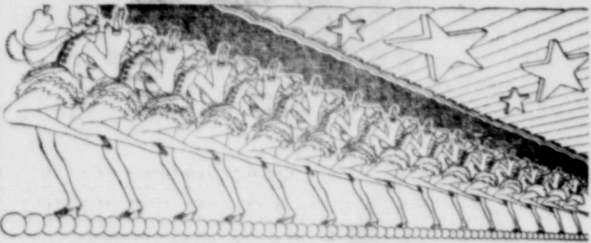

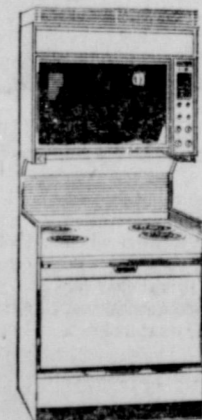

# IT HAS BEEN

We hear so much these days about the generation gap between adults and youth.

There is another generation gap worthy of mention—that of newspapers, the make-up and quality of present day newspapers compared with newspapers of 1903-'04.

If the editors of today published items like those printed in the Rising Star X-Ray of those years, his subscription list would be nil. But times change, the likes and the dislikes of people change and it is amusing to repeat some of the news items and stories from the pen of Albert Tyson, regarded as a scholar and a first class news man when he was owner and editor of the X-Ray in the early 1900's.

In writing of the possibility of the Rock Island Railroad being extended from Graham through Rising Star and on to Brownwood, Mr. Tyson said: "This is pre-eminently the chance for Rising Star to get a railroad. The railroad company should be acquainted with every commercial fact relative to this neck of the woods, which would likely be an inducement for them to run their system through our fair city. This is the utmost that we can do. As to 'filthy lucre' we just 'aint'er."

"I hate two-faced people."

Under this caption an article by the editor "cussed (three times over) two-tongued men; the man who wears a smile and tells you to your face what you had heard he had said was untrue, and as soon as your back is turned he surreptitiously and stealthily tells your neighbor that he told you face to face that he said all those things about you that he was reported to have said, and more. Let the name of such BLACKMAILING, LYING, KONSUMATE, KOWARDLY, KLUTTER be a hissing byword, a reproach to all honor, both moral and religious."

Tyson's definition of a woman's hat ran like this. "A hat, that is a female's hat, or the hat of a female, that is a female woman's hat of the latest brand, up-to-This Very Now, is a monstraunt pile of straw, say 3x4 feet, seven stories high with a hawk-bill, owl's head, buzzard wings, skunk tails, a whole flower garden, etcetra, etcetra, galore together with nine yards of twenty-seven different kinds of ribbon dangling and streaming there-about in the neighborhood of said straw pile, and barely just enough woman underneath the afore-said gorgeous and conglomerated admixture to serve as a ballasting and to totter and wobble along with the same pitiful pile of putrified promosity."

During 1903 an article appeared in the Eastland Chronicle relative to repair of the district courtroom. Doyle is an old-timer in this neck of the woods, having taught school here about 25 years ago. He also served as Justice of the Peace and was a 'holy terror' to the law-breakers."
