## City Commission Tables Lone Star Rate Appeal

The Eastland City Commission tabled a request by Lone Star Gas Co. Monday night for a 25 per cent rate increase for gas users in Eastland.

Agreeing to re-appear here at the next monthly meeting, or sooner at a called meeting, Mr. Bramer and Local Manager James Zusspahn left the meeting.

asked for "average" Eastland bills, stating that many of the citizens here are pensioned and therefore could not afford to pay more for gas service.

Points discussed by Mr. Bramer included: Original cost of the system here less accumulated provision for depreciation. Reproduction cost new less allowance for age and condition. Fair value rate base. Income statement. Revenue deficiency statement. Proposed residential and commercial rate ordinance. Biggest point of discussion was the matter of "depreciation".

Discussion by Commissioner ers, all present, afterward indicated that the City Fathers are unanimously opposed to the 25 per cent rate hike. The present rate was set in 1953. The increase, if approved, would put gas at \$1.90 per 1,000 cu ft. or fraction thereof (gross); \$1.71 net; and 1.0767 per mcg gross for each additional 1,000 cu ft.; Net \$9.69 per mcg.

Mr. Bramer explained to Mr. Wilson that his company bought the local system from The Texas Co. for \$261,000 in 1926. In other business the Commissioners passed an ordinance to close part of S. Green St. Agreed to send Glen Scallion a letter of thanks for the major improvements made in the Southern Television System Corp.'s facilities here.

## Part of South Green St. Closed by Ordinance

Mr. Walton asked, "I'm wondering which set of figures your company used to arrive at its present investment." Mr. Wilson contended that the company's original investments here have been "depreciated" out (through tax measures) and that in fact, if any, investment here.

Periodic traffic congestion on West Green St. from South Mulberry St. to its dead-end at South Green St. and on South Green St. between West Commerce St. and West Plummer St. resulted in the passage of an ordinance by City Commissioners Monday to close part of Green St. and make West Olive St. one-way west for a block.

The ordinance sets out that vehicular traffic on West Olive St. between South Green and South Mulberry St. shall proceed in a westerly direction only. The ordinance further states that the portion of South Green St. lying between West Plummer and West Olive Sts., be permanently vacated and closed as a public street, and that a quit-claim deed be issued to the owners of the abutting land. Eastland Memorial Hospital is the sole landowner involved.

## Red Tape Binding Care Medical-Sec. Reports

EDITOR: "This is to let the people 65 years of age or older know what is going on with the latest ultimatum from the government concerning Medicare."

"I have never before written to a newspaper about anything but I feel that the people should know what is going with the government and its interference with the practice of medicine."

"In order to make accurate cover determination for injections, we have been advised that complete itemization is required. This itemization must include the name of the drug injected, the quantity and where appropriate, the strength. These requirements apply to the process of a signed claims filed by the physician and non assigned claims filed by the beneficiary or physician."

Letters have been mailed to key persons and it is hoped that a good number will be on hand not only for this planning session, he said, but also for the Eastland-Cisco football game on the night of Nov. 7 in Eastland.

"Having worked in a doctor's office for the past 10 years, I feel qualified to state that not only is this ultimatum ridiculous, but absolutely impossible. Even with the addition of two extra clerks, this multitude of red tape could not be accomplished. With each Medicare Newsletter, we have been more and more bound down by needless paper work. The cost of such red tape will eventually skyrocket the cost of medical care for the elderly, instead of reducing it as the department of Health, Education and Welfare insists it is doing."

## KRAFT APPLES

49 Kraft caramels (one 14-ounce package). Two tablespoons water. Four or five medium size apples. Wooden sticks. Melt caramels in double boiler with water until smooth. Dip apples in sauce, letting excess run off. Place on Saran wrap to cool. Put in separate bags.

## STRAWBERRY APPLES

12 wooden sticks. 12 red apples. One and one-half cups Quik strawberry-flavored mix. One and one-half cups sugar. Two teaspoons vinegar. Two-thirds cup water. Combine strawberry-flavored mix, sugar, vinegar and water in a one-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Boil, without stirring, to 300 degrees (hard heat). Dip apples quickly into syrup. Twirl above to let excess syrup drip back into pan. Set apples on Saran wrap to set. Bag individually.

# Caddo Art Center To Officially Open Sat.

Local artists and lovers of art are looking forward to Saturday, Oct. 25, when they will go to Caddo for the opening of the Caddo Art Center.

Show days will be from a one day thru Sunday, Nov. 1, and will feature works of well known artists, as well as amateurs who are invited to exhibit works for sale or merely for viewing.

The art-center is a dream come true for Don Heubner, an artist who plans to retire and devote full time operation of the art center museum which he hopes will be an operation by January 1.

Heubner has a long time lease with Caddo Community Club, a non-profit organization for the still-undeveloped two-story open building 15,000 sq. ft.

The clean-up details are being done and laborious, beginning with cleaning grounds about the roof and painting the walls.

The once bustling town of Caddo is now a ghost town, bordered on two sides by creeks and surrounded by wooded hills, a perfect haven for an artist to relax or work. Heubner claims to have the only art center with outdoor plumbing (17-hole accommodation) which he plans to paint in eye-catching colors as well as restoring an old-fashioned drinking fountain.

Area artists will join other exhibitions of paintings in his, the first show at the center.

## Rev. Wilson at Installation for Bishop Cassata

Rev. Peter Robert Wilson was in Fort Worth Tuesday attending installation ceremonies for Bishop John J. Cassata.

Bishop Cassata's first Bishop of Fort Worth, was installed by Archbishop Luigi Riboldi of Wash., D.C. Apostolic Delegate to the United States.

Participating in ceremonies were the 12 bishops of Texas and Okla. Rev. Wilson was one of seven priests, seven deacons and seven laymen representing Catholics of the new diocese welcoming the bishop.

The diocese includes Tarrant County, west to include Eastland County, north to Oklahoma, west to Wichita Falls and Quanah, embracing a total of 28 counties with an area of 23,950 square miles with a total population of 1,136,200; a Catholic population of approximately 75,000. The area is served by a staff of 76 priests, 244 sisters and 16 religious brothers.

Rev. Wilson is pastor of St. Rites Church of Ranger, St. Johns Church in Strauss, St. Francis Church in Eastland and Holy Rosary Church in Cisco.

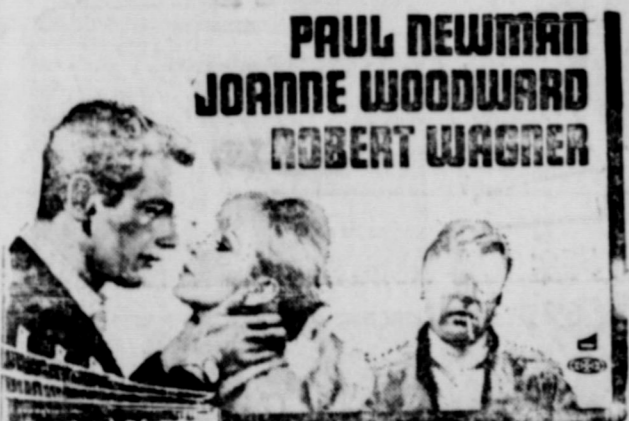

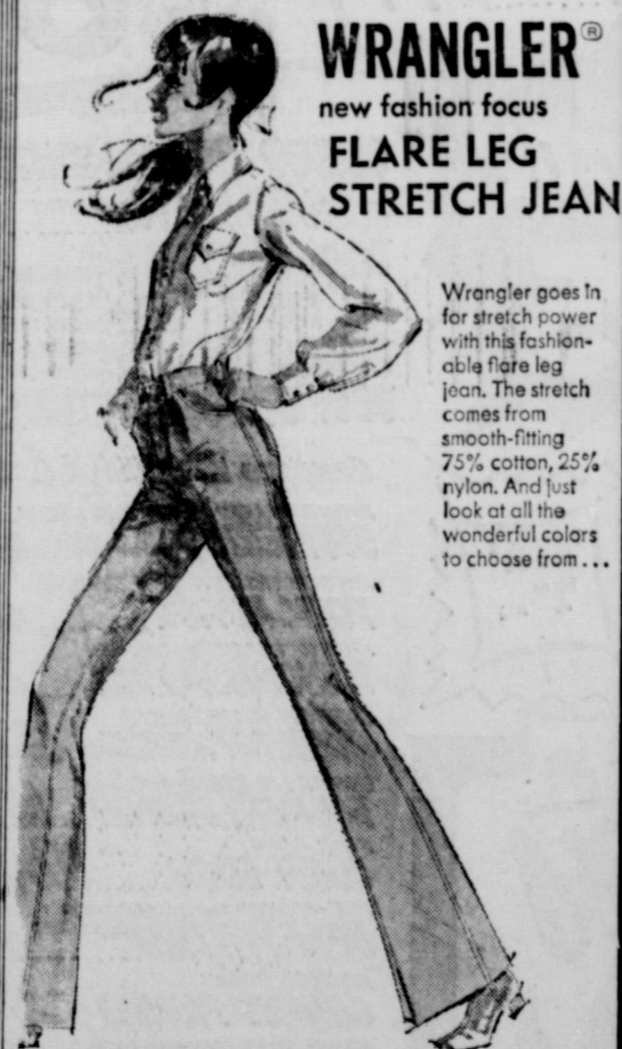

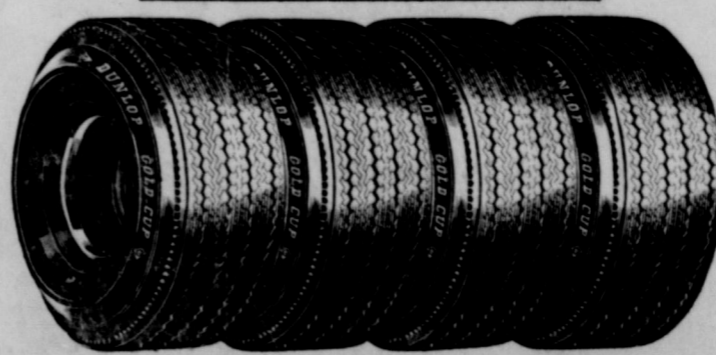
