





Lone Star Rate Appeal

ommission

The Eastland City Commission tabled a request by Lone Star Gas Co. Monday night for gas users in E.stland.

The announcement by Mayor Frank Deaton that the commission would prefer to study the matter longer, came following a lenghity presentation by Lone Star Regional Manager Bill Bramer of Abilene, who outlined a six-exhibit 1953. proposal.

Points discussed by Mr. Bramer included:

Original cost of the system here less accumulated provision for depreciation.

Reproduction cost new less mcf. allowance for age and condition.

. Fair value rate base.

Income statement

Revenue deficiency statement

Proposed residential and commercial reite ordinance. Biggest point of discussion was the mainter of "depreciation".

Citizens Emory Walton and Cliff Wilson both spoke out in questioning the manner in which the "fair return" figures were arrived at.
