Funeral Rites Held Thursday For Mrs. Sandler

Funeral services and burial for Mrs. Netta G. Sandler, 65, wife of Charles S. Sandler of Cisco, was held at 2 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 11, at Fort Worth.

The services were held in a synagogue adjacent to Robbins, Muller and Harper Funeral Home which is in charge of burial arrangements. Burial was to be in a Fort Worth cemetery.

Mrs. Sandler died about 8:30 Tuesday afternoon in Southwest Community Hospital in Oklahoma City, Okla., where she had been under treatment since August 25 when she became ill while attending the wedding of her son, Melvin Sandler.

Until the day she and her husband left for Oklahoma City she had remained busy at her duties with the Sandler Division of Delta P Incorporated, of which she was office manager. Until the sale of the Sandler Manufacturing Company to the Delta P Corporation, she was its secretary and treasurer.

She was born Netta Goldberg in Dallas in April of 1904. Her family moved to Fort Worth where she married Charles S. Sandler in January of 1924. In 1926 she and her husband moved to Cisco where Mr. Sandler later established the Cisco Lumber and Supply Company which he still owns and operates.

She is also survived by two children, the son, Melvin, and a daughter, Mrs. Zaida Rozin, both of Oklahoma City; her mother, Mrs. M. E. Goldberg of Dallas; seven grandchildren, and six sisters, Yetta Shambum, Los Angeles; Clara Gillem, Dallas; Merrill Krupp, El Paso and Pyrna Funk, Dallas.

Mavericks Maul Buffs, 50-0; Ready for Ranger Bulldogs Next

The Eastland Mavericks combined a well-balanced offense with a fantastic defense to smash the Cross Plains Buffaloes 50-0 in Friday night's season opener.

Eastland ran up the high score despite losing 6 fumbles and being penalized 15 times, while Cross Plains managed only 2 yards total offense for the whole game.

Cross Plains received the opening kickoff and could go nowhere. Their fourth down punt was blocked inside the 30 yard line and the Mavericks advanced to the 6 before run-

ning out of downs. Again Cross Plains could not move the ball and had to punt.

Eastland put together several drives which were thwarted by fumbles or penalties. Finally, midway in the second

period, Tailback Ruben Gaeta scored from 28 yards out. Extra point failed. A few minutes later Cross Plains punted again and Randy Rexroat ran it

back all the way — 60 yards to the touchdown. Two point conversion try was no good and the Mavericks led 14-0 at halftime.

In the third period, Eastland took the kickoff and moved into scoring position on the runs of Quarterback Lund and Tailback Gaeta. Lund scored, but the play was called back on a penalty.

Two plays later Gaeta scored from the 2 and Butch Eidson kicked the extra point. Bob Mace intercepted for Eastland a few plays later, and Lund scored from the 3 after a good run by Gaeta. Run for Extra points was good and Eastland led 29-0 at the close of the third quarter.

Cross Plains returned the following kickoff to the Eastland 32 yard line, but Lund came up with an interception to halt their drive.

The Mavericks then put together a sustained drive, with fullback Randy Lawrance carrying the ball the final 2 yards for the touchdown. Extra point try failed. The Mavericks had one touchdown and two long runs called back on penalties before Lund hit Lawrance with a 32 yard pass for the score and Eidson kicked his second extra point.

Eastland's last touchdown came on a one yard run by tailback Gaeta — his third touchdown of the night. Ron McCleskey ran for the final 2 point to close out the scoring.

Next week the Mavericks meet the Ranger Bulldogs in Maverick Stadium. Friday night the Bulldogs defeated Cisco 21 to 6 and they are the third ranked Class A team in the state. The Bulldogs will be seeking revenge for last year's defeat and the Mavericks will be trying to make it two in a row, so it should be quite a game.

Head Coach Shirley Frazier surprised Steve with a certificate certifying that he has made Honorable Mention All American, 1968 Prep High School Football. His selection appeared in "Coach and Athlete" magazine, the outstanding coaches magazine in America. Selections were made from a poll of high school coaches from across the country.

Steve gained over 3,000 yards total offense in his high school career and was also a defensive standout. He will be playing football this season for Ranger Junior College.

Abilene Firm Submits Low Bid On CJC Library

Haney and Sivley, Abilene, were apparent low bidders Thursday for the contract to construct the new Cisco Junior College Library building.

The Abilene's firm bid of \$255,440 was lowest of five which were opened at a special meeting of the Board of Regents Thursday at 1:30 p.m.

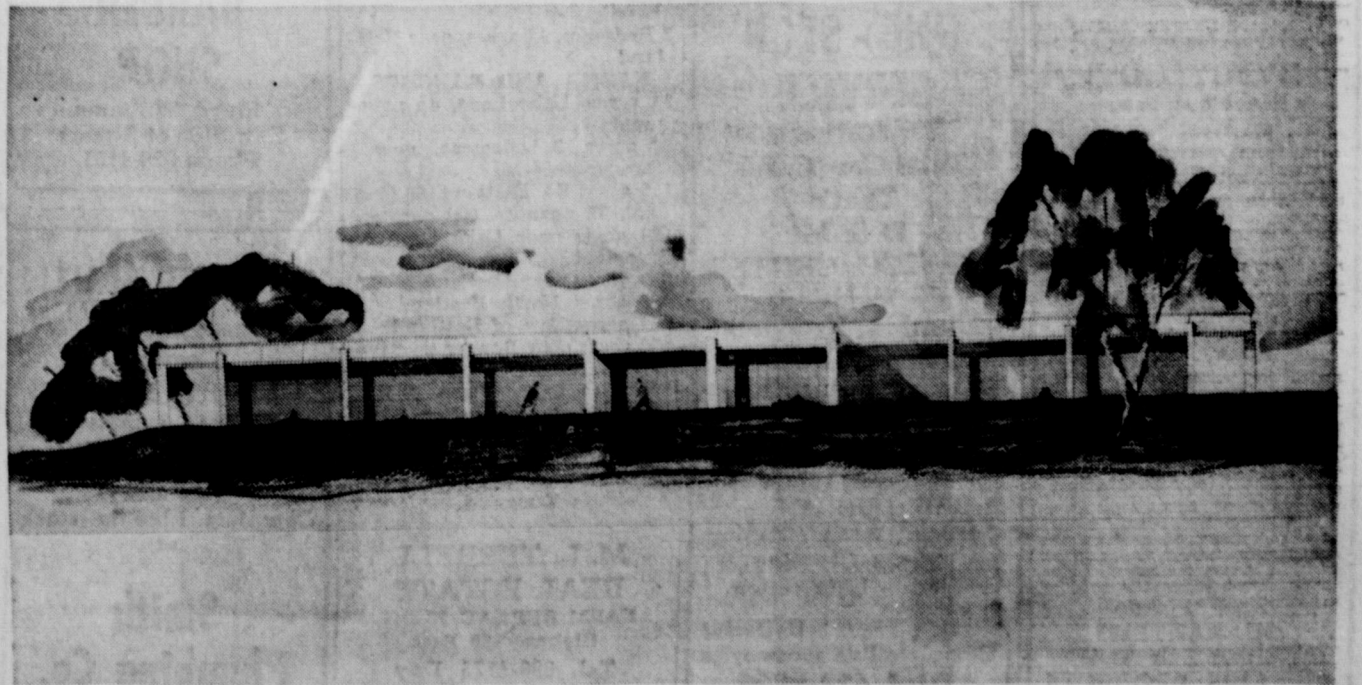
The building, named in honor of Leon Maner, late Cisco druggist and college benefactor, will house a book stack area accommodating 30,000 volumes, as well as audio-visual rooms, conference rooms, typing rooms, librarian office and the Maner Room of Texas History.

Construction was made possible by College funds of \$140,000, a federal grant of \$50,000 and a bond issue of \$155,000.

Plans have been under way for the past two years. The facility was necessary in order to meet standards set for junior colleges, President Leonard Willis said.

Work on the building, to be located across College Avenue from the Administration building, was expected to get under way about October 1.

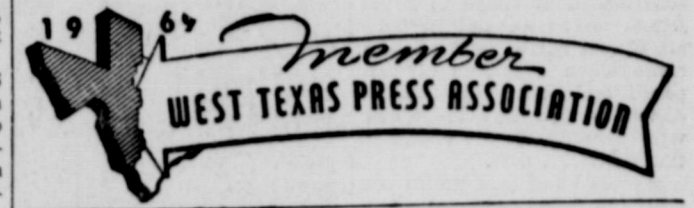

District United Methodists To Meet In Breckenridge Sept. 16

Methodist leaders from the five-county Cisco District will gather at Breckenridge's First United Methodist Church at 7:30 p.m. September 16th. This meeting, called the "Fall Conference on Mission Studies," is geared to prepare these leaders to conduct studies in three areas of concern in American life where reconciliation is badly needed to offset tensions and alienation.

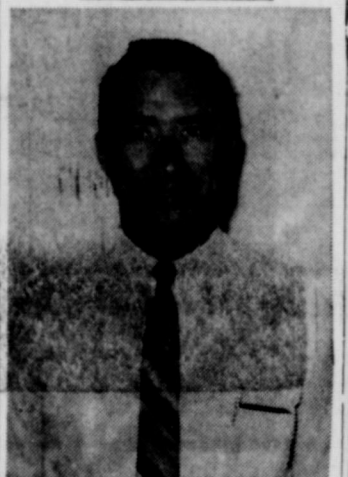

The above designated place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

2. In Olden Independent School District at Olden Community Building in Olden, Texas, with Mrs. S. G. Evetts as Presiding Judge and Mr. James E. Query, Jr. as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed 4 clerks. Absentee voting in said election in said School District shall be held at County Clerk's Office and Johnson Smith is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting and Joann Johnson, Edith McCullough, Winnie Wright and Eloise Zuspahn are appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The above designated place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

The above designated places for absentee voting in each of

said School Districts shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State Holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

None but legally qualified voters residing in said above Districts shall vote at said election. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon:

Each voter shall vote on the proposition hereby submitted by placing an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of

this Order and Notice of THE STATE OF TEXAS
Election to Consolidate DISTRICTS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF EACH OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICTS, which posting shall be done not less than twenty days prior to the date fixed for said election. The sheriff shall also cause a notice by publishing of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where said school district is located, which publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the presiding Judge holding the same in each of said respective voting places shall make returns of the results thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this County and return the ballot box and other election supplies to the County Clerk for safekeeping.
