Major Franchise Motel Planned For Cisco at Interstate 20-183

Richard Redwine, former Cisco resident, and Don Franklin of Odessa, this week announced their intention to build a "major franchise" motel and restaurant facility in Cisco.

The proposed structure would be constructed at the intersection of Interstate 20 and Highway 183 in South Cisco.

"My associate and I are really impressed with the city and its growth potential," said Redwine.

He said that they have had several meetings with Cisco Chamber of Commerce officials

and interested citizens in regard to the project.

"We appreciate the opportunity of working with a community that desires to grow. Our timetable for construction is not absolutely firm due to the indefinite completion date for the highway, but we hope to have it built by May of 1971. At that time we would open the restaurant and as many motel rooms as we feel might be justified."

Redwine said the motel would be owned by a newly chartered corporation.

Franklin stated that "We believe so strongly in the future growth of Cisco and its present need for this facility that we are willing to invest our

land, time and financial backing to make this the finest facility between Abilene and Fort Worth."

"Drug Pushers Move To Rural Area"-Musgrove

State Representative Burke Musgrove, author of Texas' Dangerous Drugs laws, said this last weekend that the large distributors and manufacturers of dangerous drugs are moving to the rural areas to escape the scrutiny of big city police departments with their highly trained narcotics divisions.

Musgrove appeared on a special KFMN Radio program entitled "On The Line" aired Saturday night from Abilene and during which telephone calls from the listening audience were accepted.

Musgrove predicted that in the near future federal and state authorities will close down one of the nation's largest drug manufacturers operating out of the West Central Texas area and that arrests will be made involving a related nationwide drug distribution network. The case has been worked on already for more than five months.

The Breckenridge Representative, a recognized leader in the area of the drug abuse problem, told Abilenians that talk of lessening the penalties for marijuana users is premature. He said that valid research on the dangers of marijuana did not begin until three years ago, when the active ingredient in marijuana, tetrahydrocannabinol, was isolated, thereby affording the necessary quality control in the research for the first time.

Musgrove said there is flexibility in the existing laws for offenders, but that "there is definitely room for improvement in the state's rehabilitative program to insure that as many offenders as possible may be returned to society as productive citizens." He stressed that the complaint that courts are too rough on first offenders is misleading since so many who are arrested for the first time have been users for some time. Many may have even encouraged their friends and their friends' friends to try marijuana. Sometimes a simple possession case is the only type of case that can be made against the pusher and therefore it is important that stiff penalties be on the books to deal with these situations.

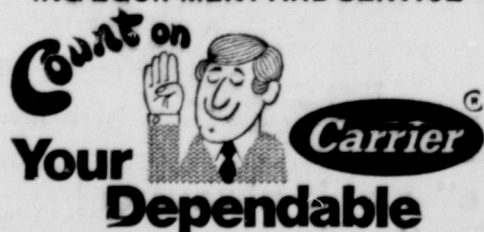

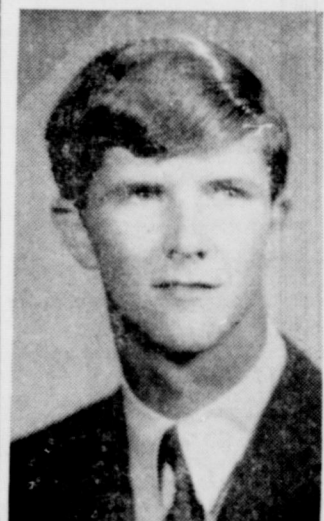

Blood may be donated in Abilene. Transportation to Abilene Saturday morning will be provided.

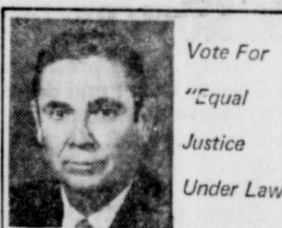

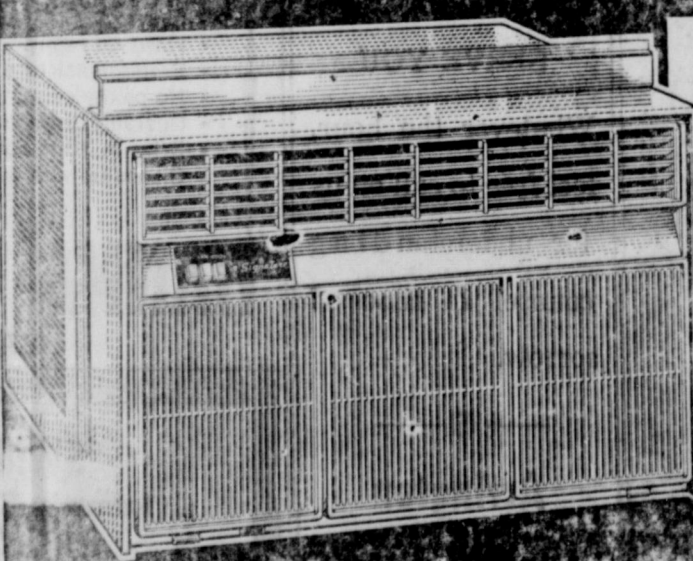

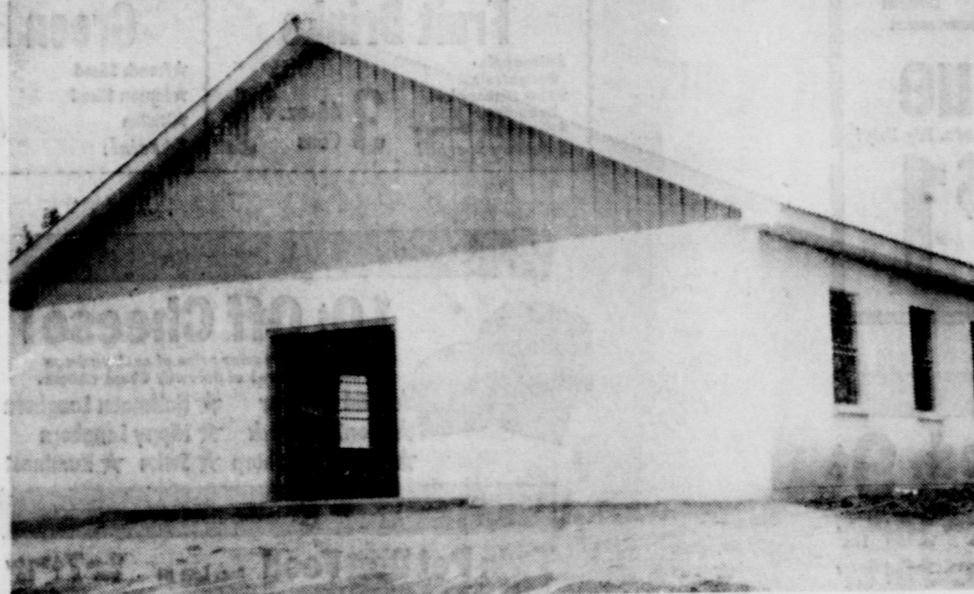

Community Church At Wolf Valley Rises From Ashes Left By Vandals

South of Rising Star, just west of the highway to Brownwood there is a community called Wolf Valley. Where the community got its name no one seems to know. But residents and former residents have lived in and loved this community since the early 90s when the first church was built. It

was a community building and was used by all denominations as a place of worship.

For more than 50 years present residents and former residents, friends and families had met at this little white church, on the first Sunday in May for worship and Memorial services honoring the dead, buried in the cemetery north of the church, and renewing community ties represented there.

But a terrible thing happened to that much loved church shortly after plans had been set on foot to paint and repair the building before the May 1970 Memorial Day came. On the night of May 29, 1969 vandals set fire to the church and burned it to the ground.

There was no use now to plan for another May day celebration and homecoming. There was no meeting place and no money to build one. Many hearts were saddened as loyal citizens viewed only a pile of ashes in the place of cherished memories. Not only was the landmark gone but along with the building went all church and cemetery records that could never be replaced.

These courageous Wolf Valley people were not to be defeated. With renewed hope they set about asking for donations to apply on a new building. "The campaign results were literally unbelievable," said a native of the community. Donations came from everywhere, far and wide, and soon there was enough money to start construction.

Shortly after the first of 1970 materials started arriving on the site and work began.

Today the building is completed save for a few finishing touches. Not quite so large as the former church but it was built lovingly by donated labor. The building is almost fire proof.

When the scrap material is removed and the landscape leveled, the new church will be ready to welcome the annual "Decoration Day" crowd on the first Sunday in May. There will be the usual home cooked meal at the noon hour following the morning worship service and Memorial tributes.

The afternoon will be spent in visiting and old fashioned singing.

I dare say there will be a more than usual gathering of thankful, warmhearted people on this May day in 1970, thankful for the little church and the care and loving devotion that has gone into the building of it.

Directors of the Wolf Valley Church and Cemetery Association are John Ralph Hardy and N. M. Lancaster both of May and Idus Holamon of Early, Texas.
