meeting and outlined plans for the study program which will involve all of the 293 organized county Farm Bureaus in the state. Dean said the program grew out of a recommendation of a special Study Committee which he appointed last year which has been making an in-depth study of Farm Bureau programs and operations. The committee recommended that an activity be conducted involving county Farm Bureaus "re-evaluating the organization and its program of work, setting forth top priority of goals and directions."

Long said the objective of the study will be to determine the kind of organizational programs farmers and ranchers of the future will need and ascertain the means of putting them into operation.

The local county Farm Bureau will be involved in the Study program, according to Jack Cozart, President. He said a meeting of the Eastland County Farm Bureau Board of Directors will be held soon to develop recommendations for the expanded program. Local farm Bureau leaders attending the district meeting included Mrs. Ann Justice and Mr. Jack Cozart.

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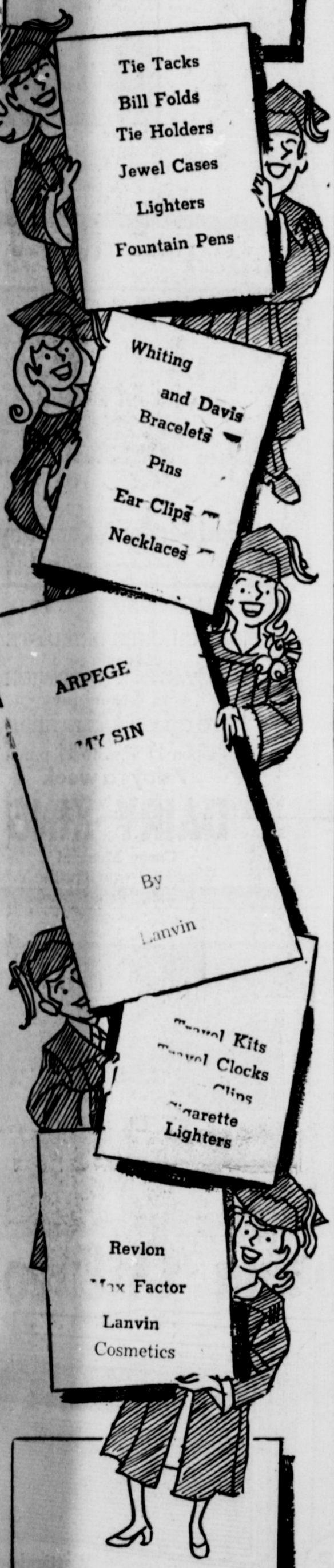

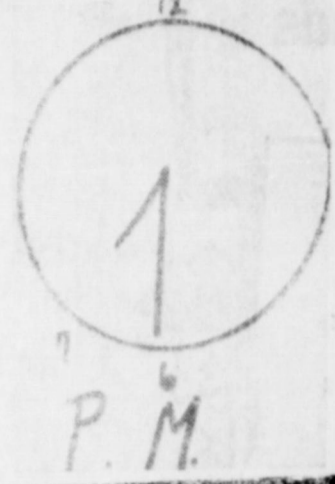

MAY 26-JUNE 1 PECAN SPRAY DATES
Pecan trees in Eastland County should be sprayed during the period of May 26 through June 1 reports County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The purpose of the spray is to control the pecan nut casebearer.

the most destructive insect of the pecan.

Gordon said the development of the casebearer is not this year but usually occurs in the fall. The most important application is most important since the insects must be on the tree when the young larvae are coming and before they enter the small pecans.

The county agent said that the factors are very important in the control of the pest—a thorough coverage of the tree with the insecticide and the use of the correct insecticide. The recommended insecticides include D-D, Malathion, Dieldrin, Guthion, Nicotinic sulfate, Thiodan, and Parathion. Gordon suggests that the spray be added to the spray solution to control roset.

Thiodan may also be added to control pecan disease.

County Bank Deposits Gain Heavily Over Year

Eastland County banks have reported gains in loans but a loss in deposits for the last quarter. Both the loan and deposit totals have increased substantially over the reported amount for the same quarter in 1969—a period of one year.

Total deposits for this quarter were \$30,659,831 a loss of only \$205,191 over last quarter's report but a gain of \$2,085,260 for the year. Total deposits for the five banks—Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger, and Rising Star—were \$30,865,022 for the last quarter and \$28,574,571 for the year.

Total loans for this quarter were \$17,729,229 which is \$1,987,225 more than last quarter for which the total was \$15,742,004. At this time last year loans were totaled at \$14,844,273 which sets the yearly increase at \$2,973,956.

Only 16 of the 89 area banks included in the "Big Country" reported a gain in deposits for the quarter. Among those were the First National Bank of Cisco with a gain of \$519,615 and the First State Bank of Ranger with a gain of \$258,798 over the last quarter. Rising

Star reported the loss of \$448,873; Eastland, \$267,367; and Gorman, \$267,444. The total loss in deposits for the quarter for the three banks was \$883,684. These losses were related to normal fluctuations in peanut crop income which reaches a seasonal high in the fall.

Individual tallies of increased deposits over the reported figure for a year ago are Cisco up \$849,486; Eastland up \$536,730; Gorman up \$103,211; Ranger up \$374,415; and Rising Star up \$221,412.

Of the 89 area banks reporting 35 showed a decrease in the amounts of loans for the quarter and 54 including all five of the Eastland County Banks showed an increase for the quarter. Individual increases are Cisco, \$518,819; Eastland, \$392,323; Gorman, \$352,062; Ranger, \$135,917; and Rising Star, \$589,004.

Eighteen of the area banks reported a decrease in loan amounts for the year. All five Eastland County banks, along with 66 others, showed a gain in loan amounts for the year. Individual gains are Cisco, \$1,416,476; Eastland, \$131,213; Gorman, \$217,073; Ranger, \$236,643; and Rising Star,

An English and biology major and education minor, Miss Treadwell is a 1967 graduate of Eastland High School where she graduated as valedictorian.

At H-SU she has served as a member of Student Congress and is the 1970-71 Congress secretary. She is a member of Phi Phi Phi social club, Beta Beta Beta biology honorary, Alpha Chi scholastic honorary, and Sigma Tau Delta English honor society.

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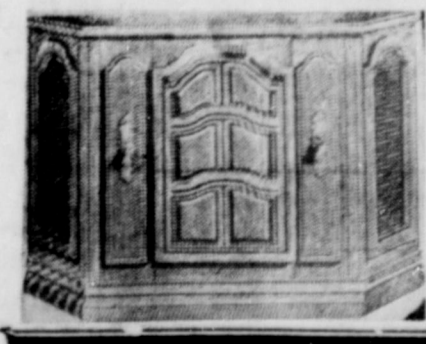
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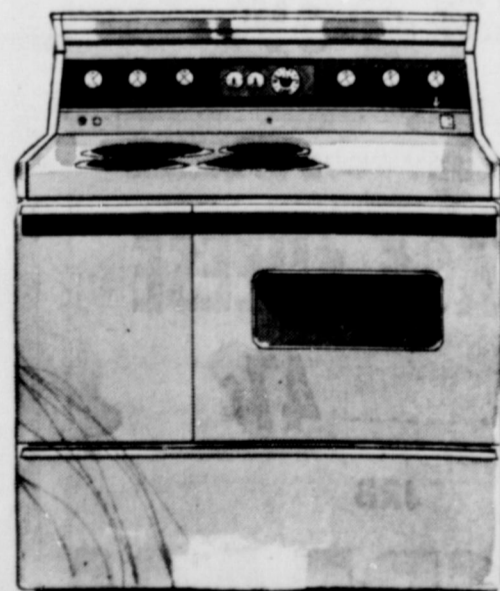

Enforcement Ass'n Fights Against Theft

County Law Enforcement Association officials have launched a campaign to help Eastland County residents to use to protect their property. The association suggested that residents should lock their doors and windows. Garages should be kept closed and locked, whether the resident is home or not. Cars parked in driveways should always be locked. Suspicious persons or vehicles should be observed carefully and reported. It is important to report the correct license number for any suspected vehicles.

All crimes should be reported to the police at once and, if necessary, the victim or witness should testify in court. Cooperation with officers investigating a crime is vital.

Valuables—jewelry, stamp and coin collections—should be kept in a safety deposit box rather than at home. Lawnmowers, garden tools, and other equipment should not be left unattended in the yard.

Everyone is advised to be cautious of strangers—women at home alone should be extremely cautious of strangers coming to the door.

When a home is left unoccupied—during a vacation or trip—the police should be notified of the dates of departure and the date of expected return so that they can check the residence. All deliveries of mail, newspapers, and other items should be stopped. If possible, arrange for someone to keep the grass cut and pick up the circulars. A timer switch to turn the lights in the house on and off at prescribed times should be set.

Many times burglars will call a resident to gain information about the habits of the occupants; it is not wise to give this type of information to a caller that is unknown.

The victim of a burglary should not disturb the scene until the police can make an investigation.

Businessmen are advised to make sure that their burglar

detection devices are working and that connections are attached to all entrances. All trucks and other vehicles should be parked well away from buildings to prevent them from being used to screen a point of entry. Windows should be secured with a bar or mesh screen covering to make entry more difficult.

Arrangements should be made to collect money from all vending machines at the end of the work day and signs posted stating that machines have been emptied. Money should not be left in desks, cash registers, or money boxes during the hours that the business is closed.

Both inside and outside lights should be burned at night so officers can make a complete check of the location. Safes and vaults should be placed where they can be checked from the street. Blinds or curtains should be opened so that an officer can check the interior of the building.

The final and more stress recommendations was that every owner of valuable property—appliances, guns, bicycles, lawn mowers, should have a means of positive identification. If the owner's drivers license number should be marked on the article.

If property is unidentifiable, three situations could develop:

- (1.) Property taken into custody by the police cannot be traced and returned to the owner. It may be auctioned, destroyed or actually returned to the thief upon demand.
- (2.) The extensive surveillance employed by the police over the various channels, pawnshops and second-hand stores through which stolen property is sold will be neutralized and the thief will be able to profit from his crime with virtually no risk of apprehension.
- (3.) The property cannot be used as evidence against the criminal and he may have to be released, without being held accountable for the crime he committed.

The solution is the simple listing of all valuables and their identifying serial number. The list should be kept in a safe place, that is handy to get to for additions or police investigations.

Cisco Police Chief Clyde Brymer is in charge of the county association's theft control program and he urged citizens to cooperate in helping cut down on unrecoverable stolen merchandise.
