"Dear Friends, I was in your city last Wednesday for Frank Deaton's funeral service. The manner in which your Police Dept. handled its responsibilities en route from the church to the cemetery deserves thanks from all who attended the service. Each officer, as he stood at his post, was a credit to his organization and community. My personal thanks."

TUCKED IN with the message was a pamphlet entitled "I saw the evidence that God lives". It too deserves our attention:

Astronaut Frank Borman spoke to 6000 students at a school assembly in his own city. His message to youth came like his words from outer space:

"I hope that none of you ever feel ashamed to have and to profess a basic belief in God. This is important. Believe me again, as this is coming from an older man, but if I were starting all over I would make sure I had that basic belief in God."

Comander Borman describes his family, with two teenage sons, as a regular family that attends church. They do say grace at meals. Other than that each member of his family is left to pray in his own way.

Today, the world and its youth are seeking, and searching for—what?

Sometimes they honestly don't know.

Perhaps we're spending too much time doubting. Perhaps we should return to the faith which affirms, "In the beginning God." The kind of faith Frank Borman found strengthened by Bible reading. He expressed that in this prayer broadcast back to us here on earth from the space capsule 69 miles above the surface of

Republican turnout in Eastland County was light with 55 voters casting ballots in four boxes. George Bush polled 48 to Morris' 7 for the U. S. Senate and Paul Eggers got 53 to Martin's 2 for governor's nomination.

SEE TABULATION INSIDE Democratic voters of Eastland county put County Judge Scott Bailey into nomination for a third term by a substantial majority Saturday. Voting only about half of the registered number, they gave the incumbent Bailey a total of 2491 votes to 1946 for his opponent, Carl L. Garrett in unofficial returns Saturday night.
In other contested races county democratic voters favored

challenger Lloyd Bentsen over U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough for the senatorial nomination by a large margin, gave Tom Creighton a good majority over Walter E. Steimel in the contest for the state senatorial nomination; approved Joe C. Hanna's bid for state representative nomination over incumbent Burke Musgrove and gave Judge Austin McCloud a better than two to one lead over Roger Q. Garrett in the race

for nomination for chief justice, Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals.

In the race for county commissioner, Precinct 4, which includes Cisco, C. B. (Runt) Dill, incumbent, and W. W. (Jack) Sawyers survived a field of four to go into a runoff in the second primary.

Dill received 702 votes; Sawyers 449. Jesse H. Reynolds, Jr., had 207 votes and Morris D. White 113 in this race.

Carl Lamb was nominated for justice of peace, Precinct 4, in a narrow victory over Carlton Holder. Lamb received 740 votes to 692 for Holder.

Former Automobile Salesman William A. (Bill) Hunter won over two opponents to claim the Constable, Precinct One, nomination. Hunter polled 736 votes and was followed by Allen Squires who got 471 votes, John Daniels had 103 votes.

Scott Bailey received heavy support in his home box at Cisco where the vote, exclusive of absentee ballot, was 1031 for Bailey and 419 for Garrett. Bailey's county wide and unofficial majority was 545 votes.

With all returns from the 53rd district in except those from Palo Pinto county, Joe Hanna seemed assured of the democratic nomination for state representative over his opponent, Burke Musgrove. Hanna led in Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford and Callahan counties.

A report from the Election Bureau at 10 o'clock Saturday night gave Tom Creighton narrow leads in all counties of the 22nd senatorial district over Walter Steimel in the race for the senatorial nomination.

County voters gave Lloyd Bentsen a majority over U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough for the U. S. Senatorial nomination. They voted 2365 for Bentsen to 1927 for Yarborough.

In the contest for state senator Tom Creighton received 2652 votes to 1650 for his opponent, Walter E. Steimel.

County voters gave Joe Hanna a 951 majority over Burke Musgrove. The vote was 2673 for Hanna and 1722 for Musgrove.

In the contest for chief justice of the Eleventh Court of Appeals Eastland county gave Austin McCloud 2878 votes to 1303 for his opponent, Roger Q. Garrett.

CofC Directors Hear Report On FHA Housing Financing

A close look at much-needed housing for Eastland was made by Eastland Chamber of Commerce directors this week as they heard O. M. Boyle of the Farmers Home Administration explain various financing programs available.

Mr. Boyle has been discussing the various programs available and he reported at the director's luncheon meeting that the information is being well received.

Chamber President Ben McKinnis presided and most routine business was dispensed with so Mr. Boyle could explain the FHA programs available.

"Our agency is not in competition with any public or private lending concern," he said, "and our only purpose is to provide locally-insured money for those people who cannot qualify for financing through normal channels."

The FHA program began in 1949 for strictly rural building and was expanded later for towns of 2,500 or less population. It has been more re-

cently been expanded to include towns with 5,500 or less population. The FHA through the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) agency is assisting in larger towns.

Right now we're making commitments for speculative building. An individual needs a lot and some plans, he said, and interim financing is available.

The psychosocial aspect of actually "seeing a house being built" is important, he explained, and cited the home recently built and sold in Cisco on the program. "That house could have been sold several times."

Mr. Boyle does the actual appraisals and inspections and can grant one-year approvals for construction (with 60-day extensions available). It's local business, he said, and it's a real boon to those of moderate income who need housing.

Those of above moderate income usually secure financing through commercial firms. "We have a specific formula for determining qualifications. and generally a family with a \$7,500 to \$8,000 annual income, with two or more children can qualify. They'll pay probably six and a quarter interest on the loan, and our agency pays seven and three-quarters."

The qualifications are based on the families' ability to pay. A family with two children might need a three bedroom house of from 12,000 to 14,000 square feet with brick veneer, aluminum windows, heating and cooling and probably a car port. The cost to the family would be roughly 20 per cent of the family income or about \$1,600 per year that the family could pay on the loan.

Directors expressed interest and indicated that further study would be made of possible solutions to the housing shortage.

Land Bank's Interest Rate Is Reduced to 8 1/2%

Russell V. Payne, Manager of the Federal Land Bank of Breckenridge, received word today that the Federal Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 1/2%.

The variable rate loan plan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank last July, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in the price which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans.

"Recent improvements in the money market have made this reduction possible," Mr. Payne stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had slightly over one-half billion dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The Breckenridge Association makes and services loans in Eastland, Young, Stephens, Throckmorton and Shackelford Counties.

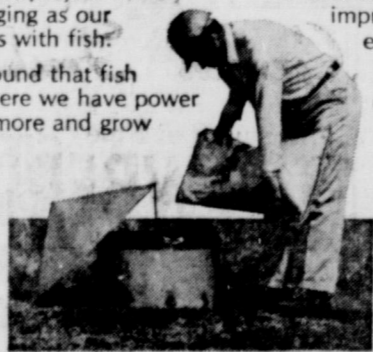

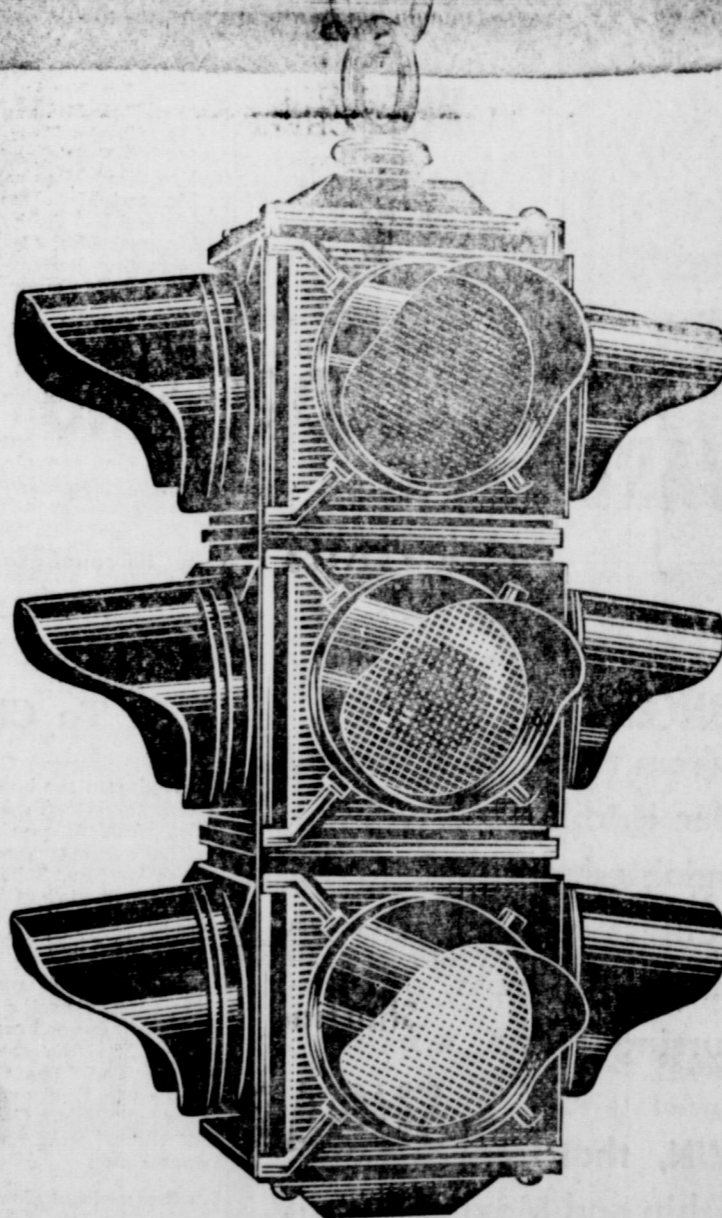

Eastland Co. Smokers Spend \$711,000 Yearly

What has been the effect of the anti-smoking campaign on cigarette smoking in Eastland County? How much are the local people smoking these days compared with those in other areas?

Judging from the latest regional figures on cigarette sales, a growing number of local residents have cut down on their consumption and many have given up the habit completely. Two drug stores in Eastland no longer sell cigarettes.

Organization and individuals who are active in the crusade against smoking believe that this decline, now in its third year in most sections of the county, is the real thing. This is seen in nationwide survey made by the Department of Agriculture, the Tobacco Council and others. In Eastland County, according to a breakdown of these figures, and estimated 1,759,000 packs were smoked in the year. Related to the local population over age 18, this was equivalent to 176 pack per person.

The national average, among persons over 18, was 207 packs and in the West South Central States it was 176 packs. According to a recent estimate by the National Center for Health Statistics, about

1,400,000 Americans gave up cigarette smoking in a period of one year.

It feels, as a result, that the situation is quite different than it was in 1964, when cigarette sales dropped for the first time in many years following the surgeon-general's report linking smoking with lung cancer and heart disease.

That drop was only short lived, however. Within a few months people were puffing away at their usual rate and sales were back to normal. More recently, the public has been taking to heart the warnings from health officials and has been making a serious effort to cut down on its consumption.

As to the cost of smoking approximately \$9.7 billion was spent for cigarettes in the United States in the year. Eastland County's share of the bill was \$711,000, or about \$2.2 per smoker.

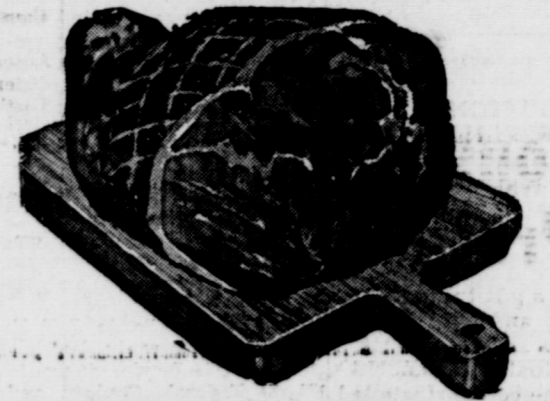
