er Ciscoan Finds Iran le Cooperative, Friendly

Iranians are a proud people with traditions rooted in grandeur, religiously diverse but ethnically united. The Arab conquerors in that area of the Middle East, I. W. Ussery, a Ciscoan who has spent years in that area of the Middle East, said on a brief visit recently.

Ussery, who left Cisco in 1930, is the Middle Eastern representative of the Cisco and Root, Houston construction firm with wide interests. He has been in Iran for seven years of the Middle East or nine years.

Iranians, inheritors of the empire of the ancient Persians, are a friendly, hospitable people, Ussery said. There is absolutely no "home" sentiment. Their national pride is based on the fact that they have not had their country pronounced with "I". It is pronounced "E".

Ussery explained. The country, mostly nomadic and extremely poor, has made long strides toward western standards and a sound economy under the enlightened leadership of Shah Mohammed Reza, who is administering the new oil wealth of the country in the interest of a higher standard of living for his people.

Traditionally inured to an autocratic type of government the Iranians are being gradually led into a system of constitutional monarchy somewhat similar to the British system, Ussery said.

Evidence of the Iranian monarch's progressive ideals is his action in giving the vote to women of the country, a move which offended the instincts of the mullahs, religious leaders of a population 93 per cent Moslem, but which was accepted by the Iranians who regard their king or shah as absolute and therefore superior to the mullahs.

As Mohammedans, spiritual-

ly related to the Arabian world, the Iranians are sympathetic to the interests of the Arabs "within the framework of the United Nations charter," Ussery said. Although strongly pre-western, they maintain a cautious friendship with the Soviet Union. "You would expect that in a people who share a 2,000-mile border with the Russians," the former Ciscoan pointed out.

Ussery has a strong affection for the Bedouins, Arabian nomads, among whom he spent much of his time in the Middle East.

"They are wonderful people when you get to know them," he said.

He is writing a book on his experiences.

There was a town hide gambling games. A small Baptist church was destroyed in a struggle just west of the village. The village is known as the "Long Horns" ranch spread hundreds of what is now the streets and streets eye could see country. and routed the Indians. A few white men were killed. Water was scarce and was hauled in from an old water hole and sold from a barrel at 25c a gallon. Castor oil was sold by the barrel. The Texas and Pacific Railway Company came into Red Gap in November 1880. About two years later the Texas Central railroad cut its way through the rocky, thickly wooded slope that is now Humbletown and a crossing was made with the Texas and Pacific tracks. The T&P railroad came in December 1888 and the first train arrived a short time later. In 1884 the village of Red Gap moved its postoffice to the railroad crossing. W. T. Caldwell was the postmaster. At this time the name of Red Gap was changed to Cisco in honor of John W. Cisco a prominent New York Banker who helped finance the Texas Central railroad. Shortly after the move, officials of the railroad bought a section of land in the vic-

inity of old Lake Cisco and opened up coal mines. But even then Cisco showed little indication of becoming a coal mining center. However mining became an industry almost overnight. It brought men from the mines of Pennsylvania and all over the country. About this time R. G. Luse, a man from the north, started a newspaper that he called The Round Up. The name was taken from the early day rodeos and roundups. The paper was later known as The Cisco Roundup. It was during these days that the first rodeos of this section were held about six miles north of town. Cowboys rode in for days in advance to take part in the big show. Roundups were wild affairs, bucking horses, wild steers and cheering crowds. When a horse fell down and rolled on his rider the crowd went wild with cheers. Cattle were driven from Cisco to Kansas City in droves of 1,000 to 3,000 head to be sold

for from \$6 to \$13 per head. A story is told of the first bank robbery in Cisco. It happened in February, 1887. The ground was covered with sleet and ice and four unmasked men rode down main street and up to the doors of the Cisco Bank. Two men sat on their horses in front of the bank with loaded Winchester rifles ready to fire. The other two men carried six shooters and entered the bank and ordered the startled cashier to raise his hands above his head. One of the men covered the cashier while the second one looted the bank of everything except the furnishings. Before the town knew what had happened the four horsemen rode out at high speed. A posse was called into action, riding all night the men came upon a smoldering camp fire and several pieces of silver on the ground. But to this day no one knows what became of the four robbers and the \$10,000 dollars that was taken from the bank.

Summer Baseball Rules Stressed by State UIL

High school boys who expect to participate in Texas interscholastic League sponsored sports, have been reminded of the conditions under which they may take part in summer baseball without violating the League's amateur rule. They are:

1. He must not play on the same team with any paid players or any player who receives valuable consideration. He can play against other teams which may have paid players. A paid player is a contestant who is paid, either in cash or in valuable consideration, for participating in a particular game or contest in which a high school contestant or contestants are participating. the high school coach would handle the funds and the boy must never receive any cash or transportation tickets.

3. Any money that may accrue from the gate receipts or from any other source cannot be distributed among the players on a team without those players becoming paid players. If a high school boy played on this team he would then become ineligible as he has played with paid players.

4. It should be kept in mind that any collection taken up at the game as a result of a person hitting a home run or doing any other outstanding feat would make the player accepting this money a paid player, and all players on that team would then become ineligible if they were high school students.

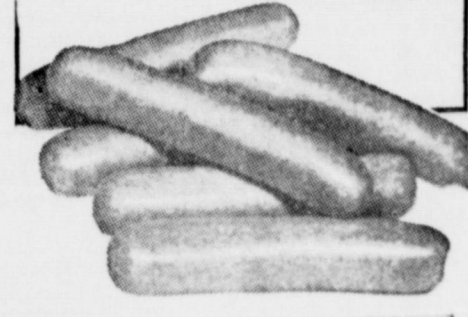
