MORE ABOUT THAT ATHLETIC FIELD

Many sports fans have wondered why the Eastland Mavericks have played championship calibre football away from home and have not shown up so well in the home games. After questioning several along this line the following reasons have been ascribed.

1. The local fans do not turn out and support the team as they should, which is more or less of a disappointment to the players. They do not expect many local fans to accompany the team on the long trips away from home, but the two or three hundred who do make the journeys are more encouraging to a team on a trip than about the same number witnessing a home game. Support of a team is one of the big factors in its winning ability and the Mavericks have been sadly neglected in this way throughout the season.

2. When playing away from home the Mavericks are playing on good fields with large crowds present. An adequate playing field with a good sodded gridiron on which to play makes quite a difference. On a cold day like the one on which the game Saturday was played, the ground on the local field is so hard that injuries to the players are likely when they hit the ground hard. This prevents good, clean tackling like the team did at both Abilene and San Angelo and causes the players to tackle high in order to keep from being skinned up on the hard ground.

3. Many fans stay away from the home games because they realize that the seating arrangements, the playing field and the parking facilities make it uncomfortable for those who attend the games as well as the players and do not go because they do not expect to see the class of football that they would see in other towns between the same two teams. This gets back to the same argument about lack of local support, which is considered by several of the loyal fans as a drawback to the team when playing at home.

One remedy for the whole situation seems to be to get the fans together and see if something can be done to provide a good field with good stands where every kind of athletic contest including football, baseball, tennis, track meets, basket ball and any other contest could be held. With a field of this kind it would be possible to draw crowds from all over the county and in many instances from all over the district.

Ranger and Cisco, with but little more population and with teams that have shown up but little better than the Mavericks did most of the season, the backing of the fans was not one-tenth that received by either the Lobos or the Bulldogs. With a good playing field and good stands many fans from these two towns would watch the Mavericks play when there was not a game in Cisco and Ranger and many would come from Breckenridge and other towns in the district in order to get a line on the competing teams.

Eastland should by all means have a good athletic field that could be used on all occasions and one could be obtained if the fans, the school board, the Chamber of Commerce, the Retail Merchants association and, in fact, every organization in town, would get behind the movement and help.



CRACKS IN THE DOME

By RAYMOND BROOKS AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 14—The time clock is to be the aptest symbol of Gov. Elect Ross S. Sterling's two year reign. There will be no official trouping over the state. If anyone expects him to convert his office into "either a circus or a parade," Mr. Sterling has served notice such a view can now be revised.

Mr. Sterling has authorized the statement that he regards the governor's office as a business office, just like any other, and that he intends to stay at the capitol, run it as a business office, and concentrate his attention upon his serious affairs.

There will be no speech making at county fairs no oratory at the opening of new buildings; the governor will not travel over Texas to welcome conventions or to take part in celebrations of any kind.

He doesn't believe the state's enormous official affairs can be administered in that way, and he doesn't expect to start such a system.

This is the second of the vigorous "noes" that have come from the governor-elect. The first was the notice that "no" will be the answer to anybody who tries to apply political pressure to get a job. The second negation is for those who expect to use the governor as trimmings, decoration or show-piece for celebrations, festivals, fairs, gatherings, political or otherwise.

Grindstone Era That is the negative side of picture as to official trouping over Texas. The other side is that of extolling the prosaic grind of daily labor the orderly, consistent, close application of the chief executive to the business of running the state.

Though Mr. Sterling made no comment upon this aspect, it is known that effect of the governor's example radiates out through the agencies of the state like waves from the prow of a moving ship. If it works out like Mr. Sterling has in mind now, his administration in future years likely will be looked back upon as the "grindstone era."

Life Shown On Walls The plan of concentration, intense hard work such as that of which the business man, government-to-be has a life-long record, is expected to start the new administration out with tight-buckled morale. And if a general guess may be risked before he completes the job of picking his main helpers, the record of the individuals for hard work, and time-clock consistency "on the job" will be a dominating factor in their selection.

Pomp, pageantry, gold braid and red tape are going to mean little to the brusque, ruddy-faced man who roughed it in the oil fields; whose country friends still remember his skill of tossing a bale of hay and a sack of corn chops into the farm wagon at a single two-handed gesture.

One minute's glance at his office will give almost a complete key to Mr. Sterling's attitude of mind as to the things that count. Some people consider crowds, celebrations, official assemblies, the formalities of public speaking, the showing off in public settings of splendor and magnificence as the

apex, climax and visible emblem of officialdom in action.

Humble Refinery Shown In the archway of Mr. Sterling's tall office, between the paneled walls and the vaulted ceiling there are, in stone, sculptured friezes of five scenes, symbols of the high points in his business career. Directly in front of him, as he sits at a desk in front of a carved marble fireplace, is the replica of a giant oil refinery, stills, tanks, pipes, machinery in hard realism that is the Humble company that he built from three little oil wells to a world-wide concern.

At his left is a scene of farming and livestock symbolic of his early years.

To his right is the blending of business and romance, with shipping represented by graceful sail-decked sloops. He started "on his own" by sailing a little boat across Galveston bay. Later he served maritime commerce in a big way as chairman of the Houston port commission until the present.

At his back are scenes portraying skyscrapers, one of his business interests; and a railroad and train, representing his past experience as president of a railroad.

Turning Wheel of Commerce Not much politics or poetry in these. All are close to the business of making a living, of turning the wheels of commerce. All are redolent of the idea of hard, consistent driving, unceasing work; and their meaning has been blended together by Mr. Sterling in his statement that he will carry into the capitol his record in business and in high-way administration as a guiding principle in the job, every day, all day, with thought and care concentrated upon the task of running the \$100,000,000 a year business of Texas government.

be treated as confidential. Supt. Marrs says that Johnson was notified that the report would be placed before the state board. "In the meantime" wrote Marrs, "your committee addressed the president of the state board, requesting permission to appear and furnish the board the identical information which had been prepared and already submitted by enterprising school officials of your section."

Marrs' letter continues: "on my recommendation, the only country which was within the notice of the board to grant was allowed. Rural aid inspectors were sent into West Texas first so rural aid money could be distributed early in the year. There is no implication that because these inspectors did not consult your committee nor those that secured the information submitted, that they were discourteous. There was no thought of discourtesy. The three county superintendents who furnished the data were consulted in their official capacity, and in addition also the tax collectors, the bankers, the farmers and the ranchmen, while your information was furnished exclusively by county and city superintendents."

Marrs concludes: "Trade has improved and there is no country of the globe that 'comes back' quicker when given the opportunity. The optimist of West Texas who resents publicity given to his misfortunes is the 'salt of the earth.' I know because I have known him for fifty years."

Prairie Dogs And Rabbits Do Much Damage On Farm

By J. C. PATTERSON The Bureau of Biological Survey U. S. Department of Agriculture maintains a staff of field men in Texas whose job it is to aid in control work of prairie dogs, rabbits, crows, sparrows, etc. The prairie dogs are of minor importance in Eastland county, only two or three dog towns are left and these may be readily destroyed. One of these at east will be done away with this winter.

The rabbits are doing a lot of damage. They should be killed out. The Biological Survey men will gladly aid in a general clean up of rabbits or any other rodent pest. We should have a concerted drive against them this winter. Rabbit drives should be put on all over the county and the remaining ones poisoned. Various methods of poisoning have proven successful and where one method is not successful another one works fine. Sportsmen from the towns are always glad to take part in the drives and regardless of conditions they always seem to have plenty of ammunition.

Crows do a lot of damage, that done to peanuts being harvested is the most important at this season. The Biological Survey recommends that the crow roosts be located and that hunters be at these places late in the afternoon as they come in to roost and shoot them then. There is usually two or even three roosting places and all of them should be located and hunters placed at each one. Poisoning is usually not satisfactory with crows but helps some.

The sparrows have gathered a lot of feed crops this fall. They were bad on the small grain this summer. They are worse close to the towns and near timber. They are very simply and easily poisoned if bated a few days before the poisoned grain is put out. In this manner a great many may be killed at one time.

If there is sufficient interest indicated in such a campaign I will be glad to arrange to have a representative of the Biological Survey attend a meeting in the county to help plan an eradication of these pests.

Final Stocks NEW YORK, Nov. 17—Lesses ranging from 1 to 5 points were made in the stock market list today in curtailed trading. A half dozen issues showed gains and a slight rally from lows occurred near the end of the session, but the close was lower. The opening was down from Saturday's last levels. A subsequent rally failed to hold, but the majority of issues gave ground and the street considered the decline a normal technical reaction. The firm spots were Auburn Auto, Packard, Warner Bros. Pictures and American Snuff, all of which showed gains. Standard of New York held steady. Industrials declined with U. S. Steel leading the down turn. That issue was around 14 1/2 off 3 3/4 near the close. Utilities were 3 to more than 4 points lower. "Is your name Jordan?" Mitchell asked the scowling youth in the doorway. The corridor was dimly lit and the faces of all three men were shadowed.

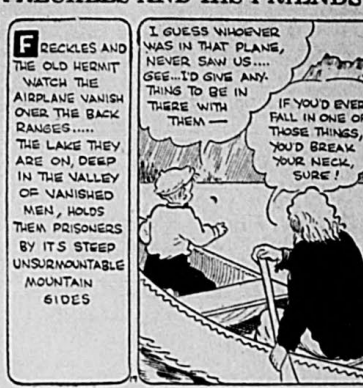
"I'm Tod Jordan, yes. What do you want?"
