The regular Third Sunday Singing will be held May 17 in Gorman.

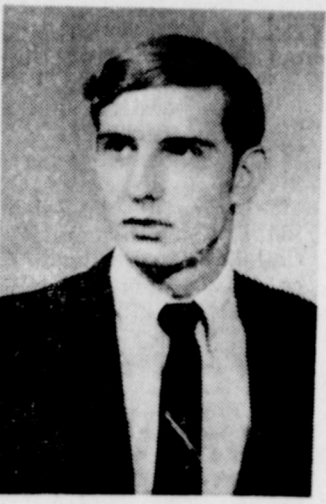

Barnes Challenges CJC Class To Peaceful Improvement Of Society

OUT OF DUST... A 'THEATER'



THRU THE DUST, MEMORIES... the building on the south side of the square, formerly occupied by A&P Grocery, is being remodeled. Monday a sand-blasting crew stripped the front of the building, creating much dust and revealing the word "Theater" across the top and light sockets underneath the archways.

The Majestic Theater (two buildings west of the Majestic Cafe) was open for business at least as early as 1919 and closed probably during the late 1920s.

Joe Gray remembers that the lobby was large and had a tile floor. The entrance was just to the left of the center column and the ticket stand was "about 15 feet from the entrance, and it faced west." Joe thinks the theater showed only silent movies, closing before the day of sound.

Willie Speaker moved to Eastland in the spring of 1922. He says, "The theater was open when I came and it ran for some time after that."

Mrs. J. C. Allison remembers that "The Majestic showed my favorite picture shows. I can't remember whether I ever saw any sound pictures there or not, but I certainly enjoyed what I did see. And the building wasn't just used for moving pictures. The Presbyterians held their regular church services there with Mrs. W. K. Jackson playing the organ. The Community Thanksgiving Service was held there about 10 or 11 on Thanksgiving morning. One year, my sister and I carried parasols to keep the heavy snow off us and we attended the morning worship service, then returned that afternoon for a picture show."

Lone Star Completes Big Hemphill Well

Lone Star Producing Co., subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Co., announced today the completion of tests on its Puryear No. 1 well in Hemphill Co., Texas. The well was bottomed at a depth of 20,200 feet and flowed at a rate of 27 million cubic feet of gas per day on test. On official open flow potential test, the Puryear potentialled 88.6 million cubic feet of gas per day. Lone Star is the sole owner of the well which is located in the Buffalo Wallow Field approximately three quarters of a mile south of Gulf Oil Co.'s Helton No. 1. The Puryear No. 1, drilled in the Hunton limestone formation produced gas which is dry, but needs sulfur treatment.

THE GORDON SPOT

It's too early to spray pecan trees for pecan nut casebearer control, but it's not too early to get your equipment and materials ready.

If you spray too early, your time and money will be wasted. There is only a five to seven day period when the casebearers can be sprayed effectively. This should be done after a majority of the adult casebearer moths have deposited eggs on the tips of the small pecans and before more than two or three per cent of the small worms have entered the pecans.

It appears that moth emergence and egg laying will be later in 1970, than in the past few years. On May 11 we removed corrugated paper bands from pecan trees and collected 71 pupae and nine larvae. These bands are used as traps so that we may observe the development of this insect. These pupae and larvae were put in screen wire cages and placed in an environment that is nearly the same as that in

the orchard. Mr. A. D. Ellington of Cisco is keeping record of the insect development. We will suggest spraying 8 to 10 days after 10 per cent of moths have emerged. This is one method we use to determine the spray date. We also stay in contact with other counties of the state so that we may know the development of the insect and determine if our spray dates correspond with surrounding counties.

It now appears that the best spray dates in Eastland County will be about May 28 to June 5. More exact information will be given within the next week.

If you would like information on the insecticides and rates of insecticides to use, you may get the "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Disease on Fruits and Nuts" at the county agent's office.

The annual Eastland County spring pecan field day will be held Saturday, May 23 at the American Legion Hall in Rising Star. Tom Denman of the Texas A&M-Tarleton Experiment Station and Dr. J. W. Worthington, Extension Horticulturist, will discuss the pecan nut casebearer and other insects and diseases of pecans. The field day will begin at 9:30 a. m. and will end with an orchard tour in the afternoon.

I believe a lot of farmers in Eastland County should consider guac for a cash crop, since there is an increasing demand for the guac beans. The beans are used by the oil, dairy, food, paper, textile, pharmaceutical and many other industries.

A net income of about \$200 per acre can be expected from an average crop of guac. It will be sold in Eastland County and buyers will bid where when the crop is harvested.

Eastland County live stock men could get some good information by attending the "Stocking and Feeding" field day at the Mustang, Texas center May 21.

Topics of the research available will be from 8:30 a. m. to 9:30. A discussion program will be from 10:30 until noon. Four speakers will discuss: forage, fertilization, year-round pasture program and grass management practices.
