Logic Mavericks Begin 2-A-Days Here On Monday

The first of six two-a-day football workouts will begin at 8 a.m. Monday, Aug. 17. Evening drills will begin at 5 p.m. Coach Shirley Frazier reports that approximately 55 boys are expected.

Of these 55 boys, 14 are returning lettermen from last year with a 10-0 record. The Mavericks will work out twice daily Monday through Friday. They will have one workout Saturday morning and two workouts the following Monday, Aug. 24.

Football shoes were issued to potential prospects Wednesday, Aug. 12. Physical must be signed and turned in to Coach Frazier before participating in any workouts. Anyone who is interested in playing football that has not reported must report to Coach Frazier Monday morning.

A great deal of enthusiasm has been shown and many players have been working out on their own through the summer.

Serving as captains for the 1970 Maverick football team will be two athletes who have yet to play on a Mav team that has had a losing season. Philip Smith, a two year letterman, will start his third season as a starting tackle. Philip is 6'1" and weighs 200 pounds. He is the son of Mr. Ruth Smith and lives at 202 South Hillcrest. Philip was an all-district performer last year and was also chosen on the All-Area team.

Philip Harrison, also a two year letterman will serve as the other captain. He is an All-Area performer and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Harrison of 505 S. Bassett. Philip is 5'10" and weighs 195 pounds.

Both these boys are seniors and will provide the experience and leadership that has become traditional of Mavericks' captains.

The Mavericks open with Haskell in Eastland on September 11 in what should be one of the top IIA games in the state.

The Eastland Maverick team of 1969 placed its name in the record book when it became only the third team in Eastland history to capture a District championship. The 1947 and the 1956 teams were the only other teams to do this.

In addition to becoming only the third Maverick team to capture a District title the Mavericks of 1969 recorded a first in Eastland history when they became the first Maverick team to finish a regular season undefeated and untied. The only blemish on their record was a Bi-district 14 to 14 with Haskell in bi-district play-offs. This game was considered by many to be the finest defensive game ever played by a Maverick team. On five different occasions the Mavericks prevented the Haskell Indians from scoring after reaching the five yard line. The Mavericks will have a chance at revenge when they open with Haskell in Maverick Stadium on September 11.

The team was composed of eight seniors, five juniors, nine sophomores and one freshman. The team was led by All-Staters Randy Lowrance and Alex Jimenez, captains for 1969-70. Mark it well. The 14th day of August, 1970, in Eastland County.

Water fell from the sky! The long, hot months of June and July delivered nothing. And it took a lot of hot wind, cloudless skies and high temperature this month before it finally got around to it.

Quitting-time Friday was when the best came down. Better than all the yard sprinklers in the world. The grass just made a pig of itself, and trees hadn't been so cool since last May. Dry-land peanut crops vowed they'd catch up with their irrigated brothers. Cows beamed. A lot of farmers nearly drowned, smiling and looking up.

People just walked in it, and got their faces all wet. Not a soul complained about muddy streets or wet shoes.

Windshield wipers, long since bone-dry, groaned into action. Headlights blinked like stars at 5 u. m., and you couldn't see the courthouse from Ed Sargent's grocery store.

A story comparing droughts was scrubbed in favor of a picture of a kid in the downpour. Dusty signboards glistened again. Rumbling thunder sounded good. Lights blinked.

It was just about an inch in Eastland, and it wasn't widespread, but, thanks be to God, it rained.

Construction of a new nursing home facility for this area will begin in 30 days in Eastland, according to an announcement made this week.

Builders will be Mr. and Mrs. R. W. McDonnell of Collinsville, who are successful nursing home builders throughout the Central Texas area.

Location of the new home for Eastland will be on a 200 by 300 foot lot, located in the 1300 block of West Main St., between Main and Commerce St., in the West part of town.

With the capacity of approximately 102 beds, the total employment will be 40, all locally hired. The building will be built in the shape of a six pointed star, with six wings jutting off a circular lobby, and be about 175 feet at its widest point.

The real estate transaction was handled by J. W. Elder of the Kincaid Real Estate Firm of Eastland.

Cost of the facility is estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$400,000 and occupancy is hoped to begin in November.

The new facility will officially be known as Wagon Wheels Lodge of Eastland.

Construction will be of masonry and will be built to state and federal nursing home specifications, it was announced.

Administration and staff will be announced at a later date.

Multiple facilities will be available for Class One, Class Two and Class Three patients Mr. McDonnell said.



Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."
(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.
(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.
(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

"(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, gravelled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

Monday Final Date To File Petitions On ASC Elections

Eligible farm voters have only one day left in which to circulate and sign nominating petitions for ASC community committees. August 17 is the final date petitions may be filed at the Eastland County ASCS Office. Mail elections are set for the second week in September.

"I want to re-emphasize to farmers who are eligible to vote that nominating candidates by petition is of prime importance. If six or more eligible candidates by petition in an ASC community, no other names will go on the ballot. In the past, the incumbent community committee also had the privilege of making nominations. Now, a community committee may nominate only if fewer than six eligible candidates are nominated by petition—and the committee may nominate only the number of candidates needed to make up a full slate of six nominees," R. G. Lyerla, Chairman of the County ASC Committee said.

No special forms are required for a petition—only a sheet of paper naming the candidate and the ASC community. Signatures of at least six eligible voters in the community are required on each petition. Only one candidate may be named on a petition but voters may sign as many
