untied. The only blamish on ious their record was a Bi-district 14 to 14 with Haskell in bidistrict play-offs. This game was considered by many to be the finest defensive game ever played by a Maverick team. On five different occasions th Mavericks prevented the Haskell Indians from scoring after reaching the five yard line. The Mavericks will have a chance at revenge when they open with Haskell in 'Maverick Stadium on September 11.

Water fell from the sky!

The long, hot months of June and July delivered nothing. And it took a lot of hot wind, cloudless skys and high temperature this month before it finally got around to it.

Quitting-time Friday was when the best came down. Better than all the yard sprinklers in the world. The grasss just made a pig of itself, and trees hadn't been so cool since last May. Dry-land peanut crops vowed they'd catch up with their irrigated brothers. Cows beamed. A lot of farmers nearly drowned, smiling and looking up.

People just walked in it, and got their faces all wet. Not a soul complained about muddy streets or wet shoes.

Windshield wipers, long since bone-dry, groaned into action. Headlights blinked like stars at 5 u.m., and you couldn't see the courthouse from Ed Sargent's grocery store.

A story comparing droughts was scrubbed in favor of a picture of a kid in the downpour.

Dusty signboards glistened again. Rumbling thunder sounded good. Lights blinked.

It was just about an inch in Eastland, and it wasn't Jaspread but thanks be to God, it rained.
