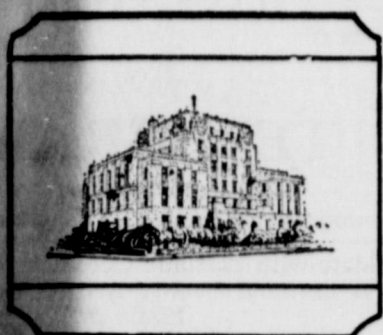

Joe Cook, '28, Recipient Of Honor Medal

With Eastland's Homecoming coming up next week, William K. Sewell, president of the Eastland Homecoming Association, today announced that Joe T. Cook, a graduate of Eastland High School, class of 1928, has been awarded the George Washington Honor Medal by Freedoms Foundation for an editorial that appeared under his byline in the Winston County Journal of Louisville, Mississippi.

Cook, who gained his first newspaper experience on the Eastland Telegram while a student in EHS, is editor and publisher of the Winston County Journal of Louisville. He is a graduate of the University of Texas school of journalism and for many years published and edited the Mission Times of Mission where he won many newspapers awards and prizes for weekly papers.

He and Mrs. Cook, who is the former Dorothy McCannies, daughter of Mr. H. A. McCannies, formerly of Eastland, but now of Cisco, bought the Winston County Journal after selling their portion of the Mission Times to the majority stockholder, The Allan Shivers of Mission and Austin.

Since moving to Louisville they have expanded the physical plant of their enterprise and added class and distinction to an already fine newspaper until they now have what many consider to be one of the finest weekly newspapers in America.

Cook is also vice president of the Mississippi Newspaper Publishers Association.

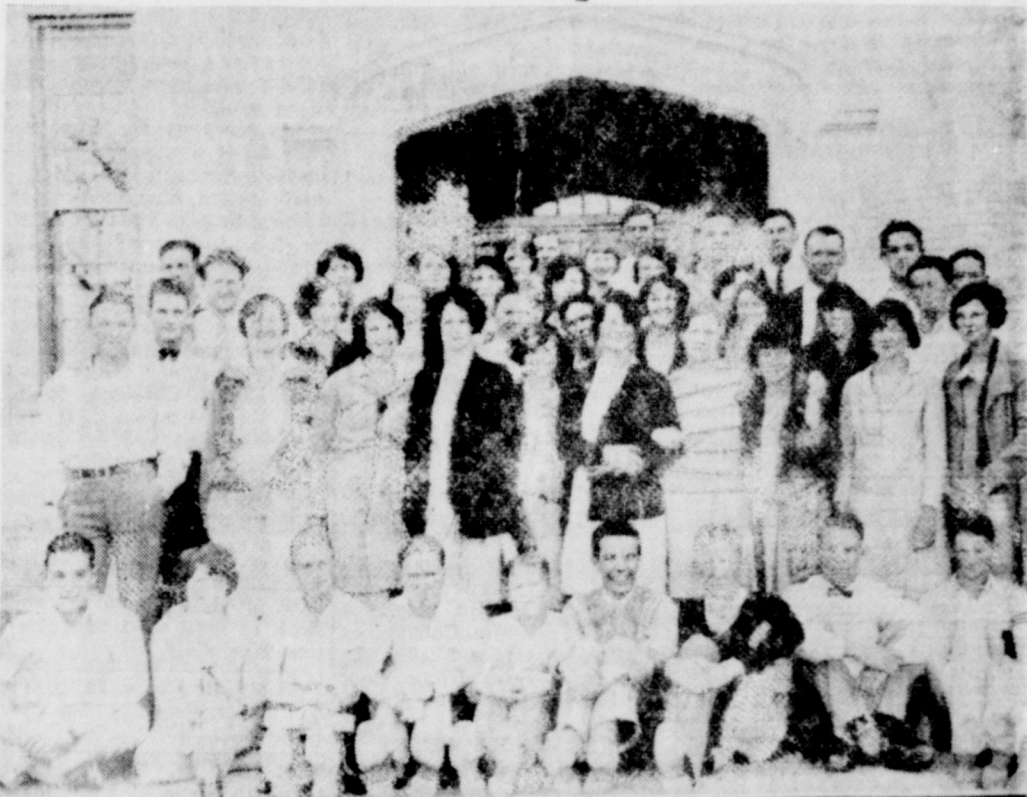
1922 will hold a get-together meeting of coffee and cakes at the Sunday-school annex to the First Christian Church Saturday, June 27th at 9:30 a. m.

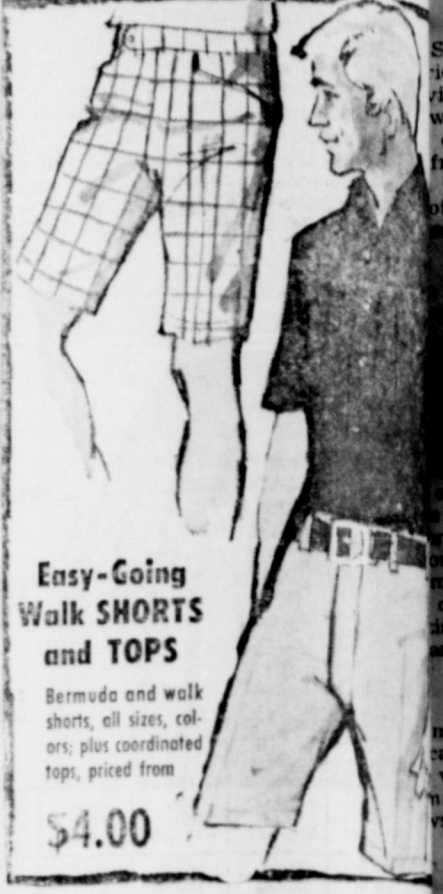

Wins Scholarship Club Foods Excellence

Olden 4-H Foods club for the past eight years, Miss Moseley has been president and council delegate and held other offices. She is a junior leader working primarily with 4-H members in food and clothing projects.

Her projects have included gardening, swim, bicycle, natural resources and public speaking. She was named Gold Star girl in 1969, won the I Dare You Award in 1968 and won a first place award for her demonstration in Natural Resources at the 1968 State Round-up.

In her foods project dealing with nutrition, she carried a feeding program using white rats. She fed two rats a balanced diet and two a poor diet consisting of soda pop, cookies, and other "snacks".

This past year Miss Moseley's interest turned to a study of Turkey, the Turkish people, their eating habits, culture and agriculture of that country. From her study Patsy chose to prepare a dish from Turkey as her entry in the 4-H Foods show.

The following is a recipe for her winning dish.

Kremi (Creamed Apricot Bowl)
1/2 lb. dried apricots
1/2 c. sugar
3/4 c. water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 pt. heavy cream, whipped
3 tablespoons sugar
1/4 c. toasted slivered almonds
Soak apricots in cold water overnight. Drain. If using soft

ones, reduce soaking time. Place water and the 3/4 cup of sugar in a sauce pan. Bring to a boil, then add apricots.

Cook over low heat, uncovered for about one hour, or until apricots are tender and the water is reduced to about 1/4 cup. (Watch closely and stir often to keep from burning.)

Remove from heat. Beat apricot mixture with electric mixer a few minutes until apricots are broken up.

Cool. Transfer to serving bowl.

Whip cream and then stir in almonds on top of whipped cream.

Chill until ready to serve. Serves 4.

House Act Offers Assistance in Purchase

Austin—Many families are eligible to buy a new three or four bedroom home with a down payment of only \$200, but are not taking advantage of this opportunity because they are not aware of the provisions of Section 235 of the National Housing Act.

"Financial help is available to enable low income families to buy their own home," according to Tom Yager, president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, "but many are not familiar with this program. To get complete details on the provisions of this section of the National Housing Act," Yager advised, "see your local lumber dealer."

The program offers assistance in the form of monthly payments by the Department of Housing and Urban Development to the leading institutions to reduce interest cost on a market rate home mortgage insured by FHA if a homeowner cannot afford to make a conventional loan.

Know Your Laws..

Whenever you leave home—even if only for a few minutes—make sure that doors and windows are locked.

Keep your garage door closed and locked at all times, whether you're home or not. Keep a record of the serial numbers of such merchandise as television sets, radios, stereos, pistols, rifles, etc.

Observe carefully and report any suspicious persons or vehicles. Be sure to get the correct license number for any suspected vehicles.

Report any crime to the police at once and be willing to testify if necessary.

Cooperate with officers investigating offense in your neighborhood.

Keep valuable stamp, jewelry and coin collections in a safety deposit box rather than at home.

Trim any shrubbery around entrances so that it cannot provide a protective screen for burglars.

Make sure all locks on doors and windows are in working order.

Keep vehicles parked in your driveway locked.

Do not leave lawnmowers, garden tools and other equipment unattended in your yard.

Be cautious of strangers. Women at home alone should be extremely cautious of strangers coming to the door.

Canning Methods Are Modernized

Many fresh vegetables and fruits are available at this time. Improvements in home canning and freezing methods make it more enjoyable for the homemaker to preserve the natural goodness of foods at home.

Freezing foods is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor, and food values of most fruits, vegetables, and meats better than other methods of food preservation.

The Frozen Foods bulletin is available from the County Home Demonstration Agents Office. It gives directions for freezing fruit, vegetables, meats, dairy products, eggs, fish, prepared foods, and other foods. The Frozen Foods bulletin Home Canning bulletins plus Home Canning bulletins.

Homemakers are reminded that in canning vegetables such as beans and peas, that it is necessary to heat vegetables before freezing to slow or stop the action of enzymes which cause spoilage. Until vegetables are ready to pick the enzymes help them grow and mature. After that they cause loss of flavor and color. If vegetables are not heated enough, the enzymes continue to be active during food storage. The vegetables will then develop off-flavors in a few months and may discolor and toughen. Heating also wilts or softens vegetables and makes them easier to pack. Too long a heating period in the blanching process will result in softening of texture and unnecessary loss of water soluble vitamins and minerals.

July 3rd Final Date for Crop Measurements

July 3 has been set as the final date to request measurement service for peanuts, feed grain, and diverted acres that have been planted. It was announced by Jesse G. Meredith, of the Eastland County ASCS.

This deadline is necessary so that crops may be measured and acreage certifications filed. The cost is \$5.00 per

farm, plus \$2.00 for each plot over one, plus 5 cents an acre. During the busy planting period, probably through June, the County Committees will meet each Wednesday night from 8:30 until 10:00 p.m. They will then resume regular meeting on the first and third Wednesday.

The final certification date for cotton, peanut, and feed

grain acreage is August 1 when the planted acreage and the acres diverted under the free program must be certified.

New grower wheat applications must be filed not later than July 1 for the 1971 crop. The peanut price support rates for 1970 peanuts is increased \$7.50 per ton. This increase was made to make the
