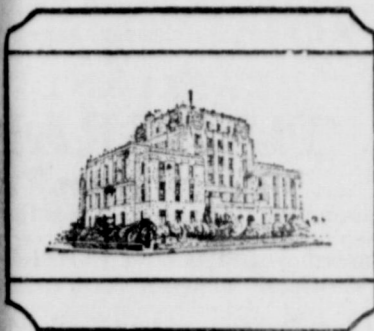

Beauty Pageant Week Ahead With Many Features Planned

Miss Pearson Represents County In Beauty Pageant

The Eyes of Texas turn toward Eastland this week as the Second Annual State Peanut Queen Pageant unfolds in this Peanut-raising country.

Eleven beautiful girls are expected to begin arriving at mid-week for the big event's activities.

Promoting Mr. Peanut is the theme, and a whirl of activities will include local and visitors. Sponsored by the Southwestern Peanut Growers and Shellers Associations, the Pageant is under the direction of the Eastland Jaycees, with Rollins in charge.

A get-acquainted Press Party is scheduled for Thursday evening at Lone Cedar Country Club for the pretty entries. The Eastland Chamber of Commerce is busy with details under the supervision of President Ben McKinnis and Secretary Emma Lou Benton. Many aspects have to be covered including finding housing and chaperons for the girls, securing rooms for parents and out-of-town friends here for the event, plus a hundred and one other details.

Regional television coverage is anticipated with a Fort-Worth Dallas station planning to do an extensive coverage of the county's peanut industry and the pageant in particular.

The two-night pageant will be held Friday and Saturday evening at the Majestic Theater in Eastland, with tickets on sale beginning Monday.

Among the many special added attractions will be the appearance Saturday evening of Diabe Swendeman, Miss Texas Universe, 1970.

Master of Ceremonies will be Clin Lewis of Dyess AFB and the special band engaged for the show is the "Swing Lows of Abilene, featuring Mrs. Dora Nel Finch as organist.

Officials of the Texas State Peanut Queen Pageant today released the names of the princesses in the 1970 state pageant.

The girls and their home towns are: Miss Brenda Branton, Brady; Miss Susie Howard, Cuero; Miss Marilyn Hill, Ladonia; Miss Mary Ann Woolsey, Floresville; Miss Beth Pearson, Ranger; Miss Joan Frances Booth, Cotulla;

Miss Courtney Mayes of Floresville. She was "Miss Congeniality" of the 1969 Pageant and will present the Miss Congeniality Award this year. The new queen will be crowned on stage at the Majestic Theatre the evening of Saturday, Aug 15 and be presented with a \$500 scholarship to the college of her choice during a special half-time ceremony at the 11th Annual Peanut Bowl Football Game which will be played in Maverick Stadium in Eastland on Sept. 19. The scholarship will be presented by Mr. De Vore Willard, president of the National Peanut Council.

Master of ceremonies for the Pageant this year will be Sgt. Clo Lewis of Dyess AFB, Abilene. Sgt Lewis is also featured vocalist for the evening. Music for the presentation is to be presented by the 'Swing Lows' of Abilene, with Mrs. Dora Nel Finch as featured organist. The Pageant is under the technical direction of Mrs. Mary Douglas of Abilene. Larry Rollins of Eastland is the chairman of the Pageant for the Jaycees.

Another young lady returning from the 1969 pageant is Miss Martha Thiebaut, Dublin; Miss Beth Calhoun, De Leon; Miss Gail Homme, Breckenridge; Miss Barbara Ritter, Anson; and Miss Carolyn Telford, Pleasanton.

The Peanut Queen is chosen each year from peanut princesses who represent counties with peanut allotments. Girls between the ages of 17 and 21, are judged on poise, personality, beauty and talent. Judges for the pageant are chosen from a variety of professions from over the state.

The 1969 Queen was Miss Ma-sha White of Katemey, representing Mason County. During the past year, Miss White has traveled extensively for the Peanut Board as representative in state and national events. She will crown the new 1970 state peanut queen.

Lions Get the Low-Down On Beauty Pageants

The pitfalls and foibles of staging beauty contests was vividly outlined for members of the Eastland Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting at Elephant Restaurant.

Dick Dixon, who's become Mr. Pageant, in Eastland, was speaker and he told of the history and the excitement of staging beauty events. The Eastland Jaycees are presently involved in staging the Second Annual Texas Peanut Queen Pageant to be held at the Majestic Theater in Eastland next week, and Dixon told of his involvement in the contests since "way back in 1962."

The Eastland Jaycees launched the Peanut Queen in 1960 to promote the county's peanut industry, and added a queen's contest to the second Bowl's activities, when Miss Carol McMay was crowned queen at the 1961 show, he explained. He moved to Eastland in 1962 with Interstate Theatres, and in that year, he "unknowingly" agreed to accept responsibility for the contest. He's had it ever since in some degree. Larry Rollins is Pageant chairman this year, but Dixon is helping in an advisory capacity.

The Jaycees' Pageant went statewide last year when the Southwestern Peanut Growers and Shellers Association asked the local club to broaden the base and make it a state wide contest to further exploit the peanut industry.

That first year, last year, was a real education, Dixon explains. "We thought we had troubles on the local level. Wow."

"You wouldn't believe the little things that come up — like getting appointment for 11 girls at hair dressers on Saturdays; like finding as many local women who can and will give up three days from their families to serve as chaperons; or like getting a rain-soaked alley filled and leveled on the day of the pageant, so contestants wont sink in mud entering and leaving the theatre." One last year involved an automobile accident in which one of the girls was injured. She went on with the contest and

2 Tennessee Aces Signed By Wranglers

Coach Ace Prescott of Cisco Junior College has announced the signing of two outstanding backfield men from Tennessee to play with the Wrangler footballers this season.

They are Doug Ivey and Steve Davis from LaFollette, Tennessee.

Ivey, a quarterback, broke most of LaFollette High School's passing records as he passed for 1490 yards, 18 touchdowns, and a completion percentage of 57%. He is 6-1 tall and weighs 175 pounds. He runs the option play well and Prescott feels that he will fit into the CJC offensive system very effectively. Doug was voted the LaFollette team's most valuable offensive player during the past season and was named All-Division quarterback in the Northeastern Conference of Tennessee. In addition to his athletic prowess Ivey was also a leader in his school, serving as student body president in 1959-70.

Steve Davis, who is an outstanding running back and exceptional pass receiver, was selected as the most valuable player in the Northeastern Conference and was nominated on the Honorable Mention All-State team. In the first nine games of the '69 season Steve had run for 1400 yards and scored 150 points and was second on the team in pass receiving. In the season finale he scored six times as Doug Ivey, the other CJC recruit from LaFollette, passed for three touchdowns and 261 yards.

Coach Prescott is elated that CJC has been able to recruit the two Tennessee backfield men, and feels that they both represent extremely fine prospects for the Cisco school's team.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."
(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit: (1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes. (2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof. (3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof. (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxpaying electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

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Phil Hewett, Now at KSU, Writes Basic Band Book

Phillip W. Hewett, former Eastland High School Band Director, has written a new, basic book designed to assist band directors in inaugurating stage band programs.

Mr. Hewett, is assistant director of bands at Kansas State University and director of the KSU marching and stage bands.

The work is titled 'Essential Techniques for the Development of a Stage Band Program' and is intended for the band director who doesn't know anything about jazz and who needs some help to get a stage band started," Hewett says.

Hewett has to be considered one of the country's top authorities in stage band work. He has been involved with stage bands since 1957 when he had a band at Eastland. He started the stage band program at Paschal High School in Fort Worth, in 1962 and his Paschal High School stage bands won national championships in 1965-66, and 1967. His 1968 stage band was selected to play for the grand opening of the Hemisfair in San Antonio.

Since he went to K-State in 1968, Hewett has had charge of the KSU stage bands. This past spring the K-State band took top honors for collegiate bands at the Jazz Festival in Kansas City. Hewett frequently serves as a clinician for stage band workshops and has conducted state-

wide clinics in Kansas, Missouri, Louisiana and Texas.

Hewett, who says his book should be of special benefit to high school or college band men starting stage bands and for college music students who plan to teach in this area, includes advice on how to secure school administration support for a stage band program and how to choose music. He also has sections on jazz interpretation, a basic approach to solo playing, and stage band instrumentation.

"I have tried to interpret some of the unwritten rules of jazz playing so that a band director, even if he has had no experience in the field, can understand it," Hewett concludes.

Telegram Staffer Tells World About Old Rip Via WWL Radio

"We heard on the radio locally (in New Orleans) about a frog named 'Old Reb' that was buried alive in the cornerstone of your courthouse and survived alive in a coma for a period of 50 years before he was discovered alive and became a celebrity locally and died some time later of pneumonia. If you do not know now, please do us a favor and call back to us. We would appreciate your help to settle this bet. Thanks."

(Hollywood's reply): "The story is correct. What other

information do you need? We will be glad to send you a booklet on Old Rip, not Old Reb.

Management of Hollywood sent a booklet on "Old Rip" and a tie tack to Spies Shipping.

Mrs. Rowena Hart came in to the Telegram office Wednesday and said her daughter who lives in New Orleans had heard the conversation about Old Rip over the air and she had been real excited about it. She wrote, "Many people heard the radio broadcast and called in and verified everything that was said about Old Rip. They were there at the time."

So you see, it's a small world!

(ED. NOTE: Mrs. Hart's daughter further wrote that Miss Baker did a beautiful job of telling the Old Rip and Eastland story for the 50,000 watt, popular around-the-world radio station and she was heard around the world.)
