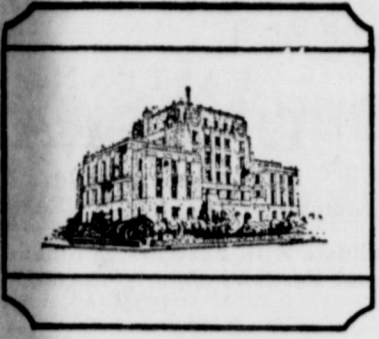

Bits IH-20 Construction in Varied Stages

Work on the Interstate route around Eastland and Cisco is in varying stages.

The eleven (11) mile stretch from State Highway 206 West of Cisco to Highway 6 South of Eastland is being covered with asphalt stabilized base material by Cecil Ruby Co., Inc. prior to the placing of the finished pavement.

The asphalt stabilized base operation might be completed late this fall and the finished pavement after the first of the year. Weather will affect this phase of construction and will control the time of completion.

Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun reports.

The detour on the West side of Cisco will be extremely dangerous and all persons are advised to proceed through it with caution. This detour, which is pictured, probably will be in operation in about two (2) weeks.

As you will note in the picture a portion of the frontage roads will be used by Interstate traffic and the East bound traffic will use the new bridge.

Vehicles traveling State

Highway 206 from Cisco to Cross Plains should be especially careful while passing through intersection points "A" and "B" as shown and frontage roads East of these points are to be avoided if possible. In general, a safe and sane speed is essential to safety.

A project to tie into this eleven (11) mile stretch and complete the by-pass route is in the early stages of construction. This project is approximately 3.5 miles long and the work is being done

by J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Abilene. This project should be nearing completion by the end of 1971.

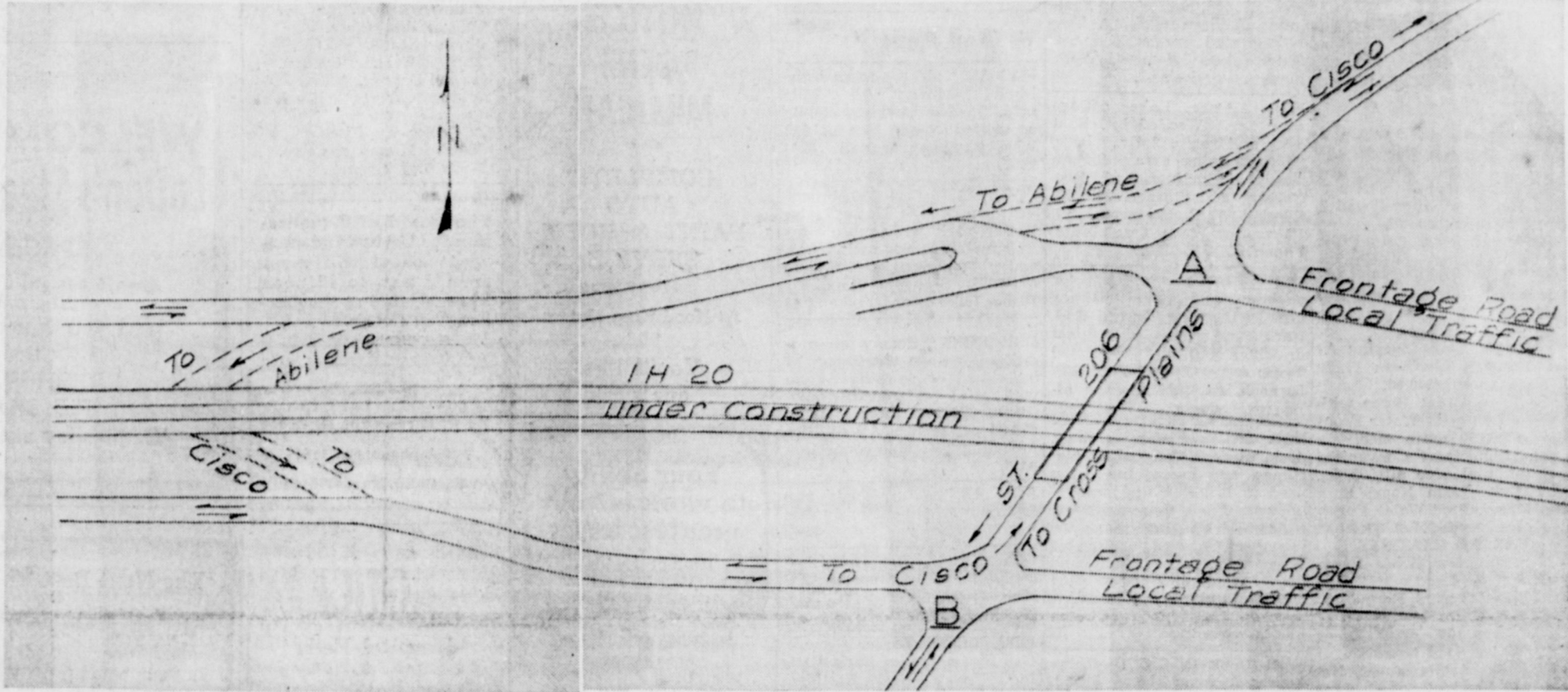
In another part of the county, Cecil Ruby Co., Inc. will complete work of the Ranger by-pass section of Interstate 20 around the 1st of July and traffic will be using this new route shortly thereafter.

Right of way has been purchased on that part of the highway from Eastland to Ranger but contracts for this work have not been let.

To complete work on the

Interstate route, plans are being made to reconstruct the outside traveled lanes and add frontage roads and bridges to a three (3) mile section from the Erath County Line West toward Ranger. The original construction was completed in 1957.

In conjunction with the Interstate work, a connection is being planned to tie the Interchange West of Eastland to U.S. Highway 80 that will follow the county road known as the "Plant Road" or "Thrill Hill."



A PLACE TO BE CAREFUL — This map shows the detour complex which will carry traffic around the area just west of Cisco when Interstate 20 building from the east, is spliced into old Highway 80, which route it will follow westward. The junction will take place at the new bridge built to carry the Cross Plains Highway over IH-20, which is now closed to vehicles. The map was prepared by the State Highway

Department county resident engineer's office. Dotted corridors show the connections between the frontage roads and the present highways west flow. The incoming detour will pass over the bridge. The design, while the best possible, offers hazards due to the increased number of vehicles on narrow roads, which caution motorists to be especially careful when the detours are put into service, expected within about two weeks.

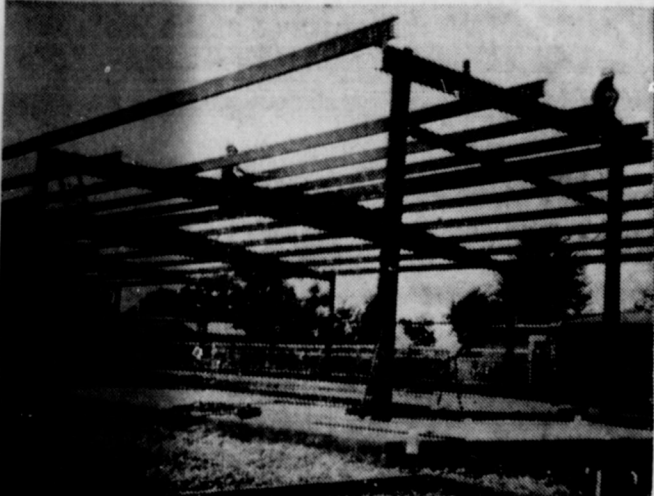
