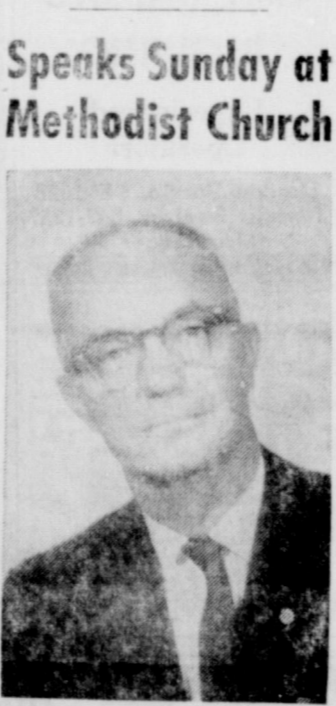

# Homemakers Hints

**JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH**  
Milk and dairy products are important the year around, but the month of June is a very special month for the dairy industry, states Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Home Demonstration Agent, for June is dairy month.  
This is the 33rd year that June has been celebrated nationally as dairy month.  
Few of us get through an entire day without some dairy product, said Mrs. Thomas, whether we drink it, chew it, or just let it slide coolly down our throats.  
Milk or dairy products can do many things for us. Its calcium helps to build our bones and teeth; its protein repairs our tissues, fights infection, and gives us energy; its riboflavin helps our cells use oxygen, keeps our vision clear, and smooths our skin. The presence and balance of these and other components of milk make it one of the most nutritious of human foods.  
With the hot summer months here, you might like to incorporate milk into some refreshing and nutritious summer desserts.

**LEMON BISQUE**  
1 can (14 1/2 oz.) evaporated milk  
1 package lemon flavored gelatin  
1 1/4 cups boiling water  
1/3 cup honey or white corn syrup

1/8 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
Grated rind of 1 lemon  
2 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs

Dissolve lemon gelatin in boiling water, add honey or corn syrup, salt, lemon juice, and rind. When it has congealed slightly, beat milk until it is stiff, and whip in jellied mixture. Spread half of

crumbs in a large pan (10x13 1/2 inches) and pour lemon mixture over them. Top with remaining crumbs and set in refrigerator to chill for at least three hours. Cut into squares and serve plain or with whipped cream. Serves 12 to 15.

You might also like to try this quick refreshing recipe—**APRICOT WHIP**  
1 cup evaporated milk  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 1/2 cup apricot pulp  
1/2 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon almond extract  
Whip milk until it begins to thicken (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice and whip very stiff. Combine apricot pulp, sugar, almond extract. Fold into whipped milk. Chill 2 to 3 hours in refrigerator.

If a firmer consistency is desired, freeze in ice cube tray. (Note: Fresh, frozen, canned, or dried apricots may be used. Other peaches, plums may be used in place of apricots.)
