Twenty games without a loss. And it was on the 21st start, that ended in defeat for the Magic Mavericks, as they saw the scoreboard tilt in favor of the Bluecats, 14-13, in Coleman Friday night, to give the two teams Co-Championships for District 7-AA.

Coleman will carry the district colors into post-season playoffs — against Haskell in Abilene Friday night.

The Eastland Mavericks and fans came away, feeling much as the Winters crowd must have felt a week earlier, when the Blizzards won — in everything but scores. Eastland deserves what goes into the record books. That football.

The superstitious could see any number of signs from the Friday the 13th game that ended with a 13 for Eastland — one less than enough to hurt the Mavericks into Bi-District play. Eastland could have earned the playoff right with just a tie. But for one lousy point.

Except for a nightmare third quarter, it was Eastland's ballgame. Quarterback Craig Lund bucked over from the one in the first quarter and Kicker James Eidson pointed true for a giant 7-0 lead that held through the first half.

The Mavericks won the toss and chose to kick off with the gusty north wind at their backs. The strategy almost gave them the game, but after they scored one quick touchdown, a fumble — one of five lost by Eastland — and a pass interception kept the Mavericks out of the Coleman end zone for the rest of the quarter.

The Bluecats their passing stymied by the wind, had to punt from their 29-yard line the first two times they had the ball. Both times Eastland

the Bluecats took over on a punt at their own 38 and drove 62 yards in 14 plays for what proved to be the winning points.

Acala keyed the drive by picking up two first downs on crucial third down plays, and he set up the score by passing 13 yards to Wood at the Eastland three. Big sophomore fullback Mike Marrs fought his way to the one, and the second of two quarterback sneaks by Acala scored the touchdown with 1:18 to go in the third period.

The Bluecats tried to pass for another two-point conversion that would have put the game almost out of reach, but Acala's toss went incomplete, leaving the score 14-7, with the trailing Mavericks owning the wind during the crucial fourth quarter.

But on Eastland's first two possessions of the fourth period the Bluecats recovered fumbles, and managed to eat up the clock by picking up three big first downs against the wind.

At last Eastland took over at its own 30 with 4:03 left in

the game, and this time the proud Mavericks were not to be denied.

King scampered for 12 yds. to the 42 from the first play; then Lund hit wingback Randy Rexroat on a fly pattern that carried for 53 yards all the way to the Coleman five. An illegal procedure penalty moved the ball back to the two, and two plays later Lund faked to King, then slid off left tackle for the touchdown.

There was 2:27 on the fourth period clock as Eidson lined up for the conversion try. The frantic Bluecats jumped offsidelines, moving the ball half the distance to the goal line at the 1½ yard-line.

Still going for the tie and the championship, the Mavericks lined up to kick again, but the kick was blocked.

The Mavericks, trailing 14-13, tried a desperation onsideline kick, but one of the Mavericks touched the ball

before it went the required 10 yards and the Bluecats took over at the Eastland 35 with 2:20 remaining.

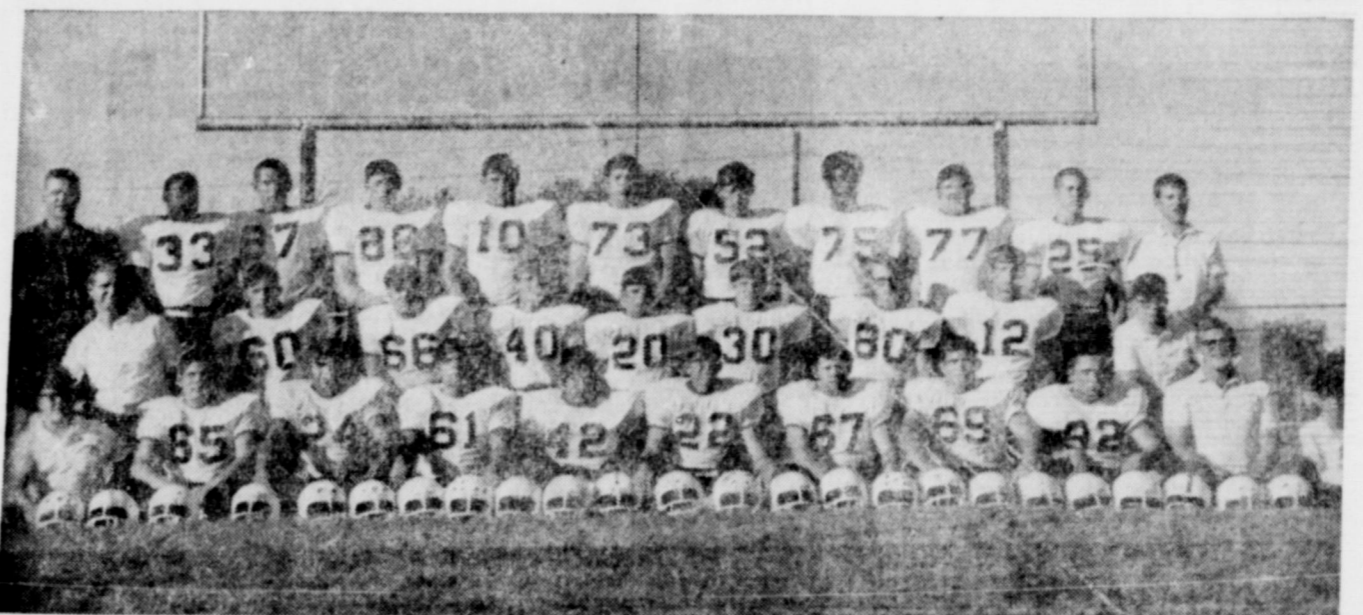
Marrs rambled 16 yards for a first down as the Mavericks clawed for the ball instead of for the tackle, and as a result Eastland didn't get the ball back until only two seconds were left on the clock.

A pass interference call moved the ball up 21 yards, but Lund's next throw went incomplete, and the Maver-

icks proved their Championship Qualities by being perfect Sports in defeat.

Carbon Wreck Victim Buried in Friday Rites

Funeral services for Roy Gene Burns, 27, killed in a two-car accident south of Carbon Wednesday night about 7:30, were held at Higginbotham Funeral Home at Rising Star Friday at 2 p. m. with burial in Elm Cemetery near Okra. Military rites were observed.

Survivors are his father, John Henry Burns and his stepmother, Barina of Carbon; his mother, Mrs. Edith Tugle of Stephenville; two brothers, John Wayne of Fort Worth and Ronnie of Carbon; four stepbrothers, Gerald Timmy and Bobby Wooley, all of Carbon, and Danny Wooley of Weatherford; a sister, Mrs. Carol Burke of Fort Worth; a step sister, Mrs. Fannie Smith of Dyersburg, Tenn.

Born Dec. 29, 1947 in Gorman Sgt. Burns had just returned from Army service in

Vietnam where he had received the Purple Heart, two Bronze Stars, the Air Medal and Combat Infantryman Badge.

He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Burns, son of John Burns of Carbon, was killed instantly when the 1969 Chevrolet Camaro he was driving collided with a truck driven by Joe Donald Tucker of Cisco.

The collision occurred on a curve of FM road 1027. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton of Eastland.

Tucker was not injured.

Two other Carbon youths, Mike Stanley, 22, and Randy Puck, 18, were treated at Eastland Hospital and later released.

Highway Patrolman Gary Brewer investigated.

Young Burns, a native of Rising Star and graduate of Rising Star High School, was a Vietnam veteran. He returned from that theater about a month ago and was sent to a U. S. Army installation in England for a month. He had just returned from that assignment and was preparing to report to Fort Hood for further duty Thursday morning.

He and his companions were on their way to Rising Star when the accident occurred.

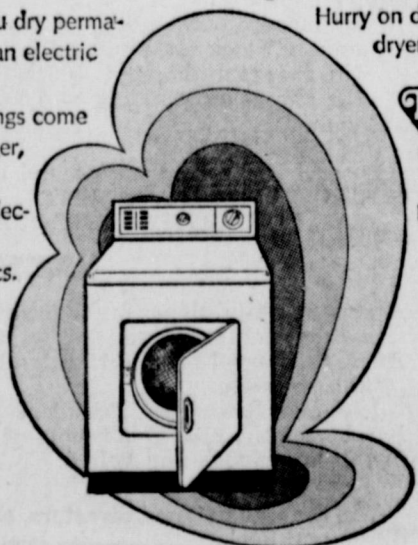

THERE MAY have been years when the county foliage has been pretty, but we can't remember when. Peanut trailers had been running their wheels off before Friday's winter blew in, and farmers were hastening to get their crops in. The leaves have been especially pretty on the Lake Leon Road and along the old Bankhead Highway from Int. 20, east of Cisco, into Ave. D. From afar, these vistas are a blaze of color, and should be exploited as are the New England foliage. (Which reminds: things are being drawn for Eastland billboards and judging from the neighbors, the time is non-to-short. Reckon Eastland could do anything with its two, gigantic, already in place billboards... water towers atop Park hill? Maybe not candy-stripe'em, but at least put some lights with the word "EASTLAND" on them, 'cause they can certainly be seen from Int. 20 south.

Texas has lots of most everything including trees. The average person probably can name 15 to 20 species native to our state. First named could well be oak. There are 18 types of oaks in Texas. Then there is pine. We have seven varieties in the state. You might overlook such native Texas trees as pawpaw, two-wing silverbell, sassafras or fringetree, but you certainly would think of pecan, mesquite and elm. A bulletin from Texas A&M, lists 138 different types of trees native to our state, and if you think this includes most of the species to be found anywhere, you are very much in error.

Yale University has a wood collection famed as one of the greatest repositories of woody plant material in the world. You will probably be surprised to know that this collection includes more than 14,000 species of trees.

Wood is the only basic structural material renewed by nature and it is the only one that doesn't require irreplaceable ores, natural deposits or fossil fuels to produce. Modern scientific methods of tree-farming assures us of a continuing supply of this most important building material.

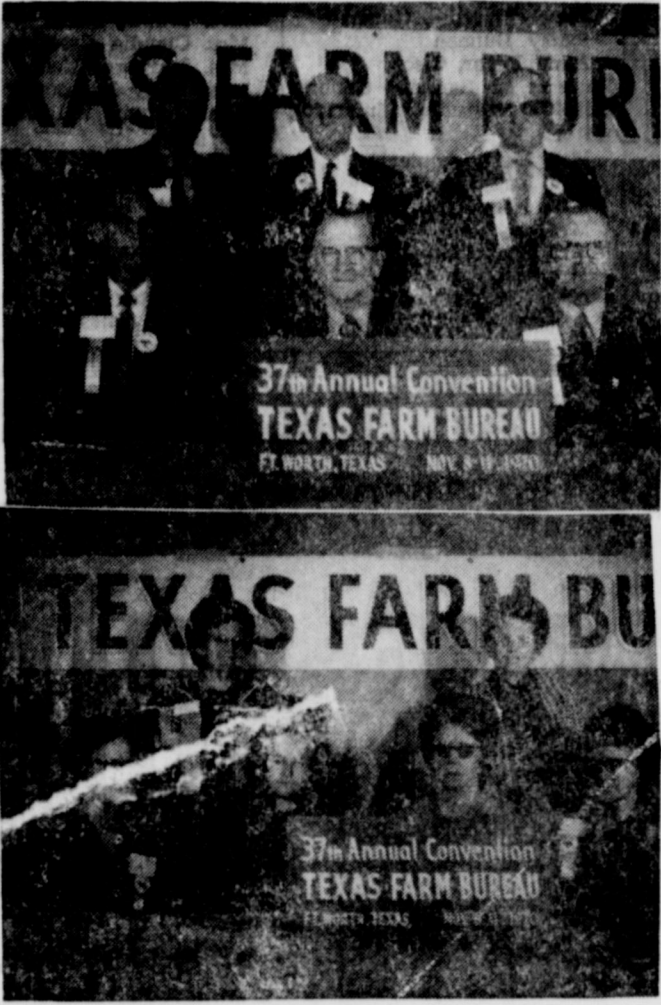
