Maverick Defense Comes Through For Crucial 18-7 Win Over Ballinger

Bobbled Ball Gives Bearcats Lone Score

District 8-AA mover down to the wire, and action Friday night puts the Mighty Eastland Mavericks in unbeatable position, a game ahead, with a defense-earned victory in Ballinger, 18-7.

In other district action, big surprise came when Hamilton defeated Winters 12-7 in an upset. (Eastland downed Hamilton a week earlier.) Comanche downed Cisco, 21-7, and Coleman stopped Clyde, 48-6 in predictables.

The Winter Blizzards will come to Eastland Friday next in an effort to up their standings. Last game of the season will pit Eastland at Coleman.

The fired-up Bearcats appeared to be headed for an upset of their own when Eastland's Howard King bobbled the opening kickoff, then got possession only to fumble when hit hard at the five. The ball bounced back to the two, where Johnny Slaughter recovered for Ballinger.

It took the Bearcats two plays to capitalize on the break, with quarterback Ricky Akins sneaking over from a yard out. Bobby Wanoreck's kick made it 7-0 with a mere 38 seconds gone in the first quarter.

With Wanoreck kicking off from the Eastland 45 after the Mavericks were penalized for a personal foul on the ion-verson, the return took the ball only to the Maverick nine-yard line.

It started a bad trend for the Mavericks, who on six first-half possessions had to start from their own 9, then 15, 4, 13, 18 and 20-yard lines.

The first two times they had to punt, and Ballinger almost used the excellent field positions to shove across another touchdown after the second Eastland punt.

Starting from the Eastland 43, the Bearcats struggled to the 21 before the Maverick's hard hitting little defensive end, Steve Lopez, turned things around. On second down he penetrated to drop fullback Johnny Slaughter for a five-yard loss; then he blind-sided quarterback Akins for an eight-yard loss on third down, forcing a Bearcat punt from the Maverick 32.

The Bearcats downed the punt at the four, but the poor field position didn't bother the Mavericks. Ruben Gaeta, Eastland's powerful halfback, picked up a crucial first down at the 15. Three plays later McCleskey hit Butch Eidson with a short pass, and the big tight end broke a tackle and rumbled for a 49-yard gain to the Ballinger 36.

Gaeta, the game's leading rusher with 83 yards on 24 carries, picked up two more first downs; then on fourth down and goal from inches away, McCleskey belied to his right and slipped through right tackle for the touchdown. Eidson missed the conversion, and Eastland still trailed, 7-6, with 9:07 to go in the first half.

Though Ballinger twice took over inside Eastland territory, neither team was able to mount a threat during the remainder of the second quarter. In fact, the Bearcats didn't get past the Eastland 25 until their last possession of the game, when Eastland owned an insurmountable 18-7 lead.

Akins stopped Eastland's first drive in the third quarter with an interception — one of three thrown by McCleskey — at the Bearcat 35. After an exchange of punts, however, Eastland's Randy Rexroat returned the favor by intercepting an Akins pass at the Ballinger 35, setting up the go. (Continued on page 8)

Party Loyalty, Amendments Are Vote-Inspiring Issues Tuesday

Polis will open at 8 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 3 at eight voting precincts in Eastland County for what is expected to be a vote-attracting General Election.

As in all general elections, it will be a confrontation of Party loyalty, and officials of both major parties locally are hoping for and urging a good turnout of voters.

Approximately 8,000 are registered to vote in Eastland County, but best-educated guesses as to the turn-out Tuesday, puts it at just under 6,000. (County Clerk Johnson Smith guesses that 5,813 will make it to the polls.)

Added inducement—either to turn out and vote, or to stay at home and not vote—are seven more Constitutional Amendment propositions.

Polis will remain open until 7 p.m., and returns will be channeled in to the County Clerk's office where tabulations will be made and results reported to the Texas Election Bureau.

Voting places and judges are as follows: Precinct One, Eastland, Mrs. Jeanette Harris and Mrs. Merle Richardson, Courthouse Lobby.

Precinct Two, Olden, Dr. Dick Hodges and Mrs. S. G. Everts, Community Center.

Precinct Three, Ranger, Don Adams and V. V. Cooper, City Hall.

Precinct Four, Desdemona,

L. E. Clark, Docie Williams, Community Center. Precinct Five, Gorman, O. amendment relating to the removal, retirement, of censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances.

No. 2. Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

No. 3. The constitutional amendment to authorize the die Brightwell and Wayne White, Fire Station.

Precinct Six, Carbon, A. E. Guy and Henry Lovell, insurance office.

Precinct Seven, Rising Star, City Hall, G. A. Dunn Jr. and Fred Price.

Precinct Eight, Cisco, J. V. Tieyser and W.R. Huesties, City Hall.

Only contested local race is at Rising Star where Republican James F. Frizell is opposing Democratic Incumbent Justice of the Peace B. A. Butler.

On the National level, Democratic Candidate Lloyd Bentsen and Republican George Bush seek the United States Senate seat now held by Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Cong. Omar Burleson, Democrat, is unopposed for reelection.

Telephone Company Announces Direct Distance Dialing Soon

"Direct Distance Dialing, a system which permits telephone users to dial direct across the nation almost as easily as they now call across the street, is coming to Eastland Dec. 11," John McGowan, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said.

"Planning for Direct Distance Dialing — referred to in communications circles as DDD — has been underway for some time," McGowan said.

"Due to the magnitude of this project and the amount of work to be done here and in other long distance telephone switching centers, it has not been possible for us to make a formal announcement of the new service prior to this time," he said.

McGowan also noted that three other towns in this area will be able to dial DDD by the end of January, 1971. DDD will go into effect in Eastland on December 11 followed by Albany on December 18, and Cisco, January 8, 1971.

"DDD is another evidence of our faith in the future growth of Eastland," McGowan said.

"This new and faster method of calling out-of-town telephones has been hailed by communications engineers as one of the single greatest advancements in communications since the old magneto, crank-type instruments disappeared from the walls of homes and businesses," he added.

"The change to Direct Distance Dialing will not cause any layoffs of regular telephone employees," McGowan said.

When DDD goes in operation, Eastland telephone users will be able to dial direct to millions of telephones in thousands of cities in all parts of the United States and Canada.

DDD will be used for station-to-station calls. These are calls on which the customer will talk with anyone who answers. Rates for this type call are substantially less than person-to-person service.

"Other calls, such as person-to-person, collect, credit card, coin or pay station and other calls requiring special handling will be handled by operators, as at present," McGowan explained.

The Eastland Telephone Directory contains a list of area codes for cities which are most frequently called from here. Telephone operators will provide customers with dialing codes for additional cities which may be dialed direct.

The United States and Canada have been divided into more than 120 numbering areas. Each area has a different three-digit code. No telephone number in any of these areas is duplicated.

This is one of the reasons Eastland telephone numbers—and most others in the United States and Canada — have two letters and five figures or seven numerals. For instance, Eastland is in the 817 area. When you place the 817 in front of your own telephone number, you have your own personal long distance number. There is not another like it in the world.

"Dialing direct to distant cities is simple, particularly when the customer knows the area code and out-of-town number, with this information at hand, he simply dials '1'. This lets the automatic equipment know that the customer wants to dial a long distance call. Next, he dials the three-digit area code and the telephone number he is calling. This sends the call on its way, and the telephone in the distant city is ringing in less time than it takes to tell about it," McGowan said.

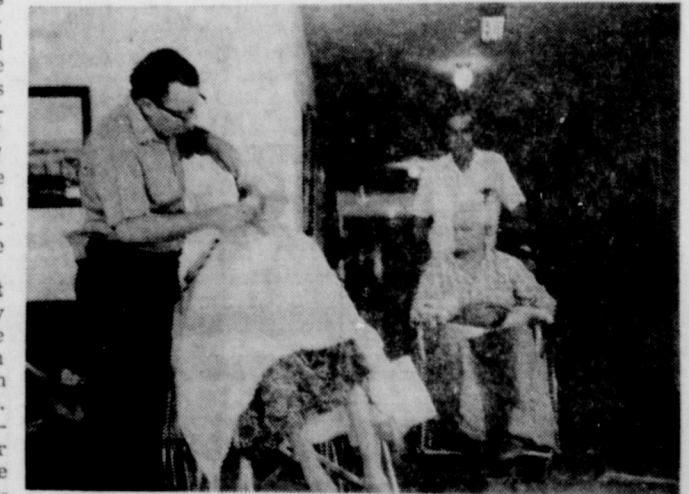

In Eastland, Incumbent Justice of the Peace L. W. (Wells) Dalton and Constable Nominée Bill Hunter are unopposed. Hunter will fill the unexpired term of the late Porter Woods.

Only three of the seven Constitutional Amendment proposals have drawn widespread attention—liquor-by-the-drink (No. 2); tax assessment on ranch, farm and forest land (No. 3); and consolidation of government offices and functions (No. 7).

The Amendments are "for" or "against" situations on which the voters decide, and particular care is recommended in reading the wordings, because of the nature of the propositions. Voters are to place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way they wish to vote.


The "for and against" proposals are:
No. 1. The constitutional amendment to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops.

No. 4. The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission.
No. 5. The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county.

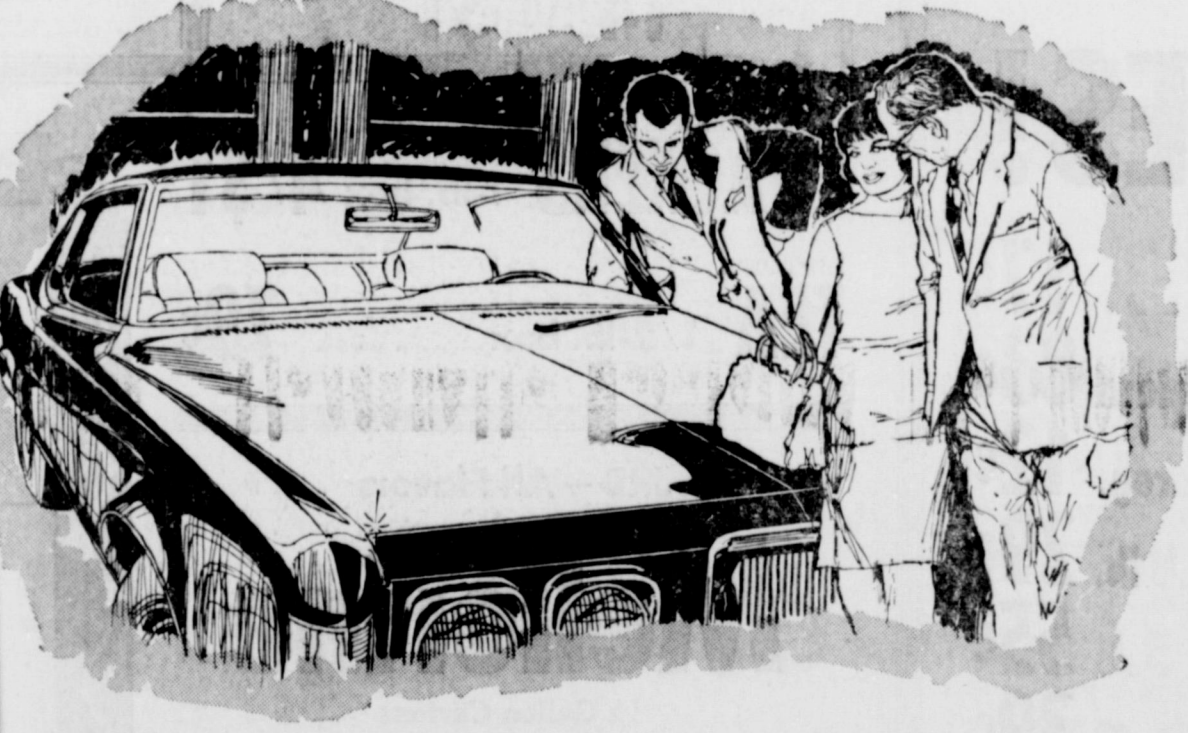
No. 6. The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.
No. 7. The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.

FB Leaders Attend Meeting On Membership At Brownwood

Eight leaders of the Eastland County Farm Bureau participated in a special statewide Farm Bureau membership report activity Oct. 26. They were Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cozart, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Kimmell, Ray Norris, Ann Justice, Cheryl Stephens, and Buddy Aaron.

The District seven meeting they attended in Brownwood was one of 13 such meetings held that same evening across the state.

Sam Kimmell, membership chairman, turned in a report showing 886 member families signed up as of that date. The end of the Farm Bureau fiscal year is Oct. 31. Eastland County has a goal of 900 members for this year. Last year's membership was 820.

A telephoned report of membership results in the district was made that evening to Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean in Waco, when reports from all districts had been compiled, the TFB leader called each district meeting with statewide results.

As of Oct. 26, the Texas Farm Bureau membership stood at 119,636. The state's largest farm organization ended its fiscal year Oct. 31 with a total membership of 116,622 families, making it the third largest state Farm Bureau in the nation.

B.J. Gist of Abilene, District seven director, urged all counties in this district to make a special effort to help bring the TFB membership to 125,000 for the year. The national Farm Bureau meeting will be in Houston in December, and the Texas Farm Bureau hopes to be recognized there for having a gain in every one of its 203 organized county Farm Bureaus.

In a special message read to the assembled leaders, Dean reminded them that the strength of Farm Bureau is within its membership.

"Changes that are taking place in our economic, social and political climate and the impact of these changes on agriculture make it imperative that Farm Bureau leadership accept the challenge to build the kind of organization that agricultural producers must have to cope with these changes," Dean said in his message to the county leaders.

Also on the program at the district meeting was a report on the progress being made by the State Farm Bureau Program Expansion Committee which was appointed last month. Doyle Condra of Runnels County who is the representative from this district on this committee, presented the report.

"Front burner" issues in which Farm Bureau is active presently were discussed by the TFB field representative, J. D. Jordon of Mason, Texas and District director. These included a discussion of Amendment No. 3 which will be voted on in the Nov. 3 general election, policy development activities, and progress in involving both Farm Bureau women and young adults in the organization's program of work.

Home owners and pecan producers in Eastland County should observe their trees for damage from the fall web-worm. The larval stage of this pest build a web in the outer limbs and lower branches of the tree and feeds on the leaves. This insect is capable of completely stripping smaller trees of most all of its leaves. This premature defoliation of trees can cause extensive injury or death to the tree under stress.

Effective control can be accomplished through the use of modern spray materials. Through coverage of infested areas is needed. In large trees, special care must be taken to reach feeding areas. The insecticide Sevin 80% wettable powder is recommended for control at 2-3 lbs. per 100 gallons of spray mix-

ture or 2 tablespoons of 80% Sevin to a gallon of water will be adequate for treating individual trees.

These can also be pulled from the trees and destroyed in reachable areas. Do not cut the limb out unless removal is necessary for normal pruning.

Before applying any materials, carefully read the label and pay attention to precautions and restrictions listed.

Plans are being made for the 1970 Eastland County pecan show to be held in December in Eastland. As you harvest your pecans be sure to pick out a show sample and put away in an open container. If you put green pecans in a closed container they will mildew. Pick out at least 49 large uniform pecans of each variety. If you have scales that will weigh small quantities you can do a good job of selecting the heaviest pecans.

I would like to encourage home owners who have yard trees to select entries for the pecan show. Many times the best pecans in the show are produced in yards where the trees have had good care.

There will also be a bake-show and pecan center-piece contest. The center piece must contain pecans or parts of pecan trees.

will share the work with it will come changes in plant growth. When the growth of all members of the Sorghum family, including Johnson grass sudan, milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids, is stopped by frost, they sometimes develop a high prussic acid content and a hazard to grazing livestock.

Certain chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants and responsible for the prussic acid development. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved usually depends upon how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Frosted Johnsongrass or sorghum should not be grazed until the damaged plants are as dry as good quality hay of for at least a week after the frost. If the crop was ready to cut for hay before the frost, it may be cut immediately provided adequate curing time is allowed. Silage made from frosted plants is safe as soon as the ensiling process is complete.

Young plants or second growth suckers are more likely to cause trouble than older plants nearing maturity. Too, the more luxuriant the growth, the more likely the plants will be dangerous if their growth is interrupted.

Additional information is available from local veterinarians and county agents relating to grazing and/or harvesting and storing of frost wilted plants.

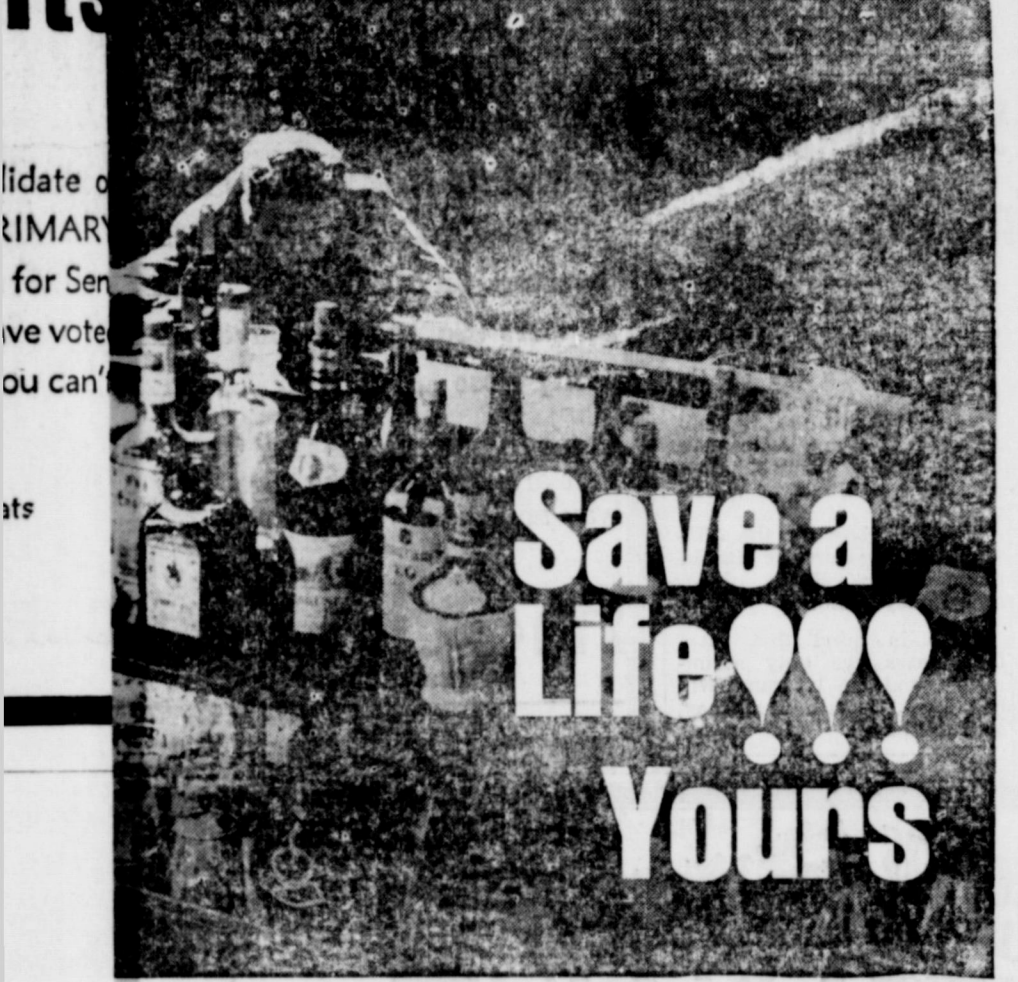

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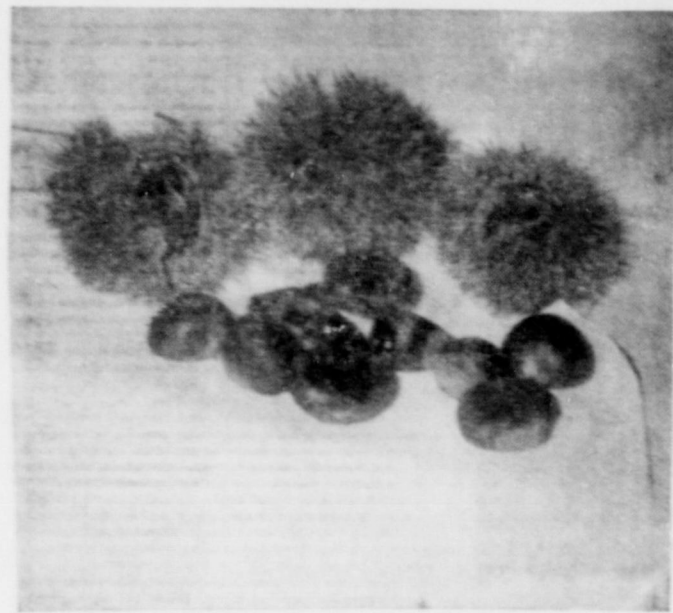

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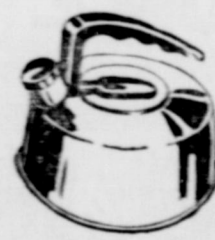
