"Dialing direct to distant most frequently called from cities is simple, particularly when the customer knows the area code and out-of-town number. with this information at hand, he simply dials "1". This lets the automatic equipment know that the customer wants to dial a long distance call. Next, he dials the threedigit area code and the telephone number he is calling. This sends the call on its way, and the telephone in the distant city is ringing in less time than it takes to tell about it,"
